The Director of the Child and Family Services Agency (CFSA), pursuant to Section 601 of the Prevention of Child Abuse and Neglect Act of 1977, effective September 23, 1977 (D.C. Law 2-22; D.C. Official Code § 4-1306.01 (2012 Repl. and 2017 Supp.)) (Child Abuse Act), Sections 382 and 385 of the Foster Parents Statements of Rights and Responsibilities Amendment Act of 2016, effective February 18, 2017 (D.C. Law 21-217; 63 DCR 16009 (December 30, 2016)) (Foster Parents Act), and Mayor’s Order 2017-126, dated May 19, 2017, hereby gives notice of the adoption of the following amendments to Chapter 60 (Foster Homes) of Title 29 (Public Welfare) of the District of Columbia Municipal Regulations (DCMR).

These amendments establish and clarify the responsibilities of foster parents in the CFSA system, as well as the responsibilities of CFSA to these foster parents. These amendments do not establish any additional private right of action beyond that which already exists under federal or District law.

A Notice of Proposed Rulemaking was published in the *D.C. Register* on July 21, 2017 at 64 DCR 6869. No written comments were received from the public in connection with this publication and no changes were made. The proposed rulemaking was submitted to the Council as required by § 385 of the Act. The rules were deemed approved on December 22, 2017. Final action to adopt these rules was taken on January 3, 2018.

These rules will take effect immediately upon publication of this notice in the *D.C. Register*.

**Chapter 60, FOSTER HOMES, of Title 29 DCMR, PUBLIC WELFARE, is amended as follows:**

**Section 6002, FOSTER PARENT RESPONSIBILITIES, is amended as follows:**

**Subsection 6002.1 is amended to read as follows:**

6002.1 A foster parent shall:

- (a) Provide parental supervision and guidance appropriate to the foster child’s age and developmental level;
- (b) Provide daily essentials required for the health, comfort, and good grooming of a foster child, including:
  - (1) A nutritionally balanced diet adequate for the foster child’s needs in growth and development;
  - (2) Adequate shelter; and
  - (3) Clothing proper for the season;
- (c) Involve the foster child in household activities;

- (d) Establish clear expectations for and limits on behavior, understand and deal with negative behavior in a positive way, and reward good behavior;
- (e) Abide by the rules on discipline and control as set forth in § 6018;
- (f) Encourage and support the foster child’s participation in extracurricular, enrichment, cultural, and social activities;
- (g) Provide, arrange, or coordinate with the agency to provide transportation to and from normal daily activities, including school, appointments, sports, family visitation, social, religious, ethnic, and cultural events, and other appointments as necessary and as set forth in the foster child’s case plan;
- (h) Help the foster child cope with the anxiety of being away from his or her family, and promote the child’s self-esteem and positive self-image;
- (i) Be sensitive to and respect the foster child’s individual needs, tastes, and values, and support the foster child’s religious beliefs and cultural customs;
- (j) Participate in and support the foster child’s educational process;
- (k) Participate in and support the foster child’s mental, physical, and dental health care, and request and maintain a copy of a record from each health care visit;
- (l) Have a plan for the substitute care and supervision of each foster child by a licensed foster parent or day care provider, or the equivalent in the jurisdiction in which that substitute care is provided, when the foster parent is absent from the home on a regular basis, such as for employment;
- (m) Use baby-sitters who are sixteen (16) years of age or older. Babysitters shall be used for a reasonable amount of time, considering the age and level of functioning of the foster child;
- (n) Utilize only substitute caregivers and babysitters in whom the foster parent has confidence that the person can appropriately care for the foster child;
- (o) Maintain the confidentiality of information about the foster child and the foster child’s family in accordance with § 6023;
- (p) Transmit information about the foster child or the foster child’s family only in accordance with subsection (y)(3) below and § 6023;
- (q) Notify the agency immediately of any change or anticipated change for the foster parent or within the foster home concerning:
  - (1) Employment;
  - (2) Child care arrangements;

- (3) Composition of the household;
  - (4) Finances;
  - (5) Residence or telephone number;
  - (6) Health status;
  - (7) Marital status; or
  - (8) Any other change which may affect the stability of the foster home or of the foster child's placement in the foster home;
- (r) Notify the agency for any overnight trips of more than one hundred (100) miles from the District of Columbia that the foster parent would like the foster child to take;
  - (s) Give at least ten (10) business days' notice to the agency when requesting removal of a foster child except in circumstances that are critical to the health and safety of the foster child or other household member;
  - (t) Immediately report to CFSA and the agency any suspected incident of child abuse or neglect;
  - (u) Notify CFSA and the agency of any criminal charges, investigations, or findings related to any crime alleged to have been committed by the foster parent or a household member;
  - (v) Keep the agency aware of the foster child's development and adjustment;
  - (w) Participate in decision-making, case-planning, case reviews, and permanency planning for the child in care;
  - (x) Work as a team member in assessing a foster child's strengths and needs and in implementing the foster child's case plan;
  - (y) A foster parent, in accordance with a foster child's case plan, shall:
    - (1) Assist the agency in maintaining and improving the foster child's relationship with her or his family, and support this relationship by helping with family visits, which may include visits in the foster home;
    - (2) Maintain an attitude of respect and understanding towards the foster child's parents and family;
    - (3) Tell the foster child's parents about events and happenings in the foster child's daily life; and
    - (4) Serve as a role model for the foster child's parents;



- (z) Assist in preparing the foster child to achieve his or her permanency plan and any move from the foster home;
- (aa) Work with the agency to make every effort to avoid placement disruptions;
- (bb) Work with service providers, when appropriate, to ensure the service needs are being met for the foster child;
- (cc) Participate in training required and approved by the agency; and
- (dd) Maintain the standards of foster care required by this chapter of the DCMR.

**Subsections 6002.2 and 6002.3 are struck in their entirety.**

**Subsections 6002.4, 6002.5, and 6002.6 are renumbered as 6002.2, 6002.3, and 6002.4, respectively.**

**Section 6003, AGENCY RESPONSIBILITY TO FOSTER PARENT, is amended as follows:**

**Subsection 6003.1 is amended to read as follows:**

6003.1 The following principles and rights are to govern the Agency's relationship with a foster parent.

A foster parent is entitled:

- (a) To be recognized and valued as members of the child welfare team;
- (b) To be treated with dignity, trust, and respect;
- (c) To language translation in accordance with the Language Access Act of 2004;
- (d) To not be subject to discrimination as provided in the D.C. Human Rights Act of 1977, as amended;
- (e) To receive a printed copy of this section;
- (f) To report rights violations and complaints without fear of retaliation;
- (g) To receive a written explanation of the process for reporting and resolving rights violations and complaints;
- (h) To a fair hearing if the agency modifies, suspends, converts, revokes, denies, or takes any other action concerning a license or an application for a foster parent license;

- (i) To accurate information about the foster child, including the reason the foster child is in foster care within three (3) business days after placement;
- (j) To medical records, including immunization records, within three (3) business days of placement;
- (k) To be informed of the foster child’s permanency plan, to be updated as to the progress of the achievement of that plan, and to be allowed to provide input into the plan;
- (l) To be informed of decisions that impact the foster parent while ensuring the best interests and confidentiality of the foster child and his or her family;
- (m) To be notified at least ten (10) business days prior to a change in placement except in the case of an emergency;
- (n) To a fair hearing when a foster child has been removed from the home in accordance with Chapter 59 of the Title 29 of the DCMR;
- (o) To communicate with professionals who work with a foster child including therapists, physicians, and teachers;
- (p) To support in establishing and developing relationships with birth parents when appropriate and in the best interests of the foster child;
- (q) To be included in the development of any service agreements for a foster child;
- (r) To participate in decision-making, case-planning and permanency planning for a foster child;
- (s) To receive notice and an opportunity to be heard in any proceeding held with respect to a foster child, in accordance with District and federal law;
- (t) To accept or refuse placement and to request removal without fear of reprisal;
- (u) To be considered a priority placement option (when appropriate, based on the circumstances and the best interests of the child) when there is a significant relationship with the child or when the foster parent previously provided care for a child who has re-entered foster care, or when a child becomes available for adoption;
- (v) To appropriate supportive services, when available, that will enable the foster parent to meet the unique needs of the foster child and deal effectively with problems inherent in the foster child's adjustment to care;

- (w) To a response as soon as possible by the agency to crisis situations that may arise from the foster child's placement in the foster home;
- (x) To assistance in preparation for the separation of the foster child from foster care placement;
- (y) To timely board and care payments;
- (z) To have the payment criteria explained, including foster care board and care payments, clothing allowance, and any supplemental expenditures made to meet the foster child's needs;
- (aa) To pre-service and in-service training; and
- (bb) To assistance in the selection, preparation, and completion of in-service foster parent training.

**DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH****NOTICE OF FINAL RULEMAKING**

The Director of the Department of Health, pursuant to the authority set forth in sections 4902(a)(8) and 4908 of the Department of Health Functions Clarification Act of 2001, effective October 3, 2001 (D.C. Law 14-28; D.C. Official Code §§ 7-731(a)(8) and 7-737 (2012 Repl. & 2017 Supp.)), and Mayor’s Order 2006-34, dated March 12, 2006, hereby gives notice of her intent to adopt the following amendments to Chapters 102 (Licensing of Medical Devices – Distributors, Manufacturers, Initial Importers, and Vendors) and 104 (Medical Device Reporting) of Title 22 (Health), Subtitle B (Public Health and Medicine) of the District of Columbia Municipal Regulations (DCMR).

This final rulemaking action is necessary to ensure that the health, safety, and welfare of the public is protected by ensuring that manufacturers, importers, vendors, and distributors are licensed at periodic intervals consisting of one (1) year. This amendment to Chapter 102 will make the regulatory change consistent with 17 DCMR § 3500.1.

In addition, Chapter 104 is being amended to clarify the definition of a “distributor” – one of the types of business entities that places medical devices in the supply chain in the District of Columbia.

This rulemaking was published as a Notice of Emergency and Proposed Rulemaking on December 22, 2017 at 64 DCR 13132. No comments were received and no changes have been made. It will become effective upon publication in the *D.C. Register*.

**Chapter 102, LICENSING OF MEDICAL DEVICES - DISTRIBUTORS, MANUFACTURERS, INITIAL IMPORTERS, AND VENDORS, of Title 22-B DCMR, PUBLIC HEALTH AND MEDICINE, is amended as follows:**

**Section 10203, LICENSURE REQUIREMENTS FOR DISTRIBUTORS, MANUFACTURERS, INITIAL IMPORTERS, AND VENDORS, is amended as follows:**

**Subsection 10203.8 is amended as follows:**

10203.8 Unless a license is amended pursuant to this section or revoked or suspended as provided in § 10207 (relating to Refusal, Cancellation, Suspension, or Revocation of a License), the license shall be valid for one (1) year.

**Chapter 104, MEDICAL DEVICE REPORTING, Section 10499, DEFINITIONS, is amended as follows:**

**Subsection 10499.1 is amended as follows:**

**Distributor** – any natural or legal person who, on his or her own behalf, sells chiefly to vendors. The term “distributor” does not include a common carrier, a delivery agent, or sales representative, who does not have legal title to a medical device.

## DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH

NOTICE OF FINAL RULEMAKING

The Director of the Department of Health, pursuant to Section 14 of the Legalization of Marijuana for Medical Treatment Initiative of 1999 (“Act”), effective July 27, 2010 (D.C. Law 18-210; D.C. Official Code § 7-1671.13 (2012 Repl. & 2017 Supp.)); Section 4902(d) of the Department of Health Functions Clarification Act of 2001, effective October 3, 2001 (D.C. Law 14–28; D.C. Official Code § 7–731(d) (2012 Repl. & 2017 Supp.)); Sections 2 and 3 of the Act, effective February 25, 2010 (D.C. Law 13-315; D.C. Official Code §§ 7-1671.01(19) and 7-1671.02(c)(2) (2012 Repl. & 2017 Supp.)); and Mayor’s Order 2011-71, dated April 13, 2011, hereby gives notice of the adoption of the following amendments to Chapters 5 (Qualifying Patients) and 99 (Definitions) of Title 22 (Health), Subtitle C (Medical Marijuana), of the District of Columbia Municipal Regulations (“DCMR”).

The purpose of this rulemaking is to implement regulations governing the participation of nonresident qualifying patients in the District’s Medical Marijuana Program.

The first notice of this proposed rulemaking was published in the *D.C. Register* on October 20, 2017, at 64 DCR 10558. The Department subsequently withdrew the rulemaking to make substantive revisions. The second proposed rulemaking superseded the first rulemaking and was published in the *D.C. Register* for public comment on January 19, 2018, at 65 DCR 456. The Department received written comments from the District of Columbia Medical Cannabis Trade Association (“DCMCTA”) in response to this notice. The comments from DCMCTA are as follows:

- DCMCTA disapproves of the rulemaking because it does not permit all of the nation’s legal, registered medical marijuana patients to access medical marijuana in DC, which DCMCTA notes was the intent of the Medical Marijuana Omnibus Amendment Act of 2016.
- The “functional equivalent” requirement in the proposed rulemaking severely limits legal access to medical marijuana in the District.
- DCMCTA through an “educated estimate” believes that more than 70% of the medical marijuana patients from the jurisdictions with medical marijuana programs will not qualify to access medical marijuana in DC.
- The Department of Health has been unable to supply an official list of the jurisdictions that it deems functionally equivalent under the regulations.
- Not allowing such a large number of non-District residents to access medical marijuana in the District of Columbia may result in these individuals seeking to make purchases from DC’s “thriving black market,” which could subject them to harm from an unregulated product or from the “black market sellers” they encounter.
- DCMCTA disapproves of the rulemaking but decided not to work to have the second proposed rulemaking withdrawn and rewritten again, because further delay is not in the best interest of patients who will have access once reciprocity has been implemented.

- DCMCTA will work with the Department and DC Council to continue to expand access to non-District residents.

The commenter did not request that the Department make any changes to the regulations. To the contrary, the commenter specifically stated that they did not want to have the second proposed rulemaking withdrawn and rewritten as it would result in further delay in implementing medical marijuana reciprocity. Instead, the commenter expressed its intent to work with the Department and the DC Council to “continue to expand access to out-of-state patients.”

The Department has not made any changes to the proposed rulemaking. First, the commenter did not request that any changes be made at this time. Second, the Department agrees that further delays to implementation is not in the best interests of the medical marijuana patients who are registered in another jurisdiction’s medical marijuana program and who will visit, attend school, or temporarily work in the District in the future.

Following the required period of Council review, the rules were deemed approved by the D.C. Council on February 23, 2018. These final rules will be effective upon publication of this notice in the *D.C. Register*.

**Chapter 5, QUALIFYING PATIENTS, of Title 22-C DCMR, MEDICAL MARIJUANA, is amended as follows:**

**A new Section 503, NONRESIDENT QUALIFYING PATIENTS, is added to read as follows:**

**503 NONRESIDENT QUALIFYING PATIENTS**

- 503.1 Before dispensing medical marijuana to a nonresident qualifying patient, a registered dispensary shall:
- (a) Verify the nonresident qualifying patient’s identity through comparison of his/her unexpired government-issued identification card and his/her valid, unexpired nonresident card; and
  - (b) Confirm through the electronic records data system that the nonresident qualifying patient has not reached the allowable limit for the thirty (30) day period.
- 503.2 A registered dispensary shall not dispense medical marijuana to a nonresident qualifying patient who is unable to present his/her unexpired government-issued identification card and his/her valid, unexpired nonresident card.
- 503.3 A registered dispensary shall not dispense medical marijuana to a nonresident qualifying patient who has received four (4) ounces of medical marijuana within thirty (30) days.

- 503.4 A registered dispensary shall not dispense medical marijuana to a nonresident qualifying patient if the Department has determined that there is a shortage of medical marijuana, or the real-time electronic records system is inactive.
- 503.5 The dispensary shall retain a copy of the nonresident card or state-issued document, and a copy of the government-issued identification card.
- 503.6 The dispensary shall conspicuously post a sign which shall be not less than twelve (12) inches wide and twelve (12) inches long in an area that will be easily viewed and read by the public stating, “It is illegal to transport medical marijuana across state lines.”

**Chapter 99, DEFINITIONS, is amended as follows:**

**Section 9900, DEFINITIONS, Subsection 9900.1, is amended by adding the following new definitions to appear in alphabetical order:**

**Functional Equivalent-** a medical marijuana program that issues either a card or state-issued document evidencing the patient’s participation in the program, and that requires that a recommendation for the use of medical marijuana be made by a licensed healthcare provider that:

- (a) Is in a *bona fide* patient-practitioner relationship with the qualifying patient;
- (b) Performs a personal physical examination or dental examination of the qualifying patient; and
- (c) Has responsibility for the ongoing care and treatment of the qualifying patient.

**Nonresident Card-** a medical marijuana patient card or document issued by a state that has an active medical marijuana program and is the functional equivalent of the District of Columbia medical marijuana program, as determined by the Mayor.

**Nonresident Qualifying Patient-** a person that is not a resident of the District of Columbia who is enrolled in another jurisdiction’s medical marijuana program, unless the Department has determined that there is a shortage of medical marijuana or the real-time electronic records system referenced in the Act is inactive.

NOTICE OF PROPOSED RULEMAKING

The State Superintendent of Education (“Superintendent”), pursuant to the authority set forth in Sections 3(b)(8), 3(b)(9), 3(b)(10), 3(b)(11), and 3(b)(15) of the State Education Office Establishment Act of 2000, effective October 21, 2000, (D.C. Law 13-176; D.C. Official Code §§ 38-2602(b)(8), (b)(9), (b)(10), (b)(11) and (b)(15) (2012 Repl. & 2017 Supp.)); Section 102(b) of the Enhanced Special Education Services Amendment Act of 2014, effective March 10, 2015 (D.C. Law 20-195; D.C. Official Code § 38-2614(a)(3) & (b) (2012 Repl. & 2017 Supp.)) (“Enhanced Special Education Services Act”); Sections 102(a) and 115 of the Placement of Students with Disabilities in Nonpublic Schools Amendment Act of 2006, effective March 14, 2007 (D.C. Law 16-269; D.C. Official Code §§ 38-2561.15) (2012 Repl. & 2017 Supp.)); Mayor’s Order 2007-149, dated June 28, 2007; Section 504 of the Early Intervention Program Establishment Act of 2004, effective April 13, 2005 (D.C. Law 15-353; D.C. Official Code § 7-863.04) (2012 Repl. & 2017 Supp.)); Mayor’s Order 2009-167, date September 28, 2009; Part B and Part C of the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act, approved December 3, 2004 (118 Stat. 2738; 20 U.S.C. § 1400 *et seq.*) (“IDEA”) and regulations promulgated thereunder at 34 C.F.R. Parts 300 and 303; hereby gives notice her intent to: (i) amend Section 3108 (Child Eligibility for Services) in Chapter 31 (Early Intervention Program for Infants and Toddlers with Disabilities) of Subtitle A (Office of the State Superintendent of Education) of Title 5 (Education) of the District of Columbia Municipal Regulations (“DCMR”); and (ii) amend Sections 3001, 3002, 3004, 3005, 3017, 3024, and 3025 of Chapter 30 (Special Education) of Subtitle E (Original Title 5) of Title 5 DCMR (Education).

The purpose of this proposed rulemaking is to amend Section 3108 (Child Eligibility for Services) in Chapter 31 (Early Intervention Program for Infants and Toddlers with Disabilities) of Title 5-A to amend the definition of developmental delay to comply with Section 102(b) of Title I (D.C. Official Code § 38-2614(a)(3) & (b)) in the Enhanced Special Education Services Act, which requires OSSE to expand eligibility for early intervention services to those experiencing a twenty-five percent (25%) delay in one developmental area.

Further, this proposed rulemaking amends Sections in Chapter 30 (Special Education) of Title 5-E to address critical gaps and clarify existing responsibilities related to: child find obligations (or the obligation to identify, locate, and evaluate all children suspected of having a disability), referrals for initial evaluation, local education agency (LEA) responsibility to conduct reasonable efforts to obtain parent consent prior to an initial evaluation, considerations for reviewing data during the initial evaluation of a child under the age of six (6), LEA responsibilities related to extended school year services, and requirements related to the provision and documentation of prior written notice.

The amendments in this proposed rulemaking to 5-E DCMR Chapter 30 also considers comments received on these topic areas in OSSE’s June 26, 2017 Advanced Notice of Proposed Rulemaking (“ANPR”), which was published on OSSE’s website to provide stakeholders an opportunity to provide advanced comment on proposed amendments to a new Chapter 30. While, OSSE has decided to move forward with this proposed rulemaking now to address and clarify

the critical gaps discussed above, OSSE does plan to issue another Notice of Proposed Rulemaking that provides a comprehensive update to the regulatory framework governing the education of children with disabilities, that also considers the comments received from the ANPR, by Summer 2018. OSSE believes that this timeline will allow for greater time to provide training and align data systems to ensure stakeholders are appropriately positioned to implement the comprehensive overhaul of the foundational regulations governing the provision of special education and related services to children with disabilities in the District of Columbia. Furthermore, OSSE believes this timeline will allow for deeper engagement, and plans to also include a public hearing session for only parents and families to provide comments on the future rulemaking.

This notice is being circulated throughout the District for a forty-five (45) day period, including an opportunity to submit written comments and attend public hearings on this proposed rulemaking. Four (4) public hearings will take place as detailed and under conditions set forth below:

**Section 3108, CHILD ELIGIBILITY FOR SERVICES, is amended by adding the bolded and underlined language in § 3108.3 and adding a new § 3108.4 to read as follows:**

**3108 CHILD ELIGIBILITY FOR SERVICES**

...

3108.3 **Until § 3108.4 takes effect**, pursuant to Part C IDEA regulations at 34 C.F.R. §§ 303.21 and 303.111, a child is eligible for District of Columbia Part C early intervention services if the child is between the age of birth and his/her third (3rd) birthday and any of the following apply:

- (a) The child demonstrates a delay of fifty (50%) percent, using appropriate diagnostic instruments and procedures, in one (1) of the following developmental areas:
  - (1) Physical development, including vision or hearing;
  - (2) Cognitive development;
  - (3) Communication development;
  - (4) Social or emotional development; or
  - (5) Adaptive development.
- (b) The child is diagnosed as having a physical or mental condition that has a high probability of resulting in developmental delay, including conditions such as chromosomal abnormalities; genetic or congenital disorders; sensory impairments; inborn errors of metabolism; disorders reflecting

disturbance of the development of the nervous system; congenital infections; severe attachment disorders; and disorders secondary to exposure to toxic substances, including fetal alcohol syndrome.

- (c) In addition to the above criteria, effective July 1, 2013, the child demonstrates a delay of twenty-five (25%) percent, using appropriate diagnostic instruments and procedures, in two (2) or more of the following developmental areas:
- (1) Physical development, including vision or hearing;
  - (2) Cognitive development;
  - (3) Communication development;
  - (4) Social or emotional development;
  - (5) Adaptive development

3108.4

Upon the inclusion of the fiscal effect of the subsection in an approved budget and financial plan as certified by the District of Columbia Chief Financial Officer and published in the *District of Columbia Register*, a child is eligible for District of Columbia Part C early intervention services if the child is between the age of birth and his/her third (3rd) birthday and any of the following apply:

- (a) The child demonstrates a delay of twenty-five (25%) percent, using appropriate diagnostic instruments and procedures, in one (1) of the following developmental areas:
- (1) Physical development, including vision or hearing;
  - (2) Cognitive development;
  - (3) Communication development;
  - (4) Social or emotional development; or
  - (5) Adaptive development; or
- (b) The child is diagnosed as having a physical or mental condition that has a high probability of resulting in developmental delay, including conditions such as chromosomal abnormalities; genetic or congenital disorders; sensory impairments; inborn errors of metabolism; disorders reflecting disturbance of the development of the nervous system; congenital infections; severe attachment disorders; and disorders secondary to exposure to toxic substances, including fetal alcohol syndrome.

**Chapter 30, SPECIAL EDUCATION, of Title 5-E DCMR, ORIGINAL TITLE 5, is amended as follows:**

**Section 3001, DEFINITIONS, is amended by adding the following definitions to Subsection 3001.1:**

3001.1           ...

**Child find** – A set of policies, procedures, and public awareness activities designed to locate, identify, and evaluate children who may require special education and related services.

...

**Enrollment** –A process through which a student obtains admission to a public or public charter school. .

...

**Section 3002, LEA RESPONSIBILITY, is amended as follows:**

**Subsection 3002.1 is amended to read as follows:**

3002.1           Provision of FAPE

- (a)   The LEA shall make a free appropriate public education (FAPE) available to each child with a disability, ages three to twenty-two, who resides in, or is a ward of, the District including children who are suspended or expelled and highly mobile children, such as migrant or homeless children, even if they are advancing from grade to grade.
- (b)   For DCPS, the responsibility to make FAPE available extends to all children with disabilities between the ages of three (3) and twenty-two (22) years old, who are residents of the District of Columbia but are not enrolled in a public charter school LEA, and children with disabilities attending private and religious schools in the District of Columbia, pursuant to the requirements of IDEA.
- (c)   Unless otherwise provided in § 3002.9, a public charter school LEA’s obligation to determine eligibility for special education services or to provide special education services on an existing IEP is triggered upon completion of the registration of the student in the Student Information System (SIS) by the school upon receipt of required enrollment forms and

letter of enrollment agreement, in accordance with subparagraph (4) in the definition of enrollment in 5A DCMR § 2199.

- (d) A child with a disability found by the LEA to be eligible for special education and related services shall remain eligible through the end of the semester he or she turns twenty-two.
- (e) If a child with a disability turns twenty-two during the summer, he or she shall be ineligible for further special education and related services under this chapter.
- (f) The services provided to the child must address all of the child's identified special education and related services needs and must be based on the child's unique needs and not on the child's disability.
- (g) When a child with a disability can receive FAPE in his or her local school without transportation, the LEA is not required to provide transportation to an alternative placement unilaterally selected by the child, parent or guardian.
- (h) For children transitioning from early intervention services under IDEA Part C to special education and related services under IDEA Part B, the LEA shall ensure a smooth and effective transition pursuant to §3002.9.

...

**Subsection 3002.3 is repealed:**

3002.3 ...

- (a) [REPEALED]

...

**New Subsections 3002.6 through 3002.10 are added to read as follows:**

3002.6 Each LEA and public agency shall implement child find policies and procedures to ensure that:

- (a) All children with disabilities between the ages of three (3) and twenty-two (22) years of age enrolled in the LEA, including children with disabilities who are homeless, children who are in the custody of the District of Columbia Child and Family Services Agency or committed to the District of Columbia Youth Rehabilitation Services Agency, children who are making progress from grade to grade, and highly mobile children, who are in need of special education and related services, are identified, located, and evaluated; and

- (b) A practical method is developed and implemented to determine which children are currently receiving needed special education and related services.

3002.7

The District of Columbia Public Schools shall also implement child find policies and procedures to ensure that:

- (a) All children with disabilities between three (3) and twenty-two (22) years who are residents of the District of Columbia but are not enrolled in a LEA, and who are in need of special education and related services, are identified, located, and evaluated; and
- (b) A practical method is developed and implemented to determine which children are currently receiving needed special education and related services.
- (c) For children under the age of six (6) years old, DCPS shall:
  - (1) Maintain, and update at least annually, a list of primary referral sources, including physicians, hospitals, and other health providers; day care centers, child care centers, and early childhood programs; District departments and agencies; community and civic organizations; and advocacy organizations. In addition:
    - (A) Contact primary referral sources at least once a month until a referral relationship is established and then every three (3) months thereafter;
    - (B) Develop a system to track frequency and type (in person, email, phone, etc.) of contacts with the primary referral sources described in Subsection (c)(1) to ensure that outreach occurs on a regular basis; and
    - (C) Develop, publish, and distribute printed materials for primary referral sources to inform them of the preschool special education and related services available from DCPS, the benefits and cost-free nature of these services, and how to make a referral;
  - (2) Develop and publish printed materials for parents to provide information regarding preschool special education and related services available from DCPS, the benefits and cost-free nature of these services, and how to obtain the services. These materials shall be:

- (A) Written at an appropriate reading level and translated into multiple languages as required by local law; and
  - (B) Distributed to all primary referral sources described in Subsection (c)(1), all DCPS and public charter schools, District of Columbia Public Libraries, Economic Security Administration (ESA) Service Centers, District of Columbia Parks and Recreation facilities, and other locations designed to reach as many parents or guardians of preschool children who may be eligible for special education and related services as possible; and
- (3) Ensure that appropriate DCPS outreach staff (e.g., the Child Find Field Coordinators) contact primary referral sources or a staff member in the primary referral source's office who are instrumental in making referrals at least once a month until a referral relationship is established and then every three (3) months thereafter. The initial meeting shall be face-to-face whenever possible when pursuing referrals from new referral sources and then less frequently thereafter, using the method of contact preferred by the referral sources (e.g., e-mail, texting, or telephone calls).

3002.8 DCPS shall conduct public awareness activities sufficient to inform parents and the community regarding the availability of special education and related services and the methods available to request those services and programs. District public charter school LEAs shall conduct similar awareness activities to inform parents and community members that interact with the public charter school LEA of the availability of special education and related services.

3002.9 The LEA's obligation to make FAPE available to a child with a disability commences upon completion of the child's registration, in accordance with subparagraph (4) in the definition of enrollment in 5A DCMR § 2199, except that:

- (a) For children transitioning from early intervention services under IDEA Part C to special education and related services under IDEA Part B, the LEA shall ensure a smooth and effective transition pursuant to 34 CFR § 300.124, including ensuring that:
  - (1) The LEA participates in transition planning conferences, as appropriate;
  - (2) The LEA has developed an IEP by the child's third birthday, including:



- (A) For public charter school LEAs, the LEA has developed an IEP by the third birthday of any child who is currently enrolled in the public charter school LEA or has completed the registration process for the upcoming school year; or
  - (B) For DCPS, the LEA has developed an IEP by the third birthday of any child who is a resident of the District of Columbia who is not enrolled in a public charter school LEA; and
- (3) The LEA is implementing the IEP by the child’s third birthday or, if the third birthday occurs on a non-school day or during the summer, within a timeframe established by the state education agency (SEA), including ensuring the provision of all special education and related services in the child’s IEP.
- (b) For all other children not covered by Subsection (a) transferring between LEAs between school years:
- (1) The new LEA’s obligation to make FAPE available begins on August 1 or the first day of the school year, whichever is earlier; and
  - (2) The previous LEA’s obligation to make FAPE available ends on July 31 or the last day of summer extended school year services, whichever is later; and
- (c) If a child is registered in the Student Information System (SIS) for more than one (1) LEA, the most recent date of documented parental consent for enrollment shall determine the LEA that is responsible for making FAPE available to the child.

3002.10 DCPS is responsible for conducting child find activities for children who are homeschooled and resident and nonresident parentally-placed private school child over three (3) years of age attending religious and other private elementary and secondary schools located in the District and may not require enrollment in the LEA prior to evaluation or development of an IEP.

**Section 3004, IDENTIFICATION & REFERRAL FOR INITIAL EVALUATION, is amended to read as follows:**

**3004 IDENTIFICATION & REFERRAL FOR INITIAL EVALUATION**

3004.1 The LEA shall treat a referral from the following individuals as a request for initial evaluation in accordance with 34 C.F.R. §300.301(b):

- (a) The child's parent;
- (b) The child, provided that educational rights have transferred to the child; and
- (c) An employee of the LEA the child is enrolled in, who has knowledge of the child.

3004.2 For children under the age of six (6), the LEA shall also treat a referral from the following individuals, as a request for initial evaluation in accordance with 34 C.F.R. § 300.301(b):

- (a) Pediatrician or other medical professional, including physicians, hospitals, and other health providers;
- (b) Child development facilities, including day care centers, child care centers, and early childhood programs;
- (c) District agencies and programs, including IDEA Part C programs;
- (d) Community and civic organizations; and
- (e) Advocacy organizations.

3004.3 To determine if a child is suspected of being a child with a disability, the LEA may:

- (a) Conduct screenings;
- (b) Consider existing child data and information; and
- (c) Consult with the parent.

3004.4 The LEA shall not unreasonably delay or deny a timely initial evaluation to conduct screenings or implement pre-referral interventions.

3004.5 The LEA shall notify the parent of receipt of any referral received under § 3004.2. This notification shall include information regarding:

- (a) The initial evaluation process;
- (b) Parental consent requirements; and
- (c) Resources the parent may contact for assistance.

3004.6 A referral for an initial evaluation may be oral or written.

- 3004.7 Upon receiving an oral referral for an initial evaluation, the LEA shall:
  - (a) Assist any outside referral source, including but not limited to the parent and other public agencies, to document an oral referral in writing; and
  - (b) Document the date of any oral referral within three (3) business days of receipt.

**Section 3005, EVALUATION AND REEVALUATION, is amended as follows:**

**By adding subparagraphs (b)-(d) to Subsection 3005.2 and adding subparagraphs (b)-(c) to Subsection 3005.4 to read as follows:**

**3005 EVALUATION AND REEVALUATION**

...

3005.2 ...

- (b) The LEA shall document reasonable efforts to obtain parental consent. Reasonable efforts include at least three (3) documented attempts using at least two (2) of the following modalities on at least three (3) different dates:
  - (1) Telephone calls made or attempted and the results of those calls;
  - (2) Correspondence sent to the parents and any responses received; or
  - (3) Visits made to the parents’ home or place of employment and the results of those visits.
- (c) Reasonable efforts for the purposes of obtaining parental consent for initial evaluation shall begin no later than ten (10) business days from the referral date and be completed no later than five (5) days prior to the deadline for the initial evaluation.
- (d) The initial evaluation timeline in this Section does not apply to the LEA if:
  - (1) The LEA has made and documented reasonable efforts under this Section and the parent of a child repeatedly fails or refuses to produce the child for the evaluation; or
  - (2) The child enrolls in a new LEA after the initial evaluation process timeline has begun, but before an eligibility determination has been made by the child’s previous LEA, provided that the new LEA is

making sufficient progress to ensure prompt completion of the evaluation, and the parent and new LEA agree to a specific time when the evaluation will be completed, not to exceed an additional thirty (30) days.

...

3005.4 ...

- (b) Review, for children under the age of six (6):
  - (1) Relevant information provided by any agency, medical professional, service provider, child care provider, early childhood program, or relative who may have relevant information regarding the child; and
  - (2) IDEA Part C assessments and other related data.
- (c) On the basis of that review, and input from the child's parents, identify what additional data, if any, are needed to determine:
  - (1) Whether the child has a particular category of disability under this chapter or, in the case of a reevaluation of a child, whether the child continues to have such a disability;
  - (2) The present levels of performance and educational needs of the child;
  - (3) Whether the child needs special education and related services, or in the case of a reevaluation of a child, whether the child continues to need special education and related services; and
  - (4) Whether any additions or modifications to the special education and related services are needed to enable the child to meet the measurable annual goals set out in the IEP of the child and to participate, as appropriate, in the general curriculum.

...

**Section 3017, EXTENDED SCHOOL YEAR SERVICES, is amended as follows:**

**Subsections 3017.1 and 3017.2 are to read as follows:**

3017.1 The IEP Team shall determine whether the provision of extended school year services is necessary for the provision of FAPE to a child with a disability on an individual basis, as part of the initial IEP development and the annual IEP review.

3017.2 In determining whether extended school year services are necessary for the provision of FAPE, the IEP team shall utilize at least three (3) months of progress monitoring data from the current school year, or any relevant current data or information if three (3) months of progress monitoring data from the current school year is not available, to consider and document each of the following:

- (a) The impact of break in service on previously attained or emerging critical skills;
- (b) The likelihood and degree of regression related to previously attained or emerging critical skills; and
- (c) The time required for recoupment of previously attained or emerging critical skills.

...

**Section 3024, PROCEDURAL SAFEGUARDS – PRIOR WRITTEN NOTICE, is amended as follows:**

**3024 PROCEDURAL SAFEGUARDS--PRIOR WRITTEN NOTICE.**

3024.1 Consistent with 20 U.S.C. § 1415(b)(3), the LEA shall provide written notice to the parent of a child with a disability a reasonable time before the LEA:

- (a) Proposes to initiate or change the identification, evaluation, educational placement, including the service location of the educational placement, or the provision of FAPE to the child; or
- (b) Refuses to initiate or change the identification, evaluation, educational placement, including the service location of the educational placement, or the provision of FAPE to the child.

3024.2 Prior written notice shall be:

- (a) Written in language understandable to the general public;
- (b) Documented in the system of record each time it is provided to the parent, including the mode of delivery;
- (c) Provided in the native language of the parent or other mode of communication used by the parent, unless it is clearly not feasible to do so; and

- (d) If the native language or other mode of communication of the parent is not a written language, the LEA shall take steps to ensure all of the following:
  - (1) The notice is translated orally or by other means to the parent in the parent’s native language or other mode of communication;
  - (2) The parent understands the content of the notice; and
  - (3) There is written evidence that the requirements of this paragraph have been met.

**Section 3025, PRIOR WRITTEN NOTICE CONTENT, is amended to read as follows:**

**3025 PRIOR WRITTEN NOTICE CONTENT**

3025.1 Prior written notice shall include the following:

- (a) A description of the action the LEA is proposing or refusing to take;
- (b) An explanation of why the LEA proposes or refuses to take the action;
- (c) A description of each evaluation procedure, assessment, record, or report the LEA used as a basis for the proposed or refused action;
- (d) A statement that the parent of a child with a disability has protection under the procedural safeguards of the IDEA and this Chapter and, if this notice is not an initial referral for evaluation, the means by which a copy of a description of the procedural safeguards can be obtained;
- (e) Sources for the parent to contact to obtain assistance in understanding the provisions of the IDEA and this Chapter, including:
  - (1) Parent Training and Information Center established pursuant to Section 671 of IDEA (20 U.S.C. § 1471);
  - (2) Office of the Ombudsman for Public Education (D.C. Official Code § 38-351 *et seq.*); and
  - (3) Office of the Student Advocate (D.C. Official Code § 38-371 *et seq.*);
- (f) A description of other options that the IEP Team considered and the reasons why those options were rejected; and
- (g) If applicable, a description of other factors relevant to the LEA’s proposal or refusal.

NOTICE OF PROPOSED RULEMAKING

(Paid Leave Program)

The Director of the Department of Employment Services (DOES), pursuant to the authority set forth in the Universal Paid Leave Amendment Act of 2016, effective April 7, 2017 (D.C. Law 21-264; D.C. Official Code § 32-541.01 *et seq.*) (the “Act”), and Mayor’s Order 2018-036, dated March 29, 2018, hereby gives notice of the intent to amend Title 7 (Employment Benefits) of the District of Columbia Municipal Regulations (DCMR) by adding a new Chapter 34 (Paid Leave) in not less than thirty (30) days after publication of this notice in the *D.C. Register*.

If adopted, the proposed rules implement the Act by establishing the procedures necessary to administer a paid-leave program for eligible individuals employed in the District of Columbia.

**Title 7 DCMR, EMPLOYMENT BENEFITS, is amended by adding a new Chapter 34, PAID LEAVE, to read as follows:**

**CHAPTER 34 PAID LEAVE**

**3400 ELIGIBILITY FOR PAID-LEAVE BENEFITS**

3400.1 An individual shall be eligible to submit a claim for paid-leave benefits under this chapter if:

- (a) The individual experiences a qualifying family leave event, qualifying medical leave event, or qualifying parental leave event;
- (b) The individual does not perform his or her regular and customary work because of the occurrence of the qualifying family leave event, qualifying medical leave event, or qualifying parental leave event; and
- (c) The individual is:
  - (1) (A) Employed by a covered employer for some or all of the fifty-two (52) calendar weeks immediately preceding the qualifying event for which the paid-leave claim is being submitted; and
  - (B) Employed as a covered employee of a covered employer at the time of application; or



- (2) A self-employed individual who has:
  - (A) Opted into the paid-leave program as provided in this chapter; and
  - (B) Earned self-employment income for work performed more than fifty percent (50%) of the time in the District of Columbia during some or all of the fifty-two (52) calendar weeks immediately preceding the qualifying event for which paid leave is being taken.

**3401 FILING A CLAIM FOR PAID-LEAVE BENEFITS**

3401.1 An eligible individual shall submit a claim for paid-leave benefits using the online portal or in another format approved by DOES.

3401.2 When submitting a claim for paid-leave benefits, an eligible individual shall provide the following information through the online portal or in another format approved by DOES:

- (a) Proof of the individual’s identity, including the individual’s name, date of birth, and social security number;
- (b) Contact information, including the individual’s home address, telephone number, and email address;
- (c) (1) For a paid medical leave claim:
  - (A) Proof of a qualifying medical leave event, including medical documentation that provides the diagnosis or occurrence of a serious health condition; and
  - (B) The length of leave expected based on industry standards used by health care professionals to label diagnosis of medical conditions and treatments;
- (2) For a paid family leave claim:
  - (A) Proof of a qualifying family leave event, including medical documentation of the diagnosis or occurrence of a serious health condition for a family member;
  - (B) The length of leave expected based on industry standards used by health care professionals to label diagnosis of medical conditions and treatments;

- (C) Proof of a familial relationship between the family member and the eligible individual;
  - (D) An affirmation that the eligible individual will be taking the leave in order to provide care or companionship for a family member with a serious health condition; and
  - (E) A description of the care or companionship to be provided by the eligible individual to the family member;
- (3) For a paid parental leave claim:
- (A) Proof of a qualifying parental leave event; and
  - (B) Proof of a familial relationship between the child for whom paid leave is sought and the eligible individual;
- (d) The number of weeks of paid leave sought;
  - (e) Whether the paid leave will be taken continuously or intermittently;
  - (f) The name, address, telephone number, and email address of the individual’s covered employer;
  - (g) The date the individual’s employment began with the covered employer; and
  - (h) The most recent date on which the individual previously filed a claim for paid leave, if applicable.

3401.3 An eligible individual shall submit a copy of a government-issued identification to verify identity at the onset of the application process.

3401.4 For a medical leave claim, an eligible individual shall provide a form signed by the eligible individual authorizing the individual’s health care provider to provide medical and/ or additional information necessary to process the claim for paid leave.

3401.5 For a family leave claim, an eligible individual shall:

- (a) Provide a form signed by the family member authorizing the family member’s health care provider to provide additional information necessary to process the claim for paid leave; and

- (b) Provide government-issued documents, court orders, or other forms of documentation establishing a familial relationship between the eligible individual and family member.

3401.6 For a parental leave claim, an eligible individual shall submit government-issued documents, court orders, or other forms of documentation establishing a familial relationship between the eligible individual and the child for whom parental leave is sought.

3401.7 Each eligible individual applying for paid-leave benefits shall certify that the claim for paid-leave benefits and all information provided in support of the claim for paid-leave benefits are true and accurate.

### **3402 CALCULATION OF WEEKLY BENEFITS AMOUNT**

3402.1 Subject to Subsections 3302.2 and 3302.3 and Sections 3303 [Waiting Period for Benefits] and 3313 [Relation to Other Benefits], DOES shall calculate the weekly paid-leave benefits amount to which an eligible individual is entitled as follows:

- (a) The wages used to calculate the weekly benefit amount shall be limited to wages paid to the eligible employee by covered employers.
- (b) An eligible individual who earns an average weekly wage that is equal to or less than one hundred and fifty percent (150%) of the District's minimum wage multiplied by forty (40) shall be entitled to weekly paid-leave benefits equal to ninety percent (90%) of that eligible individual's average weekly wage.
- (c) An eligible individual who earns an average weekly wage that is greater than one hundred and fifty percent (150%) of the District's minimum wage multiplied by forty (40) shall be entitled to payment of weekly paid-leave benefits that shall equal:
  - (1) Ninety percent (90%) of one hundred and fifty percent (150%) of the District's minimum wage multiplied by forty (40); plus
  - (2) Fifty percent (50%) of the amount by which the eligible individual's average weekly wage exceeds one hundred and fifty percent (150%) of the District's minimum wage multiplied by forty (40).
- (d) If an eligible individual has wages from multiple covered employers (including a covered self-employer), the wages shall be combined to determine the eligible individual's average weekly wage.

(e) The benefits calculated according to this subsection, if not a multiple of one dollar (\$1.00), shall be rounded to the nearest dollar amount.

3402.2 (a) Notwithstanding Subsection 3302.1, no eligible individual shall be entitled to payment of paid-leave benefits at a rate in excess of the maximum weekly benefit amount.

(b) Before October 1, 2021, the maximum weekly benefit amount shall be one thousand dollars (\$1,000).

(c) DOES shall adjust the maximum weekly benefit amount annually, to take effect on October 1, 2021, and on October 1 of each successive year, as provided in section 104(g)(6) of the Act.

3402.3 Paid-leave benefits for partial weeks of leave shall be prorated.

**3403 WAITING PERIOD FOR BENEFITS**

3403.1 After the occurrence of a qualifying family leave event, qualifying medical leave event, or qualifying parental leave event, an eligible individual must wait one (1) week during and for which no benefits shall be payable before being entitled to receive payment of his or her paid-leave benefits; provided, that regardless of the number of qualifying events for which an eligible individual files a claim for paid-leave benefits, he or she shall only have one (1) waiting period during and for which no benefits are payable within a fifty-two (52)-week period.

**3404 LIMIT ON NUMBER OF WEEKS OF PAID LEAVE BENEFITS; INTERMITTENT USE OF PAID LEAVE; REPORTING USE OF LEAVE**

3404.1 An eligible individual may receive a maximum of:

(a) Two (2) workweeks of paid universal leave for a qualifying medical event within a fifty-two (52) workweek period;

(b) Six (6) workweeks of paid family leave within a fifty-two (52) workweek period; and

(c) Eight (8) workweeks of paid parental leave within a fifty-two (52) workweek period.

3404.2 Notwithstanding Subsection 3304.1, an eligible individual may not receive more than a maximum of eight (8) workweeks of paid leave during a fifty-two (52) workweek period, regardless of the number of qualifying leave events that occurred during the fifty-two (52) workweek period.

3404.3 An eligible individual may use paid leave intermittently or continuously.

3404.4 All intermittent leave taken pursuant to this chapter must be in one (1) day increments.

3404.5 Eligible individuals shall certify use of paid leave weekly through the online portal or through another format approved by DOES.

### **3405 ONLINE PORTAL**

3405.1 All claims for paid-leave benefits shall be submitted through the online portal or through another format approved by DOES.

3405.2 All DOES communications pursuant to this chapter shall occur through the online portal or through another format approved by DOES.

3405.3 Initial determinations shall be sent to applicants, eligible individuals, and covered employers through the online portal or through another format approved by DOES.

3405.4 All applicants, eligible individuals, and covered employers shall be responsible for maintaining current contact information in the online portal or through another format approved by DOES.

3405.5 All applicants, eligible individuals, and covered employers shall be responsible for checking the status of claims for paid leave through the online portal or through another format approved by DOES.

3405.6 All applicants, eligible individuals, health care providers, and covered employers shall be responsible for responding to any requests for additional information through the online portal or through another format approved by DOES.

### **3406 EMPLOYEE NOTICE TO EMPLOYER**

3406.1 (a) To the extent practicable, an eligible individual shall provide written notice to his or her employer of the need for the use of paid-leave benefits before taking leave.

(b) If the paid leave is foreseeable, the eligible individual shall provide the written notice at least ten (10) days, or as early as possible, in advance of the paid leave.

(c) If the paid leave is unforeseeable, the eligible individual shall provide a notification, either oral or written, before the start of the work shift for which the paid leave is being used.

- (d) In the case of an emergency that makes it impractical for an individual to provide notice before the start of the work shift for which the paid leave is being used, the eligible individual, or another individual on behalf of the eligible individual, shall notify the eligible individual's employer, either orally or in writing, within forty-eight (48) hours after the emergency occurs.

3406.2 The eligible individual's written or oral notice shall include:

- (a) A reason for the absence involved, within the parameters of the Health Insurance Portability and Accountability Act of 1996, approved August 21, 1996 (Pub. L. No. 104-191; 110 Stat. 1936);
- (b) The expected duration of the paid leave;
- (c) The expected start and end dates of the paid leave;
- (d) Whether the paid leave will be used continuously or intermittently.

### **3407 PROCESSING CLAIMS FOR PAID LEAVE**

3407.1 Within three (3) business days after the filing of a claim for paid-leave benefits, a DOES claims examiner shall:

- (a) Notify the applicant of the need to submit any additional information; and
- (b) Notify the covered employer of the filing of a claim and request from the employer proof of employment of the applicant.

3407.2 The covered employer shall submit the requested proof of employment within two (2) business days after receipt of the request from the claims examiner.

3407.3 If the covered employer fails to provide the requested proof of employment within two (2) business days, the claim for paid leave shall be processed using the available information; provided, that, if the covered employer later files proof that the eligible individual is not a covered employee of the employer, DOES may re-process the claim, taking into account the additional information.

3407.4 If an applicant or eligible individual is requested to provide additional information, the claim shall be held in abeyance until the additional information is received.

3407.5 If the claim is for paid family leave or paid medical leave, and the claims examiner determines that the applicant is an eligible individual and has provided the necessary documentation to support the paid-leave benefits sought, then the claim shall be reviewed by the claims examiner in accordance with the

International Classification of Diseases, Tenth Revision (ICD-10), or subsequent revisions by the World Health Organization to the International Classification of Diseases, along with the proof of qualifying event provided by the eligible individual to support the claim for paid leave.

3407.6 Within ten (10) days after a claim for paid leave is filed, DOES shall issue to the applicant or eligible individual an initial determination that includes:

- (a) A statement as to whether the claim for paid-leave benefits has been approved or denied;
- (b) (1) If the claim was approved:
  - (A) The weekly amount of paid-leave benefits to be paid;
  - (B) The start date for the payment of weekly paid-leave benefits;
  - (C) The number of weeks for which the eligible individual will receive the paid-leave benefits; and
  - (D) The dates on which the paid-leave benefit payments will be made by the District; or
- (2) If the claim was denied, the reason(s) for the denial; and
- (c) A description of the process to file an appeal with the Office of Administrative Hearings.

**3408 APPEALS**

3408.1 If the applicant or eligible individual disagrees with all or any part of the initial determination, the applicant or eligible individual has the right to appeal the initial determination to the Office of Administrative Hearings.

3408.2 An appeal of an initial determination shall be filed with the Office of Administrative Hearings within sixty (60) days after the date of receipt of the initial determination.

3408.3 Appeals shall be governed by the rules, policies, and procedures of the Office of Administrative Hearings.

**3409 OPT-IN OF SELF-EMPLOYED INDIVIDUALS**

- 3409.1 An individual who earns self-employment income (“self-employed individual”) may opt into the paid leave program during an open enrollment period through the online portal or through another format approved by DOES.
- 3409.2 DOES shall hold open enrollment periods:
- (a) During the first ninety (90) days after the date on which the District, pursuant to Section 103 of the Act (D.C. Official § 32-1701.03), begins to collect contributions to the Universal Paid Leave Implementation Fund;
  - (b) Beginning with calendar year 2020 and in each calendar year thereafter, during the months of November and December; and
  - (c) For each self-employed individual, during the sixty (60) days following the commencement of business in the District of Columbia by the self-employed individual.
- 3409.3 After a self-employed individual opts into the paid-leave program, DOES shall provide notice to that individual regarding the manner in which contributions to the Universal Paid Leave Implementation Fund shall be collected from the individual.
- 3409.4 A self-employed individual who opts into the paid leave program must make contributions to the Universal Paid Leave Implementation Fund for no less than three (3) consecutive years and must remain continuously enrolled in the program until such time as he or she elects to opt out unless the individual ceases to be a self-employed individual.
- 3409.5 Except in the situations specified in Section 3309.4, self-employed individual who has opted into the program may only opt out of the program during an open enrollment period.
- 3409.6 A self-employed individual who previously opted out of or withdrew from the paid leave program may re-enroll in the program; provided that:
- (a) Beginning on January 1, 2020, a self-employed individual who previously opted out of the paid-leave program shall not be eligible to receive benefits pursuant to this chapter for the first year after enrolling or reenrolling in the program; and
  - (b) If a self-employed individual opts out of the paid-leave program two (2) times, he or she shall be barred from reenrolling in the program for a period of five (5) years from the date of his or her second opt-out from the program.



3409.7 If a self-employed individual does not make a timely payment required by this chapter, DOES shall notify the individual of the payment due. If the payment due is not received by DOES within thirty (30) days of the mailing date of the notice, DOES shall disenroll the individual and the individual shall not be eligible for paid-leave benefits under this chapter. An individual who has been disenrolled may, after payment of all amounts due, opt-in to the paid leave program during an open enrollment period.

3409.8 If a self-employed individual who has opted into the paid-leave program is also a covered employee employed by a covered employer, he or she shall not be entitled to receive double payments of paid-leave benefits under this chapter. His or her paid-leave benefit payment amount shall be based on the combined wages from covered employment and self-employment.

**3410 CONTRIBUTIONS BY OPT-IN SELF-EMPLOYED INDIVIDUALS TO THE UNIVERSAL PAID LEAVE IMPLEMENTATION FUND**

3410.1 A covered employer who is a self-employed individual who has opted-in to the paid leave program shall contribute an amount equal to 0.62% of his or her annual self-employment income to the Universal Paid Leave Implementation Fund online or in another format approved by DOES.

3410.2 A covered employer who is a self-employed individual who fails to contribute any amount required by this section to the Universal Paid Leave Implementation Fund shall be subject to the same notice requirements, procedures, interest, penalties, and remedies set forth in section 4 of the District of Columbia Unemployment Compensation Act, approved August 28, 1935 (49 Stat. 948; D.C. Official Code § 51-104).

3410.3 All interest collected pursuant to Subsection 3310.2 shall be deposited into the Universal Paid Leave Implementation Fund.

**3411 CONTRIBUTIONS BY COVERED EMPLOYERS TO THE UNIVERSAL PAID LEAVE IMPLEMENTATION FUND**

3411.1 A covered employer shall contribute an amount equal to 0.62% of the wages of each of its covered employees to the Universal Paid Leave Implementation Fund online or in another format approved by DOES.

3411.2 A covered employer shall make contributions under Subsection 3311 even if the covered employer provides additional leave benefits to their employees.

3411.3 A covered employer who fails to contribute any amount required by this section to the Universal Paid Leave Implementation Fund shall be subject to the same notice requirements, procedures, interest, penalties, and remedies set forth in

section 4 of the District of Columbia Unemployment Compensation Act, approved August 28, 1935 (49 Stat. 948; D.C. Official Code § 51-104).

3411.4 All interest collected pursuant to Subsection 3311.3 shall be deposited into the Universal Paid Leave Implementation Fund.

### **3412 EMPLOYER NOTICE TO EMPLOYEE**

3412.1 Each covered employer shall post and maintain a paid leave program notice promulgated by DOES, in a conspicuous place at each worksite that is accessible by its employees.

3412.2 Each covered employer shall also provide the paid leave program notice to employees at the following times:

- (a) To an individual employee, at the time of the employee's hiring;
- (b) Annually to all employees; and
- (c) To an individual employee, at the time the covered employer is aware that paid leave is needed by the employee.

3412.3 A covered employer who violates this notice requirement shall be assessed a civil penalty not to exceed one hundred dollars (\$100) for each covered employee to whom individual notice was not delivered and one hundred dollars (\$100) for each day that the covered employer fails to post the notice in a conspicuous place at each worksite.

### **3413 RECORD KEEPING**

3413.1 All covered employers shall develop, maintain, and make available to DOES records regarding the employer's activities related to the Act, including paystubs, personal checks, cash receipts, or bank deposits; work schedules; communications between employer and employee; any circumstantial evidence regarding the employee's eligibility; and any other record as requested by DOES.

### **3414 RELATIONSHIP TO OTHER BENEFITS**

3414.1 If paid leave taken pursuant to this chapter also qualifies as protected leave pursuant to the Family and Medical Leave Act of 1993, approved February 5, 1993 (107 Stat. 6; 29 U.S.C. § 2601 *et seq.*), or the D.C. FMLA, the paid leave shall run concurrently with, and not in addition to, leave taken under those other acts.

3414.2 Nothing in this chapter shall be construed to provide job protection to any eligible individual beyond that to which an individual is entitled under the D.C. FMLA.

3414.3 An eligible individual receiving benefits pursuant to the District of Columbia Unemployment Compensation Amendment Act, effective August 28, 1935 (49 Stat. 946; D.C. Official Code § 51-101 *et seq.*), shall not be eligible to receive paid-leave benefits under this chapter.

3414.4 An eligible individual receiving long-term disability payments shall not be eligible to receive paid-leave benefits under this chapter.

3414.5 An eligible individual receiving short-term disability payments shall be eligible to receive paid-leave benefits under this chapter.

### **3415 ERRONEOUS PAYMENTS AND DISQUALIFICATION FOR BENEFITS**

3415.1 It is unlawful for any applicant or eligible individual to provide intentionally false statements to obtain paid-leave benefits.

3415.2 An individual who intentionally makes a false statement or misrepresentation regarding a material fact, or who intentionally fails to report a material fact, to obtain paid-leave benefits shall be disqualified from receiving paid-leave benefits for a period of three (3) years.

3415.3 If paid-leave benefits are paid erroneously or as a result of willful misrepresentation, or if a claim for paid-leave benefits is rejected after benefits are paid, DOES shall seek repayment of benefits from the eligible individual; provided, that the Director may waive, in whole or in part, the amount of any such payments when the recovery would be against equity and good conscience.

3415.4 (a) If DOES obtains repayment of benefits from an individual who has made a willful misrepresentation or otherwise perpetrated fraud to obtain paid-leave benefits, DOES shall distribute a proportional share of the recovered amount to each covered employer who paid into the Universal Paid Leave Implementation Fund on behalf of that individual during the period that he or she improperly obtained paid-leave benefits.

(b) For the purposes of paragraph (a) of this subsection, a covered employer's proportional share of the recovered amount shall be equal to the amount paid into the Universal Paid Leave Implementation Fund by that covered employer on behalf of the individual during the period that he or she improperly obtained benefits, expressed as a percentage of the total amount paid into the Universal Paid Leave Implementation Fund by all covered employers on behalf of the individual during the period that he or she improperly obtained benefits.

**3416 COMPLAINTS**

3416.1 A complaint alleging a violation of this chapter or the Act, other than a complaint regarding a claim determination (which shall be filed as an appeal as provided in section 108 of the Act), shall be filed with the Office of Human Rights and shall be governed by the administrative enforcement procedure used for the D.C. FMLA.

3416.2 All complaints shall be filed within one (1) year after the occurrence or discovery of the alleged violation, whichever is later.

**3499 DEFINITIONS – As used in this chapter –**

“**Act**” – means the Universal Paid Leave Amendment Act of 2016, effective April 7, 2017 (D.C. Law 21-264; D.C. Official Code § 32-541.01 *et seq.*), as amended.

“**Average weekly wage**” – means the total wages subject to contribution under section 103 of the Act earned by the applicant or eligible individual during the base period, divided by fifty-two (52).

“**Base period**” – means the four (4) out of the five (5) quarters immediately preceding the qualifying event during which the applicant or eligible individual’s wages were highest.

“**Bonding**” – means the formation of a close emotional and psychological relationship between a parent or primary caregiver and an infant or child.

“**Covered employee**” – means an employee of a covered employer:

- (a) Who spends more than fifty percent (50%) of his or her work time for that employer working in the District of Columbia; or
- (b) Whose employment for the covered employer is based in the District of Columbia and who regularly spends a substantial amount of his or her work time for that covered employer in the District of Columbia and not more than fifty percent (50%) of his or her work time for that covered employer in another jurisdiction.

“**Covered employer**” – means:

- (a) Any individual, partnership, general contractor, subcontractor, association, corporation, business trust, or any group of persons who directly or indirectly or through an agent or any other person, including through the services of a temporary services or staffing agency or similar entity, employs or exercises control over the wages, hours, or working conditions of an employee and is required to pay unemployment insurance on behalf

of its employees by section 3 of the District of Columbia Unemployment Compensation Act, approved August 28, 1935 (49 Stat. 947; D.C. Official Code § 51-103); provided, that the term “covered employer” shall not include the United States, the District of Columbia, or any employer that the District of Columbia is not authorized to tax under federal law or treaty; or

- (b) A self-employed individual who has opted into the paid-leave program established pursuant to this chapter.

“**D.C. FMLA**” – means the District of Columbia Family and Medical Leave Act of 1990, effective October 3, 1990 (D.C. Law 8-181; D.C. Official Code § 32-501 *et seq.*)

“**Director**” – means the director of DOES.

“**DOES**” – means the Department of Employment Services.

“**Eligible individual**” – means a person whose claim for paid-leave benefits is not based on employment for the United States, the District of Columbia, or an employer that the District of Columbia is not authorized to tax under federal law or treaty, who meets the requirements of the Act and this chapter and:

- (a) Has been a covered employee during some or all of the fifty-two (52) calendar weeks immediately preceding the qualifying event for which paid leave is being taken; or
- (b) Is a self-employed individual who has:
  - (1) Opted into the paid-leave program established pursuant to this chapter; and
  - (2) Earned self-employment income for work performed more than fifty percent (50%) of the time in the District of Columbia during some or all of the fifty-two (52) calendar weeks immediately preceding the qualifying event for which paid leave is being taken.

“**Family member**” – means:

- (a) A biological, adopted, or foster son or daughter, a stepson or stepdaughter, a legal ward, a son or daughter of a domestic partner, or a person to whom an eligible individual stands in loco parentis;
- (b) A biological, foster, or adoptive parent, a parent-in-law, a stepparent, a legal guardian, or other person who stood in loco parentis to an eligible individual when the eligible individual was a child;

- (c) A person to whom an eligible individual is related by domestic partnership, as defined by section 2(4) of the Health Care Benefits Expansion Act of 1992, effective June 11, 1992 (D.C. Law 9-114; D.C. Official Code § 32-701(4)), or marriage;
- (d) A grandparent of an eligible individual; or
- (e) A sibling of an eligible individual.

“**Health care provider**” shall have the same meaning as provided in section 2(5) of the D.C. FMLA (D.C. Official Code § 2-501(5)).

“**Intermittent leave**” – means paid leave taken in increments of no less than one (1) day, rather than for one (1) continuous period of time.

“**Online portal**” – means the user-friendly system for the submission and management of forms and documents necessary to administer the paid-leave program.

“**Open enrollment period**” – means the periods of time described in subsection 101(10) of the Act (D.C. Official Code § 31-3301.01(10)).

“**Paid-leave benefits**” – means the monetary benefits provided pursuant to this chapter.

“**Protected activity**” includes:

- (a) Filing or attempting to file a charge pursuant to or related to the Act;
- (b) Instituting or attempting to institute a proceeding pursuant to or related to the Act;
- (c) Facilitating the institution of a proceeding pursuant to or related to the Act;
- (d) Requesting, applying for or using paid-leave benefits pursuant to or related to the Act;
- (e) Giving any information or testimony in connection with an inquiry or proceeding related to the Act;
- (f) Opposing any practice made unlawful by the Act.

“**Qualifying family leave**” – means paid leave for up to a maximum amount of six (6) workweeks within a fifty-two (52)-workweek period, regardless of

calendar year, that an eligible individual may take in order to provide care or companionship to a family member because of the occurrence of a qualifying family leave event.

**“Qualifying family leave event”** – means the diagnosis or occurrence of a serious health condition of a family member of an eligible individual.

**“Qualifying medical leave”** – means paid leave for up to a maximum of two (2) workweeks within a fifty-two (52)-workweek period, regardless of calendar year, that an eligible individual may take following the occurrence of a qualifying medical leave event.

**“Qualifying medical leave event”** – means the diagnosis or occurrence of a serious health condition of an eligible individual.

**“Qualifying parental leave”** – means paid leave for up to a maximum of eight (8) workweeks within a fifty-two (52)-workweek period, regardless of calendar year, that an eligible individual may take within one year of the occurrence of a qualifying parental leave event.

**“Qualifying parental leave event”** – means events, including bonding, associated with:

- (a) The birth of a child of an eligible individual;
- (b) The placement of a child with an eligible individual for adoption or foster care; or
- (c) The placement of a child with an eligible individual for whom the eligible individual legally assumes and discharges parental responsibility.

**“Retaliate”** – means to:

- (a) Commit any form of intimidation, threat, reprisal, harassment, discrimination, or adverse employment action, including discipline, discharge, suspension, transfer or assignment to a lesser position in terms of job classification, job security, or other condition of employment;
- (b) Reduce pay or hours or deny an individual additional hours;
- (c) Inform another employer that the person has engaged in activities protected by the Act or this chapter; or
- (d) Report, or threaten to report, the actual or suspected citizenship or immigration status of an employee, former employee, or family member of an employee or former employee, to a federal, state, or local agency.

**“Self-employment income”** – means gross income earned from carrying on a trade or business as a sole proprietor, an independent contractor, or a member of a partnership.

**“Serious health condition”** – means a physical or mental illness, injury, or impairment that requires inpatient care in a hospital, hospice, or residential health care facility, or continuing treatment or supervision at home by a health care provider or other competent individual. For the purposes of this definition:

- (a)
  - (1) The term “treatment” includes, but is not limited to, examinations to determine if a serious health condition exists and evaluations of the condition.
  - (2) Treatment does not include routine physical examinations, eye examinations, or dental examinations.
  - (3) A regimen of continuing treatment such as the taking of over-the-counter medications, bed rest, or similar activities that can be initiated without a visit to a health care provider is not, by itself, sufficient to constitute continuing treatment for the purposes of this chapter.
- (b) The term “inpatient care” is the care of a patient in a hospital, hospice, or residential medical care facility for the duration of one overnight period or longer or any subsequent treatment in connection with such inpatient care.
- (c) The term “incapacity” means inability to work, attend school, or perform other regular daily activities due to the serious health condition, treatment of the serious health condition, or recovery from the serious health condition.
- (d) Conditions for which cosmetic treatments are administered are not serious health conditions; provided, that procedures related to an individual’s gender transition or restorative surgery following surgery or treatments for diseases or injury shall not be considered cosmetic treatments for the purposes of this subparagraph.
- (e) A serious health condition involving continuing treatment by a health care provider means any one or more of the following:
  - (1) A period of incapacity of more than three (3) consecutive, full calendar days, and any subsequent treatment or period of incapacity relating to the same condition that also involves:



- (A) Treatment of two (2) or more times within thirty (30) days of the first day of incapacity, unless extenuating circumstances exist, by a health care provider, by a nurse under direct supervision of a health care provider, or by a provider of health care services under orders of, or on referral by, a health care provider. For the purposes of this sub-subparagraph, “extenuating circumstances” means circumstances beyond an individual’s control that prevent the follow-up visit from occurring as planned by the health care provider;
  - (B) The first, or only, in-person treatment visit within ten (10) days after the first day of incapacity if extenuating circumstances exist; or
  - (C) Treatment by a health care provider on at least one (1) occasion, which results in a regimen of continuing treatment under the supervision of the health care provider;
- (2) Any period of incapacity or treatment for such incapacity due to a chronic serious health condition. A chronic serious health condition is one which:
- (A) Requires two (2) or more periodic visits annually for treatment by a health care provider or by a nurse under direct supervision of a health care provider;
  - (B) Continues over an extended period of time, which shall include recurring episodes of a single underlying condition; and
  - (C) May cause episodic rather than a continuing period of incapacity;
- (3) A period of incapacity that is permanent or long-term due to a condition for which treatment may not be effective. The family member of an eligible individual must be under continuing supervision of, but need not be receiving active treatment by, a health care provider; or
- (f) Any period of absence to receive multiple treatments (including any period of recovery from the treatments) by a health care provider or by a provider of health care services under orders of, or on referral by, a health care provider, for:
- (A) Restorative surgery after an accident or other injury; or

- (B) A condition that would likely result in a period of incapacity of more than three (3) consecutive, full calendar days in the absence of medical intervention or treatment.

“**Universal Paid Leave Implementation Fund**” means the Universal Paid Leave Implementation Fund established by section 1152 of the Universal Paid Leave Implementation Fund Act of 2016, effective October 8, 2016 (D.C. Law 21-160; 63 DCR 10775).

“**Wages**” shall have the same meaning as provided in section 1(3) of the District of Columbia Unemployment Compensation Act, approved August 28, 1935 (49 Stat. 946; D.C. Official Code § 51-101(3)); provided, that the term “wages” also includes self-employment income earned by a self-employed individual who has opted into the paid-leave program established pursuant to this chapter.

NOTICE OF PROPOSED RULEMAKING**Anacostia River Special Swimming Events**

The Director of the Department of Energy and Environment pursuant to the authority set forth in the District Department of the Environment Establishment Act of 2005, effective February 15, 2006 (D.C. Law 16-51; D.C. Official Code §§ 8-151.01 *et seq.* (2013 Repl. and 2017 Supp.)), the Water Pollution Control Act of 1984, effective March 16, 1985 (D.C. Law 5-188; D.C. Official Code §§ 8-103.01 *et seq.* (2013 Repl.)), and Mayor's Order 2006-61, dated June 14, 2006, hereby gives notice of a rulemaking action to amend Title 21 (Water and Sanitation), Chapter 11 (Water Quality Standards) of the District of Columbia Municipal Regulations (DCMR).

The purpose of this rulemaking is to allow for exceptions to the prohibition of swimming in the District's portion of the Anacostia River. If granted, exceptions would authorize qualifying swimming events for limited amounts of time if monitoring data demonstrates that the water quality does not pose a threat to human health. The District had previously created this exception for the Potomac River. These rules will be proposed for adoption as final no sooner than thirty (30) days after this publication and will become effective immediately on the date of final publication.

DOEE is proposing this rulemaking in anticipation of water quality improvements that are expected upon completion of the DC Water's deep tunnel and sewer diversion facilities that will capture combined sewer overflows and deliver them to DC Water's Blue Plains Advanced Wastewater Treatment Plant.

**Chapter 11, WATER QUALITY STANDARDS, of Title 21 DCMR, WATER AND SANITATION, is amended as follows:**

**Section 1108, RIVERS, is amended as follows:**

**Subsections 1108.2 and 1108.7 are amended by substituting the following:**

1108.2 The Director may issue a decision that allows a special swimming event in the Potomac or Anacostia River, if:

- (a) A study conducted by the special swimming event organizer shows that the numeric criteria for Class A listed in §1104.8 are being attained; and
- (b) The other provisions of this section have been satisfied.

1108.7 The Director shall deny permission to swim in the Potomac or Anacostia River if the results of the study or the Director's independent investigation indicate:

- (a) The water quality standards are not being attained;

- (b) An emergency health hazard caused by a hazardous pollutant or condition has occurred; or
- (c) There may be a health risk from a known pollution source, including:
  - (1) Combined sewer overflow;
  - (2) Failing sewer infrastructure;
  - (3) Chemical release; or
  - (4) Wastewater treatment discharge.

All persons desiring to comment on the proposed amendments to allow limited swimming in the Anacostia should file comments in writing not later than thirty (30) days after the publication of this notice in the *D.C. Register*. NOTICE OF PROPOSED RULEMAKING

The Director of the Department of Health (Department), pursuant to the District of Columbia Health Occupations Revision Act of 1985, effective March 25, 1986 (D.C. Law 6-99; D.C. Official Code § 3-1203.02(14)) (2016 Repl.), Mayor's Order 98-140, dated August 20, 1998, and the LGBTQ Cultural Competency Continuing Education Amendment Act of 2016, effective April 6, 2016 (D.C. Law 21-0095; 63 DCR 6502, published on April 29, 2016), hereby gives notice of the intent to take final rulemaking action to amend Chapter 42 (Dentistry) of Title 17 (Business, Occupations, and Professionals) of the District of Columbia Municipal Regulations (DCMR), in not less than thirty (30) days from the date of publication of this notice in the *D.C. Register*.

The purpose of this rulemaking is to amend to require dentists to complete the following new continuing education requirements beginning with the renewal period ending December 31, 2019: (2) hours of continuing education focusing on clients who identify as lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender, gender nonconforming, queer, (“LGBTQ”) or who question their sexual orientation or gender identity and expression, and two (2) hours of approved continuing education focusing on ethics. This rulemaking also increases the total number of continuing education hours required from twenty-five (25) to thirty (30), decreases the number of required continuing education hours in infection control from four (4) hours to two (2) hours, and requires persons authorized to prescribe controlled substances in the District to complete two (2) hours of continuing education focusing on the abuse and misuse of controlled substances, and opioid prescription practices.

**Chapter 42, DENTISTRY, of Title 17 DCMR, BUSINESS, OCCUPATIONS, AND PROFESSIONALS, is amended as follows:**

**Section 4206, CONTINUING EDUCATION REQUIREMENTS, is amended as follows:**

**Subsections 4206.4 and 4206.5 are amended to read as follows:**

4206.4 Beginning with the renewal period ending December 31, 2019, an applicant for renewal of a license shall submit proof pursuant to § 4206.9 of having completed thirty (30) hours of credit within the two-year (2) period preceding the date the license expires, which shall include at least:

- (a) Current cardiopulmonary resuscitation certification for health care providers (“CPR certification”);
- (b) Two (2) hours of infection control in approved continuing education programs;
- (c) Two (2) hours of ethics in approved continuing education programs; and

- (d) Two (2) hours of continuing education on cultural competency or specialized clinical training focusing on patients or clients who identify as lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender, gender nonconforming, queer, or question their sexual orientation or gender identity and expression (“LGBTQ”) meeting the requirements of D.C. Official Code § 3-1205.10 (b)(5).

4206.5 Each applicant for renewal, reactivation, or reinstatement of a license who is permitted by the Drug Enforcement Agency and the District of Columbia Pharmaceutical Control Division to prescribe controlled substances in the District shall complete two (2) hours of continuing education in the abuse and misuse of controlled substances, and in opioid prescription practices. This continuing education shall be as part of the continuing education hours required under subsection 4206.4 of this chapter.

**Subsections 4206.7 – 4206.8 are amended to read as follows:**

4206.7 Beginning with the licensure period ending December 31, 2019, to qualify for a license, a person in inactive status within the meaning of § 511 of the Act, D.C. Official Code § 3-1205.11 (2016 Repl.) who submits an application to reactivate a license shall submit proof pursuant to § 4206.9 of having completed thirty (30) hours of approved continuing education credit obtained within the two (2) year period preceding the date of the application for reactivation of that applicant’s license and an additional fifteen (15) hours of approved continuing education credit for each additional year that the applicant was inactive status beginning with the third year, which shall include at least:

- (a) Current cardiopulmonary resuscitation certification for health care providers (“CPR certification”);
- (b) Two (2) hours of infection control in approved continuing education programs;
- (c) Two (2) hours of ethics in approved continuing education programs; and
- (d) Two (2) hours of continuing education on cultural competency or specialized clinical training focusing on patients or clients who identify as lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender, gender nonconforming, queer, or question their sexual orientation or gender identity and expression (“LGBTQ”) meeting the requirements of D.C. Official Code § 3-1205.10 (b)(5).

4206.8 Beginning with the licensure period ending December 31, 2019, to qualify for a license, an applicant for reinstatement of a license shall submit proof pursuant to § 4206.9 of having completed thirty (30) hours of approved continuing education credit obtained within the two (2) year period preceding the date of the application for reinstatement of the applicant’s license and an additional fifteen (15) hours of approved continuing education credit for each additional year that the license was expired beginning with the third year, which shall include at least:

- (a) Current cardiopulmonary resuscitation certification for health care providers (“CPR certification”);
- (b) Two (2) hours of infection control in approved continuing education programs;
- (c) Two (2) hours of ethics in approved continuing education programs; and
- (d) Two (2) hours of continuing education on cultural competency or specialized clinical training focusing on patients or clients who identify as lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender, gender nonconforming, queer, or question their sexual orientation or gender identity and expression (“LGBTQ”) meeting the requirements of D.C. Official Code § 3-1205.10 (b)(5).

**Section 4207, APPROVED CONTINUING EDUCATION PROGRAMS AND ACTIVITIES, is amended as follows:**

**The existing subsections 4207.4 through 4207.6 are renumbered as 4207.5 through 4207.7.**

**A new subsection 4207.4 is added to read as follows:**

- 4207.4 Continuing education credit will not be awarded for programs that do not relate to the theory or clinical application of theory pertaining to the practice of dentistry including but not limited to:
- (a) Courses pertaining to business communications and operations;
  - (b) Courses solely pertaining to medical/dental coding terminology;
  - (c) Courses pertaining to personal self-improvement, financial gain, or career options;
  - (d) Courses designed for lay persons;
  - (e) Providing instruction to persons who are not licensed, registered, certified, or students in the field of dentistry, dental hygiene, or dental assisting, or for conducting research, or publications, or any preparation for same;
  - (f) On-the-job training;
  - (g) Orientation programs or staff meetings, including orientation to new policies, non-therapeutic procedures, equipment, forms, responsibilities, services, etc;
  - (h) Presentations made by students; or

- (i) Participation in or attendance at, not as a presenter, case conferences, grand rounds, or informal presentations.

NOTICE OF EMERGENCY AND PROPOSED RULEMAKING**Wildlife Rehabilitation**

The Director of the Department of Energy and Environment, pursuant to the authority set forth in Section 107 of the District Department of the Environment Establishment Act of 2005, effective February 15, 2006 (D.C. Law 16-51; D.C. Official Code § 8-151.07 (2013 Repl. & 2017 Supp.)); Sections 6 and 12 of the Wildlife Protection Act of 2010, effective March 8, 2011 (D.C. Law 18-289; D.C. Official Code §§ 8-2205 and 8-2211 (2013 Repl. and 2017 Supp.)); Mayor’s Order 2014-123, dated May 27, 2014; and Section 6(c) of the District of Columbia Administrative Procedure Act, approved October 21, 1968 (82 Stat. 1206; D.C. Official Code § 2-505(c) (2016 Repl.)), hereby gives notice of the adoption on an emergency basis of rules to amend Chapter 15 (Fish and Wildlife) of Title 19 (Amusements, Parks, and Recreation) of the District of Columbia Municipal Regulations (DCMR).

The purpose of this rulemaking is to establish requirements and fees for the licensing of individuals performing wildlife rehabilitation activities and their apprentices, to create qualifications and conditions for licensure and registration, to require the compilation of service records and annual reporting of wildlife rehabilitation services, and to create standards for suspension of licensure and registration. These provisions are similar to those in Maryland and Virginia, and to those of the Federal Fish and Wildlife Service. The rules are also amended to establish fines and penalties for violations of requirements applicable to wildlife rehabilitators and apprentices, wildlife control operators, and wildlife service providers.

Maintaining the current level of wildlife rehabilitation services in the District is necessary for the immediate preservation of public health, safety, and welfare. Under Federal and District law, only licensed individuals can rehabilitate wildlife. Currently, the District does not have a licensing program for individuals providing wildlife rehabilitation services. Instead, the majority of wildlife rehabilitators offering services in the District are licensed by Maryland or Virginia. Maryland has indicated that it will no longer license individuals who exclusively practice in the District, which may decrease the number of licensed wildlife rehabilitators practicing in the District. Emergency rules concerning the licensing of the wildlife rehabilitators are necessary until final rules are adopted. This emergency rule was adopted on April 6, 2018 and became effective on that date.

The Department hereby gives notice of the intent to take final rulemaking action to adopt these proposed rules in not less than thirty (30) days after the publication of this notice of proposed rulemaking in the *D.C. Register*. Directions for submitting comments may be found at the end of this notice.

This emergency rule will remain in effect for up to one hundred twenty (120) days, unless earlier superseded by a notice of final rulemaking.

**Chapter 15, FISH AND WILDLIFE, of Title 19 DCMR, AMUSEMENTS, PARKS, AND RECREATION, is amended as follows:**

**A new Section 1565, WILDLIFE PROTECTION: WILDLIFE REHABILITATION LICENSING AND FEES, is added to read as follows:**

**1565 WILDLIFE PROTECTION: WILDLIFE REHABILITATION LICENSING AND FEES**

1565.1 No person shall engage in wildlife rehabilitation without a license from the Department.

1565.2 To obtain a wildlife rehabilitation license, an applicant shall:

- (a) Be at least eighteen (18) years of age;
- (b) Present a valid District or state-issued ID;
- (c) Certify that he or she has not been convicted of an offense relating to wildlife or animal cruelty;
- (d) Demonstrate reasonable experience and skill in handling and caring for wild animals by providing documentation of one of the following:
  - (i) Two hundred (200) hours of experience as a wildlife rehabilitation apprentice physically caring for wild animals in each of the four seasons and over the course of two or more years;
  - (ii) A degree in veterinary medicine, veterinary technology, or animal science; or
  - (iii) A valid wildlife rehabilitation licenses or permit issued by another state;
- (e) Complete one hundred (100) hours of documented hands on experience with wildlife within the last year;
- (f) Complete twelve (12) hours of continuing education classes or research approved by the Department;
- (g) Be a member in good standing of a nationally recognized rehabilitation association and agree to maintain membership; and
- (h) Pay a fifty dollar (\$50) fee.

1565.3 A veterinarian that is licensed in the District may provide medical care to sick, injured, or debilitated wildlife.

- 1565.4 A veterinarian that is licensed in the District may hold wildlife in their care until the animal is medically stable and can be transferred to a licensed wildlife rehabilitator.
- 1565.5 A wildlife rehabilitator must possess a Federal Rehabilitation permit issued by the United States Fish and Wildlife Service pursuant to 50 C.F.R. 21.31, prior to rehabilitating migratory birds or waterfowl.
- 1565.6 A wildlife rehabilitator license is valid for two (2) years from the date of issue.
- 1565.7 A wildlife rehabilitation license may be renewed if a wildlife rehabilitator has:
- (a) Satisfied all recordkeeping requirements for the previous two (2) years;
  - (b) Completed twelve (12) hours of continuing education classes or research approved by the Department within the last two years;
  - (c) Completed one hundred (100) hours of documented hands on experience with wildlife within the last year; and
  - (d) Paid a fifty dollar (\$50) fee.
- 1565.8 To obtain a wildlife rehabilitation apprentice license, an applicant shall:
- (a) Be at least eighteen (18) years of age;
  - (b) Present a valid District or state-issued ID;
  - (c) Certify that he or she has not been convicted of an offense involving wildlife or animal cruelty;
  - (d) Take a course and pass a test designed by the International Wildlife Rehabilitation Council or another organization approved by the Department;
  - (e) Work under the supervision of a licensed wildlife rehabilitator for the treatment and care of animals being rehabilitated; and
  - (f) Work in an animal facility licensed by the Department of Health.

**A new Section 1566, WILDLIFE PROTECTION: WILDLIFE REHABILITATION RECORD KEEPING AND REPORTING, is added to read as follows:**

**1566 WILDLIFE PROTECTION: WILDLIFE REHABILITATION RECORD KEEPING AND REPORTING**

- 1566.1 A wildlife rehabilitator shall maintain records of all wildlife rehabilitation activities for each wild animal in his or her care, including the:
- (a) Species;
  - (b) Date of admission;
  - (c) Location of collection;
  - (d) Reason for admission;
  - (e) All medications administered, treatments, and/or procedures performed; and
  - (f) Final disposition of the animal, including date and location of release.
- 1566.2 On or before January 15 of each year, a wildlife rehabilitator shall submit a copy of their wildlife rehabilitation activities for the preceding calendar year to the Department.

**A new Section 1567, WILDLIFE PROTECTION: CARE IN REHABILITATION, is added to read as follows:**

**1567 WILDLIFE PROTECTION: CARE IN REHABILITATION**

- 1567.1 A wildlife rehabilitator must care for wildlife in an animal facility that is licensed with the Department of Health.
- 1567.2 A wildlife rehabilitator may capture, receive, possess, transport, and transfer a wild animal only to rehabilitate it for ultimate release in the wild.
- 1567.3 A wildlife rehabilitator may only temporarily house an animal in order to provide the necessary treatment required to prepare an animal for release.
- 1567.4 Rehabilitated animals may not be transported across state lines to be released or for any other purpose without the permission of the Department and written permission from the receiving jurisdiction.
- 1567.5 Animals that cannot be rehabilitated in the District may be transported across state lines for rehabilitation purposes with the permission of the District and the written permission from the receiving jurisdiction.

- 1567.6 No wildlife shall be released without written permission from the landowner of the property on to which the wildlife is released.
- 1567.7 When possible, all wildlife shall be returned to the area from where they were taken or captured.
- 1567.8 A wildlife rehabilitator may provide rehabilitation for a rabies vector only if he or she has current pre-exposure immunization against the rabies virus.
- 1567.9 A wildlife rehabilitator caring for a rabies vector species shall ensure that non-immunized persons are not exposed to rabies vector species and that rabies vector species are kept separate from non-rabies vector species.
- 1567.10 A rabies vector that bites a human or domestic animal shall be quarantined and not released until it is determined by the Department of Health whether testing is necessary.
- 1567.11 Any wildlife in the care of a wildlife rehabilitator that is suspected of being infected with a zoonotic disease shall be quarantined and receive treatment based upon the advice of a licensed veterinarian.
- 1567.12 When wildlife rehabilitation is not possible, a wildlife rehabilitator shall euthanize wildlife using methods that conform to the American Veterinary Medical Association Guidelines for the Euthanasia of Animals: 2013 (AVMA Report).
- 1567.13 Wildlife that dies while in the care of a wildlife rehabilitator must be disposed of in accordance with the conditions of the Animal Facility License and shall be buried, incinerated, rendered, or turned over to an individual or institution that holds a valid scientific collection permit, or in the case of a migratory bird, a federal salvage permit.
- 1567.14 Wildlife, whether live or dead, or any parts of the wildlife may not be sold, bartered, or given away except as prescribed in § 1567.13
- 1567.15 A wildlife rehabilitator or apprentice who is not a licensed veterinarian shall not charge a fee for service, including fees for the pick-up or delivery of sick, injured, or orphaned wildlife.

**Section 1578, WILDLIFE PROTECTION: DENIAL, SUSPENSION, MODIFICATION, OR REVOCATION OF A LICENSE OR REGISTRATION, is amended as follows:**

**Subsection 1578.1(c) is amended to read as follows:**

- (c) Violated or threatened violation of law, the rules set forth in §§ 1565 to 1577, or the terms and conditions of the license or registration;

**Section 1579, WILDLIFE PROTECTION: ENFORCEMENT AND PENALTIES, is amended as follows:**

**Subsection 1579.1 is amended to read as follows:**

1579.1 The Mayor may bring an action in the Superior Court of the District of Columbia to enjoin the violation or threatened violation of §§ 1565-1577.

**New Subsections 1579.2 and 1579.3 are added as follows:**

1579.2 Civil fines, penalties, and fees may be imposed as alternative sanctions for an infraction of §§ 1565-1577, pursuant to titles I-III of the Department of Consumer and Regulatory Affairs Civil Infractions Act of 1985 (D.C. Official Code § 2-1801, *et seq.* (2016 Repl.)). Adjudications of any infraction of §§ 1565-1577 will be pursuant to titles I-III of the Department of Consumer and Regulatory Affairs Civil Infractions Act of 1985.

1579.3 Except when otherwise provided by statute, a person violating a provision of §§ 1565-1577 shall be fined according to the schedule set forth in Title 16 of the District of Columbia Municipal Regulations.

**Section 1599, DEFINITIONS, is amended as follows:**

**By adding a definition for “Animal facility” as follows:**

**Animal facility** – fixed or mobile establishment, veterinary hospital, or premises wherein the practice of veterinary medicine or any part thereof is performed.

**By adding a definition for “Continuing education class” as follows:**

**Continuing education class** – a class from an accredited organization designed for license holders that is developed to keep license holders up to date on topics relevant to their field or profession

**By adding a definition for “Rabies vector” as follows:**

**Rabies vector** – mammals that have a higher risk for rabies, such as raccoons, foxes, and bats.

**By adding a definition for “Veterinarian” as follows:**

**Veterinarian** – a person licensed to practice veterinary medicine in accordance with Chapter 28 of Title 17 DCMR.

**By adding a definition for “Wildlife rehabilitation” as follows:**

**Wildlife rehabilitation** – the treatment and care of sick, injured, debilitated, or abandoned wildlife with the goal of returning wildlife as quickly as possible to their natural habitat in the wild.

**By adding a definition for “Wildlife rehabilitator” as follows:**

**Wildlife rehabilitator** – a person who provides treatment and care to wildlife that is sick, injured, debilitated or abandoned.

**By adding a definition for “Wildlife rehabilitator apprentice” as follows:**

**Wildlife rehabilitator apprentice** – a person who works under the guidance of a licensed wildlife rehabilitator to gain the experience required to earn a wildlife rehabilitator license.

**By adding a definition for “Zoonosis” as follows:**

**Zoonosis** – any disease or infection that is naturally transmissible from vertebrate animals to humans.

## DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH CARE FINANCE

**NOTICE OF EMERGENCY AND PROPOSED RULEMAKING**

The Director of the Department of Health Care Finance (DHCF), pursuant to the authority set forth in An Act to enable the District of Columbia (District) to receive federal financial assistance under Title XIX of the Social Security Act for a medical assistance program, and for other purposes, approved December 27, 1967 (81 Stat.744; D.C. Official Code § 1-307.02 (2016 Repl. & 2017 Supp.)) and Department of Health Care Finance Establishment Act of 2007, effective February 27, 2008 (D.C. Law 17-109; D.C. Official Code § 7-771.05(6)) (2013 Repl.)), hereby gives notice of the adoption, on an emergency basis, of an amendment to Section 5213 (Reimbursement), of Chapter 52 (Medicaid Reimbursement for Mental Health Rehabilitative Services) of Title 29 (Public Welfare) of the District of Columbia Municipal Regulations (DCMR).

The purpose of these emergency and proposed rules is to increase the per unit reimbursement rate for the Crisis/Emergency service codes H2011 and H2011HK. The Crisis/Emergency service codes H2011 and H2011HK represent authorized services under the Mental Health Rehabilitation Services (MHRS) section of the District Medicaid State Plan. The MHRS benefit is administered on behalf of DHCF by the District Department of Behavioral Health. Based on the findings of a DHCF rate study, DHCF's current payment rate is below current operating costs and below other states' average rate. To redress the shortfall of MHRS providers screened and enrolled as District Medicaid providers, DHCF is proposing to increase the H2011 code per unit reimbursement rate from thirty-six dollars and ninety-three cents (\$36.93) to fifty-nine dollars and eighteen cents (\$59.18) for services provided to beneficiaries other than the deaf or hard of hearing; and to increase the H2011HK code per unit reimbursement rate from forty-nine dollars and eighty-five cents (\$49.85) to fifty-nine dollars and eighteen cents (\$59.18) for services provided to beneficiaries who are deaf or hard of hearing.

These emergency and proposed rules also establish authority for DHCF to reimburse MHRS providers in accordance with the rates set forth in the District of Columbia Medicaid fee schedule. Effective May 1, 2018, updates to MHRS reimbursement rates shall comply with the public notice requirements for Medicaid fee schedule updates, as set forth at 29 DCMR § 988. This change will enable DHCF to periodically and prospectively update the fee schedule for MHRS services while complying with public notice requirements set forth at 29 DCMR § 988, rather than promulgating a new rule every time the procedure codes or reimbursement rates for MHRS services change.

Finally, minor changes are made to §§ 5213.3 through 5213.8 to correct formatting and clarify intent.

These rules are being enacted on an emergency basis to ensure MHRS providers, certified by DBH for the provision of crisis and emergency services, can continue to operate and serve the needs of District Medicaid beneficiaries in need of crisis and emergency services. The aggregate fiscal impact of the rate change is an increase in Medicaid expenditures of \$375,498 in fiscal year (FY) 2018 and \$901,196 in FY 2019.



These rules correspond to a related State Plan amendment (SPA), which requires approval by the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services, Center for Medicaid and Medicare Services (CMS) and the Council of the District of Columbia (Council). The Council authorized the SPA on July 31, 2017, in the “Fiscal Year 2018 Budget Support Act of 2017” (D.C. Act 22-130; 64 DCR 7652). Implementation of the proposed rules is contingent upon approval of the corresponding SPA by CMS with an effective date of May 1, 2018 or the effective date established by CMS in its approval of the corresponding SPA, whichever is later.

The emergency and proposed rules was adopted on March 29, 2018 and will become effective for services rendered beginning May 1, 2018 and shall remain in effect for not longer than one hundred and twenty (120) days from the adoption date or until July 27, 2018, unless superseded by publication of a Notice of Final Rulemaking in the *D.C. Register*.

The Director also gives notice of the intent to take final rulemaking action to adopt these rules not less than thirty (30) days from the date of publication of this notice in the *D.C. Register*.

**Chapter 52, MEDICAID REIMBURSEMENT FOR MENTAL HEALTH REHABILITATIVE SERVICES, Title 29 DCMR, PUBLIC WELFARE, is amended as follows:**

**Section 5213, REIMBURSEMENT, is amended to read as follows:**

**5213 REIMBURSEMENT**

5213.1 Effective May 1, 2018, reimbursement for Mental Health Rehabilitative Services (MHRS) shall be made according to the District of Columbia Medicaid fee schedule available online at [www.dc-medicaid.com](http://www.dc-medicaid.com). All future updates to the reimbursement rates for MHRS services shall comply with the public notice requirements set forth under Section 988 of Chapter 9 of Title 29 of the District of Columbia Municipal Regulations.

5213.2 A public notice of MHRS rate changes shall be published in the *D.C. Register* at least thirty (30) calendar days in advance of the change, and shall include a link to the Medicaid fee schedule.

5213.3 Medicaid reimbursement for MHRS provided to beneficiaries, other than beneficiaries who are deaf or hard of hearing, shall be determined as follows:

5213.5 The Department of Behavioral Health (DBH) shall be responsible for payment of the non-federal share of total expenditures under the District of Columbia Medicaid State Plan (State Plan), or the local match, for all MHRS in accordance with the terms and conditions set forth in the Memorandum of Understanding between Department of Health Care Finance (DHCF) and DBH.

5213.6 DHCF shall claim the federal share of Medicaid financial participation, or the federal match, for all MHRS services.

5213.7 MHRS providers shall not bill the Medicaid beneficiary or any member of the Medicaid beneficiary's family for MHRS services.

5213.8 In accordance with the Medicaid third-party liability requirements set forth under 42 CFR Part 433 and outlined in the District of Columbia Medicaid State Plan, DBH shall bill all known third-party payors prior to billing the Medicaid Program.

5213.9 Medicaid reimbursement for MHRS is not available for:

- (a) Room and board costs;
- (b) Inpatient services (including hospital, nursing facility services, intermediate care facility for persons with mental retardation services, and Institutions for Mental Diseases services);
- (c) Transportation services;
- (d) Vocational services;
- (e) School and educational services;
- (f) Services rendered by parents or other family members;

- (g) Socialization services;
- (h) Screening and prevention services (other than those provided under Early and Periodic, Screening Diagnostic Treatment requirements);
- (i) Services which are not medically necessary, or included in an approved Individualized Recovery Plan for adults or an Individualized Plan of Care for children and youth;
- (j) Services which are not provided and documented in accordance with DBH-established MHRS service-specific standards; and
- (k) Services furnished to a person other than the Medicaid client, when those services are not used exclusively for the well-being and benefit of the Medicaid client.

The property that is the subject of this application consists of Lots 1 and 2 in Square 1769 in northwest Washington, D.C. (Ward 3), on property located at 4611-4615 41<sup>st</sup> Street, N.W. The property is currently zoned MU-4. The Applicant is proposing a PUD-related map amendment to rezone the property, for the purposes of this project, to the MU-5-B zone.

The 6,955-square-foot site is currently improved with two two-story buildings. The Applicant proposes to redevelop the site with a new mixed-use building containing approximately 34,535 square feet of gross floor area, with a density of 5.04 floor area ratio (“FAR”) and a maximum building height of 80 feet. The project would include 41 residential units, a neighborhood-serving restaurant/bar on the ground floor and in the penthouse, and nine parking spaces. The project will dedicate 12% of the residential space to Inclusionary Zoning (“IZ”) units, which results in two two-bedroom units that will be reserved for households earning up to 60% of median family income (“MFI”) and the penthouse habitable space will result in one one-bedroom unit for a household earning up to 50% MFI.
