"(a) Only that portion of real property currently described for assessment and taxation purposes as Lot 808, Square 2950, which is to be subdivided in part into Lots 824 and 826, Square 2950 effective for Tax Year 2020, and the buildings located thereon ("Property"), owned by Children's National at Walter Reed, LLC, a wholly-owned subsidiary of Children's Hospital, a District of Columbia nonprofit corporation, shall remain exempt from real property taxation to the extent the Property is validly exempt as of the day before any leases being granted to certain business entities (controlled directly or indirectly by Children's Hospital) to receive the federal tax benefits, including New Markets Tax Credits under 26 U.S.C. § 45D, Opportunity Zone tax benefits under 26 U.S.C. § 1400Z-1 *et seq.*, or Historic Rehabilitation Tax Credits under 26 U.S.C. § 47; provided, that the Property shall be subject to §§ 47-1007 and 47-1009. The Property shall be subject to the provisions of §§ 47-1005, 47-1007, and 47-1009 where a sublease or lease is made to another entity (other than the certain business entities referenced in this subsection) that would not qualify for exemption under § 47-1002 if it were both the owner and user of the Property.

Budget and obligated and expended in the same manner as funds appropriated for salaries and expenses of other Federal agencies; Provided further, That 30 days after providing written notice to the Committees on Appropriations of the House of Representatives and the Senate, the District of Columbia Courts may reallocate not more than \$9,000,000 of the funds provided under this heading among the items and entities funded under this heading; Provided further, That the Joint Committee on Judicial Administration in the District of Columbia may, by regulation, establish a program substantially similar to the program set forth in subchapter II of chapter 35 of title 5, United States Code, for employees of the District of Columbia Courts.

FEDERAL PAYMENT FOR DEFENDER SERVICES IN DISTRICT OF COLUMBIA COURTS

For payments authorized under section 11–2604 and section 11–2605, D.C. Official Code (relating to representation provided under the District of Columbia Criminal Justice Act), payments for counsel appointed in proceedings in the Family Court of the Superior Court of the District of Columbia under chapter 23 of title 16, D.C. Official Code, or pursuant to contractual agreements to provide guardian ad litem representation, training, technical assistance, and such other services as are necessary to improve the quality of guardian ad litem representation, payments for counsel appointed in adoption proceedings under chapter 3 of title 16, D.C. Official Code, and payments authorized under section 21–2060, D.C. Official Code (relating to services provided under the District of Columbia Guardianship, Protective Proceedings, and Durable Power of Attorney Act of 1986), \$46,005,000, to remain available until expended; Provided, That funds provided under this heading shall be administered by the Joint Committee on Judicial Administration in the District of Columbia; Provided further, That, notwithstanding any other provision of law, this appropriation shall be apportioned quarterly by the Office of Management and Budget and obligated and expended in the same manner as funds appropriated for expenses of other Federal agencies.

FEDERAL PAYMENT FOR RESIDENT TUITION SUPPORT

For a Federal payment to the District of Columbia, to be deposited into a dedicated account, for a nationwide program to be administered by the Mayor, for District of Columbia resident tuition support, \$40,000,000, to remain available until expended; Provided, That such funds, including any interest accrued thereon, may be used on behalf of eligible District of Columbia residents to pay an amount based upon the difference between in-State and out-of-State tuition at public institutions of higher education, or to pay up to \$2,500 each year at eligible private institutions of higher education; Provided further, That the awarding of such funds may be prioritized on the basis of a resident's academic merit, the income and need of eligible students, and such other factors as may be authorized; Provided further, That the District of Columbia government shall maintain a dedicated account for the Resident Tuition Support Program that shall consist of the Federal funds appropriated to the Program in this Act and any subsequent appropriations, any unobligated balances from prior fiscal years, and any interest earned in this or any fiscal year; Provided further, That the account shall be under

the control of the District of Columbia Chief Financial Officer, who shall use those funds solely for the purposes of carrying out the Resident Tuition Support Program; Provided further, That the Office of the Chief Financial Officer shall provide a quarterly financial report to the Committees on Appropriations of the House of Representatives and the Senate for these funds showing, by object class, the expenditures made, and the purpose therefor.

FEDERAL PAYMENT FOR SCHOOL IMPROVEMENT

For a Federal payment for a school improvement program in the District of Columbia, \$90,000,000, to remain available until expended, for payments authorized under the Scholarship for Opportunity and Results Act (division C of Public Law 112–10); Provided, That, to the extent that funds are available for opportunity scholarships and following the priorities included in section 3006 of such Act, the Secretary of Education shall make scholarships available to students eligible under section 3013(3) of such Act, including students who were not offered a scholarship during any previous school year; Provided further, That within funds provided for opportunity scholarships up to \$3,200,000 shall be for the activities specified in sections 3007(b) through 3007(d) and 3009 of such Act.

FEDERAL PAYMENT TO THE CRIMINAL JUSTICE COORDINATING COUNCIL

For a Federal payment to the Criminal Justice Coordinating Council, \$2,150,000, to remain available until expended, to support initiatives related to the coordination of Federal and local criminal justice resources in the District of Columbia.

FEDERAL PAYMENT FOR JUDICIAL COMMISSIONS

For a Federal payment, to remain available until September 30, 2021, to the Commission on Judicial Disabilities and Tenure, \$325,000, and for the Judicial Nomination Commission, \$290,000.

FEDERAL PAYMENT FOR THE DISTRICT OF COLUMBIA NATIONAL GUARD

For a Federal payment to the District of Columbia National Guard, \$413,250, to remain available until expended for the Major General David F. Wherley, Jr. District of Columbia National Guard Retention and College Access Program.

FEDERAL PAYMENT FOR TESTING AND TREATMENT OF HIV/AIDS

For a Federal payment to the District of Columbia for the testing of individuals for, and the treatment of individuals with, human immunodeficiency virus and acquired immunodeficiency syndrome in the District of Columbia, \$4,750,000.

FEDERAL PAYMENT FOR EMERGENCY PLANNING AND SECURITY COSTS IN THE DISTRICT OF COLUMBIA

For a Federal payment of necessary expenses, as determined by the Mayor of the District of Columbia in written consultation with the elected county or city officials of surrounding jurisdictions, \$28,790,000, to remain available until expended, for the costs of providing public safety at events related to the presence of the National Capital in the District of Columbia, including support requested by the Director of the United States Secret Service in carrying out protective duties under the direction of the Secretary of Homeland Security, and for the costs of providing support to respond to immediate and specific terrorist threats or attacks in the District of Columbia or surrounding jurisdictions; Provided, That \$12,290,000 of that amount shall be available for the purchase of a new fireboat to serve the Potomac and Anacostia Rivers and assist the District of Columbia in keeping pace with emerging threats and a higher volume of emergency response needs in the waterfront area.

FEDERAL PAYMENT TO THE DISTRICT OF COLUMBIA WATER AND SEWER AUTHORITY

For a Federal payment to the District of Columbia Water and Sewer Authority, \$40,000,000, to remain available until expended, to continue implementation of the Combined Sewer Overflow Long-Term Control Plan.

Sec. 3. Compensation of the Chief Financial Officer.

(a) Section 424(b)(2)(E) of the District of Columbia Home Rule Act, approved April 17, 1995 (109 Stat. 142; D.C. Official Code § 1-204.24b(b)(5)), is amended to read as follows:

"(E) PAY.—The Chief Financial Officer shall be paid at the greater of: "(i) A rate such that the total amount of compensation paid during any calendar year is equal to the limit on total pay which is applicable during the year under section 5307 of title 5, United States Code, to an employee described in section 5307(d) of such title; or

"(ii) A rate established in law by the District of Columbia; provided, that any rate established pursuant to this clause which is applicable to any individual serving as the Chief Financial Officer shall not be reduced during any period of that individual's service as Chief Financial Officer.".

Sec. 4. Public-private partnership contracts.

Notwithstanding any other provision of law, during Fiscal Year 2020 and any subsequent fiscal year, the District of Columbia may expend funds, certified as available by the Chief Financial Officer of the District of Columbia, as necessary to pay termination costs of multiyear contracts entered into by the District of Columbia to design, construct, improve, maintain, operate, manage or finance infrastructure projects procured pursuant to the Public-Private Partnership Act of 2014, effective March 11, 2015 (D.C. Law 20-228, D.C. Official Code § 2-271.01 *et seq.*), and such termination costs may be paid from appropriations available for the

performance of the contract or the payment of termination costs or from other appropriations then available for any other purpose, not including the Emergency Reserve or Contingency Reserve Funds (D. C. Official Code § 1-204.50a), which, once allocated to these costs, shall be deemed appropriated for the purposes of termination costs of the contract and shall retain appropriations authority and remain available until expended.

Sec. 5. Contingency cash.

(a) No funds in excess of \$500,000 shall be obligated or expended from the Contingency Cash Reserve Fund established by section 450A(b) of the District of Columbia Home Rule Act, approved November 22, 2000 (114 Stat. 2440; D.C. Official Code § 1-204.50a(b)), unless such expenditures have been approved by the Council by resolution.

(b) The Contingency Cash Reserve Transparency Amendment Act of 2008, enacted on January 29, 2008 (D.C. Act 17-278; 55 DCR 1530), is enacted into law.

Sec. 6. Notwithstanding any other law, the following sales shall be subject to the sales and use taxes of the District of Columbia:

(1) Sales at gift shops, souvenir shops, kiosks, convenience stores, food shops, cafeterias, restaurants, and similar establishments in federal buildings, including memorials and museums, in the District of Columbia that make sales to:

(A) The general public, if operated by the federal government, an agent of the federal government, or a contractor; and

(B) Other than the general public, if operated by an agent of the federal government or a contractor; and

(2) Sales of goods and services by a government-sponsored enterprise or corporation, institution, or organization established by federal statute or regulation ("federal enterprise or organization"), including the Smithsonian Institution, National Gallery of Art, National Building Museum, Federal National Mortgage Association, and Federal Home Loan Mortgage Corporation, if the federal enterprise or organization is otherwise exempt from such taxation, to the extent such sales otherwise would be subject to the sales and use taxes of the District of Columbia if the federal enterprise or organization were organized as a nonprofit corporation established pursuant to Chapter 4 of Title 29 of the District of Columbia Official Code, and exempt from federal income taxation pursuant to section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1954, approved August 16, 1954 (68A Stat. 163; 26 U.S.C. § 501(c)(3)).

Sec. 7. Federal portion of the budget.

The federal funds for which appropriation by Congress is requested by this act constitute the federal portion of the Fiscal Year 2020 annual budget for the District of Columbia government under section 446(a) of the District of Columbia Home Rule Act, approved December 24, 1973 (87 Stat. 801; D.C. Official Code § 1-204.46(a)).

Sec. & Fiscal impact statement.

The Council adopts the fiscal impact statement of the Chief Financial Officer as the fiscal impact statement required by section 4a of the General Legislative Procedures Act of 1975, approved October 16, 2006 (120 Stat. 2038; D.C. Official Code § 1-301.47a).

Sec. 9. Effective date.

This act shall take effect as provided in section 446 of the District of Columbia Home Rule Act, approved December 24, 1973 (87 Stat. 801; D.C. Official Code § 1-204.46).

Sec. 2. (a) The Legalization of Marijuana for Medical Treatment Initiative of 1999 effective February 25, 2010 (D.C. Law 13-315; D.C. Official Code § 7-1671.06 *et seq.*) ("Medical Marijuana Act"), established a medical marijuana program in the District. Pursuant to the Medical Marijuana Act, the Department of Health can register qualifying patients to receive access to medical marijuana without fear of government sanction, to the extent possible without a change in federal laws.

(b) Since passage of the Medical Marijuana Act, the Council and Executive have endeavored to improve access to medical marijuana for patients with the enactment of multiple bills and regulations including the Medical Marijuana Relocation Emergency Amendment Act of 2018, the Medical Marijuana Certified Business Enterprise Preference Emergency Amendment Act of 2018, and the Medical Marijuana Reciprocity Amendment Act of 2016.

(c) Numerous other states, including Arizona, Delaware, Massachusetts, Minnesota, New York, and Oklahoma, with medical marijuana programs have legislated workplace protections for medical marijuana patients that, to the extent possible under current federal law, prohibit adverse employment action against medical marijuana patients.

(d) Several medical marijuana patients who are employed by the District of the Columbia, or whose applications for employment were approved, have contacted the Council

regarding adverse employment actions taken against them by the District of Columbia government as a result of a positive test for marijuana.

(e) Aside from the need to prohibit intoxication in the workplace or any interference with a medical marijuana patient's job duties, there is no rationale for penalizing, terminating, or refusing to hire a patient purely for a positive test result for marijuana, except when required by federal law.

(f) A medical marijuana patient should not be treated any differently for the purposes of employment with the District of Columbia government than any other employee with a medical condition, particularly in light of the current wave of opioid addiction and overdoses and the evidence showing that use of medical marijuana reduces reliance on opioids and reduces opioid overdose rates.

(g) The current policy of some District of Columbia government agencies with regard to employees who are medical marijuana patients is causing harm to those otherwise well-qualified employees by jeopardizing their livelihood and interfering with a well-functioning government by removing qualified employees from their positions or keeping the most-qualified candidates from filling a vacant position.

(h) Therefore, there exists an immediate need to amend existing law to prohibit the District of Columbia government from discriminating, in employment, against an individual for participation in a medical marijuana program.

Sec. 3. The Council of the District of Columbia determines that the circumstances enumerated in section 2 constitute emergency circumstances making it necessary that the Medical Marijuana Program Patient Employment Protection Emergency Amendment Act of 2019 be adopted after a single reading.

Sec. 4. This resolution shall take effect immediately.

A RESOLUTION

<u>23-137</u>

IN THE COUNCIL OF THE DISTRICT OF COLUMBIA

June 18, 2019

To declare the existence of an emergency with respect to the need to require the Office of Zoning to contract for an analysis of short-term rental uses.

RESOLVED, BY THE COUNCIL OF THE DISTRICT OF COLUMBIA, That this resolution may be cited as the "Short-Term Rental Independent Analysis Emergency Declaration Resolution of 2019".

Sec. 2. (a) There exists an immediate need to require the Office of Zoning to contract for an analysis of short-term rental uses to allow the Zoning Commission for the District of Columbia ("Zoning Commission") to move forward with amendments to the Zoning Regulations relating to short-term rental uses.

(b) In 2018, the Council adopted the Short-Term Rental Regulation Act of 2018, effective April 25, 2019 (D.C. Law 22-307; D.C. Official Code § 30-201.01 *et seq.*) ("Short-Term Rental Act"), to regulate short-term rentals in the District of Columbia. The law is scheduled to take effect as early as October 1, 2019. Administrative costs of the law were funded in the FY2020 budget.

(c) Under the existing Zoning Regulations, short-term rentals are not permitted in residential zones in the District. The Short-Term Rental Act does not change this prohibition because the Zoning Regulations only can be amended by the independent Zoning Commission.

(d) On October 17, 2018, all Councilmembers signed a letter to the Chairman of the Zoning Commission urging the Zoning Commission to initiate a text case, as well as emergency rulemaking, to permit short-term rentals in the District of Columbia. In response, the Zoning Commission, at its meeting on the same day, asked the Office of Planning to conduct an analysis of short-term rentals in order to inform a possible text amendment by the Zoning Commission.

(e) The Office of Planning has yet to issue the report requested by the Zoning Commission. At the Office of Planning's budget hearing before the Committee of the Whole in March 2019, Director Trueblood indicated that the report might be submitted in the following month. In response, Chairman Mendelson wrote to the Zoning Commission asking it to insist that the Office of Planning submit its analysis by a date certain. At the Zoning Commission's next meeting, the Office of Planning declined to give any timeframe for completion of its analysis.

(f) The Zoning Commission could act in response to a report containing the information sought from the Office of Planning, provided by a source other than the Office of Planning. The proposed emergency act would allow the Office of Zoning to procure such a report for the benefit of the Zoning Commission.

(g) Given the potential October 1, 2019 applicability of the Short-Term Rental Act, it is essential that the Office of Zoning procure the necessary analysis to allow the Zoning Commission to consider any possible changes to the Zoning Regulations it sees fit in response to the Short-Term Rental Act and the proliferation of home-sharing services.

Sec. 3. The Council of the District of Columbia determines that the circumstances enumerated in section 2 constitute emergency circumstances making it necessary that the Short-Term Rental Independent Analysis Emergency Act of 2019 be adopted after a single reading.

Sec. 4. This resolution shall take effect immediately.

A RESOLUTION

<u>23-138</u>

IN THE COUNCIL OF THE DISTRICT OF COLUMBIA

June 18, 2019

To declare the existence of an emergency with respect to the need to provide a real property tax exemption for Lots 824 and 826, Square 2950.

RESOLVED, BY THE COUNCIL OF THE DISTRICT OF COLUMBIA, That this resolution may be cited as the "Children's Hospital Research and Innovation Campus Phase 1 Emergency Declaration Resolution of 2019".

Sec. 2. (a) In November 2016, Children's National at Walter Reed, LLC ("CNWR") received approximately 11.85 acres of land and buildings ("Property") from the Department of the Army through an Act of Congress. The land required significant environmental remediation, and, in order to insulate Children's Hospital, a nonprofit children's hospital, from potential liability, CNWR was formed. CNWR is a wholly-owned subsidiary of Children's Hospital that has been designated by the Office of Tax and Revenue ("OTR") as a tax-exempt entity for purposes of real property taxes.

(b) The Property was conveyed to CNWR with a restriction in the deed limiting the Property's use to public health purposes, including research, with a requirement that the Property be owned by Children's Hospital, an affiliate of Children's Hospital, or another tax-exempt organization.

(c) Children's Hospital plans to develop the Property in multiple phases over several years. The first phase ("Phase 1") will include a pediatric research and innovation facility and an outpatient pediatric health center, both of which will be operated by Children's Hospital.

(d) The Property is located in a census tract that makes it eligible for federal New Markets Tax Credits ("NMTC") and Opportunity Zone tax benefits. Additionally, certain buildings on the Property are eligible for Historic Rehabilitation Tax Credits ("HTC").

(e) In order to leverage all financing options and ensure completion of the pediatric research and innovation campus, the Property needs to retain its current tax exemption of 93%. OTR made an administrative exemption determination that 93% of Phase 1 was exempt from real property tax, and the remaining 7% would be taxed and paid by Children's Hospital. The purpose of the emergency legislation is to maintain OTR's administration exemption determination.

(f) Pursuant to federal tax credit requirements and in anticipation of HTC and NMTC financing, Children's Hospital formed 2 additional limited liability companies, one for each parcel

in Phase 1, Building 52/53 NMTC Borrower LLC ("Building 52/53 LLC") and Building 54 NMTC Borrower LLC ("Building 54 LLC"). Children's Hospital is the managing entity and would be the 90% owner of both limited liability companies. Tax credit investors would own the remaining 10%.

(g) If Children's Hospital proceeds with the HTC and NMTC financing for Phase 1, CNWR will enter into a 99-year ground lease with Building 52/53 LLC for future Lot 824, Square 2950 and Building 54 LLC for future Lot 826, Square 2950 (both lots are currently part of Lot 808, Square 2950), but the Phase 1 Property would ultimately be leased to and used by Children's Hospital on substantially the same terms that would apply without the HTC and NMTC financing. If the proposed leases to Building 52/53 LLC and Building 54 LLC result in the Property being subject to real property taxes, CNWR would be liable for approximately \$2 million dollars in real property taxes annually for the duration of the ground leases. The sole reason for creating the additional entities is to take advantage of the HTC and NMTC financing, which will result in a net economic benefit to Children's Hospital of approximately \$21 million. The HTC and NMTC compliance periods end in approximately 7 years, at which time the ground leases may be terminated.

(h) An emergency exists because the window of time to close on the HTC and NMTC financing is June 30, 2019. Without the economic benefit from these federal tax credits, Children's Hospital will not be able to finance Phase 1 or the foreseeable project as planned.

(i) The emergency legislation was written with OTR to ensure full implementation and zero fiscal impact.

Sec. 3. The Council of the District of Columbia determines that the circumstances enumerated in section 2 constitute emergency circumstances making it necessary that the Children's Hospital Research and Innovation Campus Phase 1 Emergency Amendment Act of 2019 be adopted after a single reading.

Sec. 4. This resolution shall take effect immediately.

To declare the existence of an emergency with respect to the need to order the closing of a portion of South Dakota Avenue, N.E., adjacent to Squares 3760 and 3766, in Ward 4.

RESOLVED, BY THE COUNCIL OF THE DISTRICT OF COLUMBIA, That this resolution may be cited as the "Closing of a Portion of South Dakota Avenue, N.E., Adjacent to Squares 3760 and 3766, S.O. 18-40261, Emergency Declaration Resolution of 2019".

Sec. 2. (a) There exists an immediate need to close a portion of South Dakota Avenue, N.E., adjacent to Squares 3760 and 3766, bounded by Riggs Road, N.E., Chillum Place, N.E., and Kennedy Street, N.E., in Ward 4 (the "Road").

(b) The closing of the Road will facilitate the mixed-use development of the portion of real property commonly known as Fort Totten Triangle, the disposition of which was approved pursuant to the South Dakota Avenue Riggs Road Excess Property Disposition Approval Resolution of 2016, effective December 20, 2016 (Res. 21-717; 64 DCR 11441) (the "Disposition Resolution"). The development of Fort Totten Triangle will generate significant tax revenue for the District of Columbia, enhance neighborhood economic development efforts, and produce mixed-use development that includes affordable housing, market-rate housing, and retail.

(c) Under the Disposition Resolution and the operative development term sheet, transmitted to the Council as the South Dakota Avenue Riggs Road Excess Property Term Sheet Amendment Approval Resolution of 2018, as introduced on September 17, 2018 (P.R. 22-998) (the "Term Sheet Amendment"), and thereafter deemed approved by the Council on December 7, 2018, the selected development team and the District require a prompt closure of the Road to meet the terms of the transaction.

(d) The Council has passed on first reading permanent legislation, the Closing of a Portion of South Dakota Avenue, N.E., Adjacent to Squares 3760 and 3766 Act of 2019, passed on 1st reading on June 4, 2019 (Engrossed version of Bill 23-12) (the "Permanent Act"), that would effectuate the closing of the Road. However, the Permanent Act will not take effect prior to second reading by the Council, transmittal to the Mayor, transmittal to Congress, and passage of the required congressional review period.

(e) The selected development team cannot proceed with the development of the site as required by the Disposition Resolution and the Term Sheet Amendment unless the closure of the Road is approved by the Council.

Sec. 3. The Council of the District of Columbia determines that the circumstances enumerated in section 2 constitute emergency circumstances making it necessary that the Closing of a Portion of South Dakota Avenue, N.E., Adjacent to Squares 3760 and 3766, S.O. 18-40261, Emergency Act of 2019 be adopted after a single reading.

Sec. 4. This resolution shall take effect immediately.

(Lots 45, 46, and 800-804 in Square 1193) (the "Property") from the current unzoned status¹ to the MU-13 zone. The Property consists of approximately 86,444 square feet of land area between 29th Street, N.W. on the west and Rock Creek on the east, and by the Chesapeake & Ohio Canal on the north and K Street, N.W. on the south.

The MU-13 zone is intended to permit moderate-density mixed-use development generally in the vicinity of the waterfront. The MU-13 zone allows a maximum permitted height of 60 feet (80 feet for Inclusionary Zoning ("IZ") developments), a maximum FAR of 4.0 (4.8 for IZ developments), and a maximum lot occupancy of 75%.

The Generalized Policy Map in the Comprehensive Plan locates the Property in the Parks – Federal and District-owned category, while the Future Land Use Map identities the Property for mixed use in the Medium-Density Residential, Moderate-Density Commercial, and Parks, Recreation, and Open Space land use categories.

The Office of Planning submitted its report in support of setting the application down for a public hearing on May 31, 2019. On June 10, 2019, the Commission voted to set down the application for a public hearing as a contested case. G29KA submitted its prehearing statement on June 13, 2019.

The Commission has determined that this public hearing will be conducted in accordance with the contested case provisions of the Zoning Commission's Rules of Practice and Procedure, Chapter 4 of Subtitle Z of the Zoning Regulations.

On May 6, 2019, Valor Development, LLC (the "Applicant"), on behalf of Apex Real Estate Company, American University, and FW DC-Spring Valley Shopping Center LLC, submitted an application to the Office of Zoning for a consolidated planned unit development ("PUD") for a new mixed-use development project (the "Project") located on property consisting of Lots 802, 803, 806, and 807 in Square 1499 (the "Project Site"). The application was submitted in accordance with Subtitle X, Chapter 3 and Subtitle Z of Title 11 DCMR (the "Zoning Regulations" to which all references herein are made unless otherwise specified).

The Office of Planning provided its report in support of setting the application down for a public hearing on May 31, 2019. On June 10, 2019, the Commission voted to set down the application for a public hearing. The Applicant provided its prehearing statement on June 17, 2019.

The Project Site, comprising approximately 160,788 square feet of land area, is bounded by Yuma Street on the north; Massachusetts Avenue on the south; 48th Street on the east; and the Spring Valley Exxon station on the west. The lots comprising the Project Site are existing assessment and taxation ("A&T") lots. A&T Lots 802 and 803, currently owned by FW DC-Spring Valley Shopping Center, LLC, are improved with the historic Massachusetts Avenue Parking Shops (the "MAPS") building. A&T Lot 806, currently owned by American University, is improved with the former American University Law School (the "AU Building"). Finally, A&T Lot 807, currently owned by Apex Real Estate Company, is improved with a vacant grocery store building, other retail and service uses, and above and below-grade parking. The Project Site is zoned MU-4, a zone district in which residential and retail uses are permitted as a matter of right.

The Project proposes to retain the existing MAPS and AU Building on Lots 802, 803, and 806, and to construct a new apartment building ("Building 1") and five attached row dwellings ("Townhomes 1-5") on Lot 807. The Project proposes that Building 1 have a maximum height of approximately 43 feet and 6 inches, plus a penthouse with a maximum height above the roof level of 12 feet above the habitable portion and 15 feet above the mechanical portion. The lower-level of Building 1 would contain a residential lobby and dwelling units, retail, amenity space,

and access to loading and below-grade parking. The remainder of Building 1, including the penthouse, would contain residential dwelling units and amenity space. Townhomes 1-5 would be located to the south of Building 1 and would have a maximum height ranging between approximately 36 feet, 8 inches and 37 feet, plus a 10-foot penthouse providing access to a roof deck. The proposed PUD would total approximately 430,853 square feet of gross floor area ("GFA") (2.68 floor area ratio ("FAR")), including the existing MAPS and AU Building, with approximately 214,094 square feet of GFA (1.33 FAR) of new residential use and approximately 216,759 square feet of GFA (1.35 FAR) of new and existing nonresidential use. The total amount of new GFA proposed in the PUD is approximately 234,629 square feet (214,094 square feet of residential GFA, 20,535 square feet of nonresidential GFA).

The public hearing will be conducted in accordance with the contested case provisions of the Commission's Rules of Practice and Procedure, Chapter 4 of Subtitle Z of the Zoning Regulations.

How to participate as a witness.

Interested persons or representatives of organizations may be heard at the public hearings. The Commission requests that all witnesses prepare their testimony in writing, submit the written testimony prior to giving statements, and limit oral presentations to summaries of the most important points. The applicable time limits for oral testimony are described below. Written statements, in lieu of personal appearances or oral presentation, may be submitted for inclusion in the record.

How to participate as a party.

Any person who desires to participate as a party in this case must so request and must comply with the provisions of Subtitle Z 404.1.

A party has the right to cross-examine witnesses, to submit proposed findings of fact and conclusions of law, to receive a copy of the written decision of the Commission, and to exercise the other rights of parties as specified in the Commission's Rules of Practice and Procedure. If you are still unsure of what it means to participate as a party and would like more information on this, please contact the Office of Zoning at <u>dcoz@dc.gov</u> or at (202) 727-6311.

Except for an affected ANC, any person who desires to participate as a party in this case must clearly demonstrate that the person's interests would likely be more significantly, distinctly, or uniquely affected by the proposed zoning action than other persons in the general public. Persons seeking party status shall file with the Commission, not less than 14 days prior to the date set for the hearing, or 14 days prior to a scheduled public meeting if seeking advanced party status consideration, a Form 140 - Party Status Application, a copy of which may be downloaded Office from the of Zoning's website at: https://app.dcoz.dc.gov/help/forms.html. This form may also be obtained from the Office of Zoning at the address stated below.

NOTICE OF FINAL RULEMAKING

The Chairperson of the Construction Codes Coordinating Board (Chairperson), pursuant to the authority set forth in Section 10 of the Construction Codes Approval and Amendments Act of 1986 (Act), effective March 21, 1987 (D.C. Law 6-216; D.C. Official Code § 6-1409 (2018 Repl.)) and Mayor's Order 2009-22, dated February 25, 2009, as amended, hereby gives notice of the adoption of the following amendment to Chapter 1 (Administration and Enforcement) of Subtitle A (Building Code Supplement of 2013), Title 12 (Construction Codes Supplement of 2013), of the District of Columbia Municipal Regulations (DCMR).

This final rulemaking revises Section 105.3.10 of the 2013 District of Columbia Building Code (1) to clarify the circumstances in which the professional services of a licensed architect, professional engineer or interior designer are not required for submission of a permit application; and (2) to provide that the signature and seal of the registered design professional, where required, shall serve as an attestation that the designs are in compliance with all relevant laws and regulations of the District of Columbia, and that the engineer or architect, as applicable, has personally prepared, or directly supervised the preparation of, the engineering or architectural designs included in the permit application.

A Notice of Emergency and Proposed Rulemaking was adopted on January 5th, 2018 and published into the *D.C. Register* on June 8, 2018 at 65 DCR 6188. No comments were received, and no changes have been made.

A Notice of Fifth Emergency Rulemaking was adopted on April 18, 2019 and published at 66 DCR 7467 (June 21, 2019). A Notice of Fourth Emergency Rulemaking was adopted on December 28, 2018 and published at 66 DCR 7462 (June 21, 2019). A Notice of Third Emergency was adopted on August 30, 2018 and published at 65 DCR 13073 (November 11, 2018). A Notice of Second Emergency was adopted on May 2, 2018 and was published at 65 DCR 12470 (November 9, 2018).

The Council approved the rulemaking through PR22-1144 on February 19, 2019. These rules were adopted as final on April 18, 2019 and will become effective upon publication in the *D.C. Register*.

Chapter 1, ADMINISTRATION AND ENFORCEMENT, of Title 12-A DCMR, BUILDING CODE SUPPLEMENT OF 2013, is amended as follows:

Section 105, PERMITS, is amended as follows:

Strike Section 105.3.10 in the 2013 District of Columbia Building Code in its entirety and insert a new Section 105.3.10 in the 2013 District of Columbia Building Code in its place to read as follows: **105.3.10 Registered Design Professional.** The design of work for new construction, repair, expansion, addition or alteration projects submitted for permit shall comply with Sections 105.3.10.1 through 105.3.10.6 as applicable.

105.3.10.1 Architectural Services. Where the project involves the practice of architecture, as defined by D.C Official Code § 47-2853.61 (2012 Repl.), the corresponding permit documents shall be prepared by an architect licensed to practice architecture in the District of Columbia. All plans, computations, and specifications required to be submitted in connection with a permit application for such architectural work shall be prepared by or under the direct supervision of an architect with a valid and unexpired District of Columbia architecture license and shall bear the architect's signature and seal in accordance with the laws of the District of Columbia.

105.3.10.2 Engineering Services. Where the project involves the practice of engineering, as defined by D.C Official Code § 47-2853.131 (2012 Repl.), the corresponding permit documents shall be prepared by a professional engineer licensed to practice engineering in the District of Columbia. All plans, computations, and specifications required to be submitted in connection with a permit application for such engineering work shall be prepared by or under the direct supervision of a professional engineer with a valid and unexpired District of Columbia engineer license and shall bear the engineer's signature and seal in accordance with the laws of the District of Columbia.

Exception: An architect licensed in the District of Columbia is authorized to perform engineering work that is incidental to the practice of architecture, as permitted by D.C Official Code § 47-2853.61 (2012 Repl.).

105.3.10.3 Interior Design Services. Plans for non-structural alterations and repairs of a building, including the layout of interior spaces, which do not adversely affect any structural member, any part of the structure having a required fire resistance rating, or the public safety, health or welfare, and which do not involve the practice of architecture and engineering as defined by D.C Official Code §§ 47-2853.61 and 47-2853.131 (2012 Repl.), shall be deemed to comply with this section when such plans are prepared, signed and sealed by an interior designer licensed and registered in the District of Columbia in accordance with D.C Official Code § 47-2853.101 (2012 Repl.).

105.3.10.4 Exemptions. The professional services of a licensed architect, professional engineer or interior designer are not required for the following:

- 1. Work done under any of the exemptions from registration provided for in the laws of the District of Columbia governing the licensure of architects, professional engineers and interior designers.
- 2. Nonstructural alteration of any building of R-3 occupancies or of any building under the jurisdiction of the *Residential Code*.

- 3. Preparation of drawings or details for cabinetry, architectural millwork, furniture, or similar interior furnishings, for any work to provide for their installation or for any work exempt from permit by Section 105.2.
- 4. Drawings or details for the installation of water and sewer building connections to a single family residential structure prepared by a master plumber licensed pursuant to D.C Official Code § 47-2853.121 *et seq.* (2012 Repl.).

105.3.10.5. Registered Design Professional in Responsible Charge. The *code official* is authorized to require the *owner* to engage and designate on the permit application a *registered design professional* who shall act as the *registered design professional in responsible charge*. If the circumstances require, the *owner* shall designate a substitute *registered design professional in responsible charge* who shall perform the duties required of the *original registered design professional in responsible charge* is required, the *code official* shall be notified in writing by the *owner* if the *registered design professional in responsible charge* is changed or is unable to continue to perform the duties. The *registered design professional in responsible charge* shall be responsible for reviewing and coordinating submittal documents prepared by others, including phased and deferred submittal items, for compatibility with the design of the *building*.

105.3.10.6 Attestations Required.

105.3.10.6.1 Registered Design Professional. The signature and seal of the *registered design professional*, where required by and in accordance with Section 105.3.10, shall serve as attestation of the following:

- 1. For architects: "I am responsible for determining that the architectural designs included in this application are in compliance with all relevant laws and regulations of the District of Columbia. I have personally prepared, or directly supervised the preparation of, the architectural designs included in this application."
- 2. For engineers: "I am responsible for determining that the engineering designs included in this application are in compliance with all relevant laws and regulations of the District of Columbia. I have personally prepared, or directly supervised the preparation of, the engineering designs included in this application."

105.3.10.6.2 Registered Design Professional in Responsible Charge. Where the *code official* determines that a *registered design professional in responsible charge* is required for any project, an attestation sealed and signed by the *registered design professional in responsible charge* engaged by the *owner* shall be submitted prior to the issuance of any and all *certificate(s) of occupancy* for the project. The attestation shall identify the *registered design professional in charge*

by name and registration number, shall identify the project or portion thereof being attested to, and shall state, to the *code official*'s satisfaction, that the project or portion thereof has been completed in a manner that is substantially compatible with the design of the building that was the basis of the corresponding permit. Furthermore, the attestation shall state that changes from such permit documents, including but not limited to submittal documents prepared by others during the course of construction, and phased and deferred submittal items, have been reviewed and coordinated by the attesting *registered design professional in responsible charge*.

DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH

NOTICE OF FINAL RULEMAKING

The Director of the Department of Health, pursuant to the authority set forth in § 302(14) of the District of Columbia Health Occupations Revision Act of 1985 ("Act"), effective March 25, 1986 (D.C. Law 6-99; D.C. Official Code § 3-1203.02(14) (2016 Repl.)), and Mayor's Order 98-140, dated August 20, 1998, hereby gives notice of the action to amend Chapter 102 (Speech-Language Pathology Assistants) of Title 17 (Business, Occupations, and Professionals) of the District of Columbia Municipal Regulations (DCMR).

The purpose of this rulemaking is to amend the continuing education requirements for speech-language pathology assistants to include continuing education in public health priorities as determined and amended from time to time by the Director.

The rulemaking was published in the *D.C. Register* as a proposed rulemaking on February 22, 2019 at 66 DCR 2376. No comments were received and there has been no change to the rule as proposed. This rule will be effective upon publication in the *D.C. Register*.

CHAPTER 102, SPEECH-LANGUAGE PATHOLOGY ASSISTANTS, OF TITLE 17, BUSINESS, OCCUPATIONS, AND PROFESSIONALS, is amended as follows:

SECTION 10208, CONTINUING EDUCATION REQUIREMENTS, is amended as follows:

Subsection 10208.2 is amended to read as follows:

- 10208.2 To be eligible for the renewal of a registration, an applicant shall have completed, during the two (2)-year period preceding the date the registration expires, ten (10) hours of approved continuing education, which shall include the following:
 - (a) One (1) hour of ethics;
 - (b) Two (2) hours of LGBTQ continuing education; and
 - (c) Ten percent (10%) of the total required continuing education shall be in the subjects determined by the Director as public health priorities of the District, which shall be duly published every five (5) years or as deemed appropriate.

SECTION 10299, DEFINITIONS, is amended as follows:

Subsection 10299.1 is amended as follows:

The following definitions are added before the definition of "LGBTQ continuing education":

Director – The Director of the Department of Health, or the Director's designee.

<u>NOTICE OF FINAL RULEMAKING</u> Z.C. Case No. 07-08C¹ (Text Amendment – 11-C DCMR § 718) (D.C. Housing Authority – Text Amendment to Extend Expiration Dates of Certificates of Occupancy for Temporary Surface Parking Lot Use for Specific Squares in the Proximity of Nationals Ballpark) June 10, 2019

The Zoning Commission for the District of Columbia (Commission), pursuant to its authority under Section 1 of the Zoning Act of 1938, approved June 20, 1938 (52 Stat. 797, as amended; D.C. Official Code § 6-641.01 (2018 Rep1.)), hereby gives notice of the adoption of amendments to Subtitle C (General Rules), of Title 11 (Zoning Regulations of 2016), of the District of Columbia Municipal Regulations (DCMR).

Description of Amendments

The text amendment amends § 718 of Subtitle C of the Zoning Regulations to extend for five (5) years the expiration dates for certificates of occupancy for temporary surface parking lots on Lots 44-47 in Square 767, Lots 19-22 in Square 768, and Lot 77 in Square 882 from the current expiration date of April 1, 2018 to April 1, 2023.

Procedures Leading to Adoption of Amendments

The District of Columbia Housing Authority (DCHA) submitted a petition to the Office of Zoning on September 14, 2018 requesting the Commission to adopt the proposed text amendment to allow the continued temporary parking lot use for another five (5) years while DCHA finalizes its development project. (Exhibits [Ex.] 1-4.)

The District of Columbia Office of Planning (OP) submitted a setdown report dated November 9, 2018, recommending the Commission setdown the text amendment petition. (Ex. 11.)

At its December 17, 2018 public meeting, the Commission accepted the petition and voted to set down the text.

DCHA submitted a revised petition on November 15, 2018, removing one proposed revision regarding the specific squares covered by the proposed text amendment. (Ex. 12-14.)

OP submitted a hearing report dated April 5, 2019, recommending the Commission approve the text amendment petition. (Ex. 29.)

ANC 6D submitted a report dated December 11, 2018 in support of the proposed amendment as necessary to ensure the anticipated development project proceeds to completion. (Ex. 21.)

A public hearing was scheduled for and held on April 22, 2019. At the hearing, Stephen Cochran represented OP in recommending approval of the text amendments. The other witnesses were representatives of DCHA. At the close of the hearing, upon the motion of Commissioner Shapiro, as seconded by Vice Chair Miller, the Zoning Commission took **PROPOSED ACTION** to authorize publication of a notice of proposed rulemaking by a vote of **5-0-0** (Anthony J. Hood, Robert E. Miller, Peter A. Shapiro, Peter G. May, and Michael G. Turnbull to approve).

A Notice of Proposed Rulemaking for this case was published in the *D.C. Register* on May 3, 2019, at 66 DCR 5709. No comments were received.

The National Capital Planning Commission (NCPC), through a delegated action dated May 28, 2019, found that the proposed text amendment was exempt from NCPC review under exception 12 of Chapter 8 of NCPC's submission guidelines because the proposed amendment is consistent with the Height Act, would not cause adverse impacts on federal property or other federal interest, and would apply outside the boundary of the L'Enfant City. (Ex. 34.)

The Commission must give "great weight" to the issues and concerns raised in the written report of the ANC(s) affected by the Commission's action. (§ 13(d) of the Advisory Neighborhood Commissions Act of 1975, effective March 26, 1976 (D.C. Law 1-21; D.C. Official Code § 1-309.10(d) (2016 Repl.) and Subtitle Z § 101.8.) To satisfy the great weight requirement, the Commission must articulate with particularity and precision the reasons why an affected ANC does or does not offer persuasive advice under the circumstances. The District of Columbia Court of Appeals has interpreted the phrase "issues and concerns" to "encompass only legally relevant issues and concerns." (*Wheeler v. District of Columbia Board of Zoning Adjustment*, 395 A.2d 85, 91 n.10 (1978) (citation omitted).")

This text amendment would affect Squares 767, 768, and 882, which are all in ANC 6D. Square 882 is also directly across 7th Street, S.E. from ANC 6B, which is therefore also deemed to be an "affected ANC" pursuant to Subtitle Z § 101.8. DCHA served the petition on both ANC 6D and 6B, and the Office of Zoning provided notice to both ANCs 6D and 6B of their opportunity to participate. ANC 6B did not submit any report to the record, while ANC 6D's written report supported the proposed text amendment. The Commission found ANC 6D's advice to support the text amendment persuasive.

At its public meeting on June 10, 2019, upon the motion of Vice Chair Miller, as seconded by Commissioner Turnbull, the Zoning Commission took **FINAL ACTION** to adopt the amendments as proposed by a vote of **5-0-0** (Anthony J. Hood, Robert E. Miller, Peter A. Shapiro, Peter G. May, and Michael G. Turnbull to approve).

The following amendments to the text of Title 11 DCMR (Zoning Regulations of 2016) are adopted.

Chapter 7, VEHICLE PARKING, of Title 11-C DCMR, GENERAL RULES, is amended as follows:

Section 718, TEMPORARY SURFACE PARKING LOTS FOR BALLPARK, is amended as follows:

- A temporary surface parking lot for the Ballpark shall be permitted on Squares 603, 605, 657, 658, 660, 661, 662, 662E, 664, 664E, 665, 700, 701, 707, 708, 708E, 708S, 744S, and 882; Square 658, Lot 7; Square 767, Lots 44-47; Square 768, Lots 19-22; and Square 769, Lots 18-21 ("the subject squares"), when permitted by the regulations of the relevant land use subtitle, and subject to the provisions of this section.
- 718.2 $...^{2}$
- 718.3 Any certificate of occupancy issued pursuant to this subsection shall expire no later than April 1, 2018, except that, with respect to Square 767, Lots 44-47; Square 768, Lots 19-22; and Square 882, Lot 77, any certificate of occupancy issued pursuant to this subsection shall expire no later than April 1, 2023.
- 718.4 ...
- 718.7 If and when valid building permits issued pursuant to this section authorize an aggregate of three thousand seven hundred seventy-five (3,775) or more parking spaces, the construction and use of additional temporary spaces on any of the subject squares shall require special exception approval of the Board of Zoning Adjustment pursuant to Subtitle X, and in accordance with Subtitle §§ 718.8 through 718.10 and the following provisions:
 - (a) Any certificate of occupancy issued pursuant to this subsection shall expire no later than April 1, 2018, except that, with respect to Square 767, Lots 44-47; Square 768, Lots 19-22; and Square 882, Lot 77, any certificate of occupancy issued pursuant to this subsection shall expire no later than April 1, 2023.
 - (b) ...

The text amendments shall become effective upon publication of this notice in the *D.C. Register*, that is on June 28, 2019.

DEPARTMENT ON DISABILTY SERVICES

NOTICE OF PROPOSED RULEMAKING

The Director of the Department on Disability Services (DDS), pursuant to the authority set forth in sections 109 and 113 of the Department on Disability Services Establishment Act of 2006 (Act), effective March 14, 2007 (D.C. Law 16-264; D.C. Official Code §§ 7-761.09 and 7-761.13 (2018 Repl.)), hereby gives notice of the intent to adopt a new Chapter 132, "Department on Disability Services Formal Complaint System," of Title 29 (Public Welfare) of the District of Columbia Municipal Regulations (DCMR).

The DDS Developmental Disabilities Administration (DDA) operates the service delivery system for District of Columbia residents with intellectual and developmental disabilities under authority set forth in the Act and the Citizens with Intellectual Disabilities Constitutional Rights and Dignity Act of 1978, effective March 3, 1979 (D.C. Law 2-137; D.C. Official Code § 7-1301.01 *et seq.* (2018 Repl.)). Title I of the Disability Services Reform Amendment Act of 2018, effective May 5, 2018 (D.C. Law 22-93; D.C. Official Code § 7-761.13 (2018 Repl.)), amended the Act by creating a new Section 113, Formal Complaints, to "establish a process for the resolution of formal complaints, including formal complaints filed with a provider," and requires the Mayor to issue rules to implement the new formal complaint process and submit the proposed rules to the Council of the District of Columbia (Council) for a 45-day period of review. DDS drafted proposed rules in consultation with the DDA stakeholder community beginning shortly after the legislation's passage and concluding on September 30, 2018.

Consistent with the new requirements of the Act, this proposed rulemaking adopts Chapter 132, "Department on Disability Services Formal Complaint System," in Title 29 of the DCMR, comprised of nine sections as follows:

- (1) Section 13201, Purpose and Application, specifies the purpose of the DDA Complaint System, states that the DDA Complaint System rules apply to complaints about issues with the DDA Service Delivery System, and do not apply to complaints about the DDS Rehabilitation Services Administration or the DDS Disability Determination Division, both of which have complaint and appeal processes governed by other laws and regulations.
- (2) Section 13202, Developmental Disabilities Administration Complaint System General Provisions, establishes the DDA Complaint System, authorizes the DDS Director to select one or more external reviewers for the DDA Complaint System, and specifies how the DDA Complaint System interacts with DDS' Incident Management Enforcement system.
- (3) Section 13203, Consumer Rights, Section 13203, establishes a list of basic consumer rights in the DDA Complaint System.
- (4) Section 13204, Filing A Complaint With A Developmental Disabilities Administration Provider, establishes a process for the resolution of complaints filed with a DDA provider.
- (5) Section 13205, Filing A Complaint With The Department On Disability Services, Developmental Disabilities Administration, sets forth the stages of the DDA

Complaint System and specifies when a person may use it to resolve issues with the DDA Delivery System.

- (6) Section 13206, No Limitation On Other Rights, Section 13206, specifies that the existence of the DDA Complaint System does not limit or restrict people's rights, procedures or remedies otherwise available under federal or District law when they receive services through DDA or a DDA provider.
- (7) Section 13207, Notice, defines the notice requirements and methods for the DDA Complaint System.
- (8) Section 13208, Peer Support Pilot Program, authorizes DDS to establish a peer support pilot program and publish an annual report about the program.
- (9) Section 13299, Definitions, defines the terms and phrases used in the rules.

The DDS/DDA serves some of the District's most vulnerable residents. Importantly, the new formal complaint system will provide a person who elects to use it with the potential for their complaint to be substantively reviewed by an external reviewer prior to a final decision being rendered by the DDS Director, and has the right to appeal from that final decision to the D.C. Office of Administrative Hearings.

The DDS Director gives notice of the intent to take final rulemaking action to adopt these proposed rules in not less than thirty (30) days after the date of publication of this notice in the D.C. Register.

Chapter 132, DEPARTMENT ON DISABILITY SERVICES FORMAL COMPLAINT SYSTEM, is added to Title 29, PUBLIC WELFARE, of the DCMR, to read as follows:

132 DEPARTMENT ON DISABILITY SERVICES FORMAL COMPLAINT SYSTEM

13201 PURPOSE AND APPLICATION

- 13201.1 The purpose of these rules is to establish a formal complaint system to resolve issues with Developmental Disabilities Administration (DDA) supports and services by establishing the specific procedures for:
 - (a) The resolution by the provider of complaints filed by people with a DDA provider, and, when necessary, by the DDS Director who may be informed by recommendations provided by an external reviewer based on applicable law, rules and/ or policies;
 - (b) The resolution by DDS of complaints filed with DDA and, when necessary, informed by an external reviewer who makes recommendations based on applicable law, rules, and policies;
 - (c) Performing threshold screening to prevent duplicate complaints involving the same person and set of facts being adjudicated by DDS and the District of

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Columbia Office of Administrative Hearings (OAH) or the Superior Court of the District of Columbia;

- (d) Establishing a Peer Support Pilot Program to assist people with intellectual disabilities who are using the DDA Complaint System and a process for reporting annually on that program;
- (e) Establishing the right to, and a mechanism for, a person who is not satisfied with the DDS Director's final decision about his or her complaint to appeal to OAH; and
- (f) Ensuring that, upon resolution of a person's issue through the DDA Complaint System and upon receipt of timely and proper appeal-related request from the OAH, DDS will generate a Complaint File and supply it to OAH.
- 13201.2 The rules in this chapter are applicable to DDS and to each DDA provider in the DDA Delivery System.
- 13201.3 The DDA Complaint System outlined in these rules applies solely to issues about DDA supports and services. The complaint process regarding Rehabilitation Services Administration's (RSA) services is separate and can be found in the District of Columbia Municipal Regulations at Title 29, Public Welfare, as set forth in 29 DCMR §§ 135-149. The complaint coordinator will reject complaints about RSA because they cannot be resolved through the DDA Complaint System under section 13202.11.
- 13201.4 The DDA Complaint System is unrelated to Social Security Administration (SSA) law, regulations and practices or the D.C. Disability Determination Division (DDD) of DDS. The complaint coordinator will reject complaints about SSA or DDD because they cannot be resolved through the DDA Complaint System under section 13202.11.

13202 DEVELOPMENTAL DISABILITIES ADMINISTRATION COMPLAINT SYSTEM GENERAL PROVISIONS

13202.1 DDA Complaint System

DDS shall establish a DDA Complaint System that complies with the applicable federal and District laws and regulations including the Disability Services Reform Amendment Act of 2018 and these rules. DDA shall adopt a complaint policy and procedure(s), and involve DDA stakeholders in the policy and procedure development process. The DDA Complaint System shall be available to people receiving DDA supports and services.

13202.2 Representatives

A person has the right to representation when using the DDA Complaint System but DDS shall not appoint, assign or compensate a person's representative.

13202.3 Supporters

A person may choose one or more informal or formal supporters to assist them throughout the DDA Complaint System. DDS shall not appoint, assign or compensate a person's supporter, except that support may be available through the Peer Support Pilot Program governed by section 13203. In the event that a person brings a supporter to or requests their presence during any DDA Complaint System process, DDS, the external reviewer or the provider, respectively, may disclose personal information during the meeting without first obtaining written consent from the person or the person's representative. By inviting a third-party supporter to participate in any Complaint System process, the person is considered to have provided implied consent to release information in the presence of the third party during the proceeding.

- 13202.4 Representatives and supporters are subject to the requirements of federal and District law regarding the confidentiality of protected mental health, medical and other information about a person.
- 13202.5 Witnesses

DDS has no obligation to compensate any witnesses through the DDA Complaint System, except that DDS staff may serve as witnesses as part of their official duties when DDS requires them to do so.

- 13202.6 Incidents
 - (a) When the complaint coordinator receives a complaint that appears to be a Serious Reportable Incident (SRI) under DDS policy, the complaint coordinator shall refer the matter to the DDS Incident Management and Enforcement Unit (IMEU) for consideration of whether an investigation should be initiated under DDS's IMEU Policy and Procedures. The complaint coordinator shall administratively close the complaint in the DDA Complaint System when the IMEU accepts it.
 - (b) DDS shall provide notice to the person of the administrative closure of the issue. The notice shall state that, once the IMEU process regarding the SRI is complete, if the person still has an issue about the matter, she or he may request that DDS reopen the issue within ninety (90) days of DDA issuing the report.
- 13202.7 Provider Complaint Files and Records

- (a) Unless a person expresses a good faith, reasonable fear of retaliation, he or she is generally required to file a complaint about a provider with the provider and use the provider's complaint process as outlined at Section 13204, Filing A Complaint With A Developmental Disabilities Administration Provider. The result of the provider complaint process may be a provider Chief Executive Officer (CEO) written decision, which the person, if not satisfied with the result, may then appeal to DDA under Section 13205, Filing a Complaint With the Department On Disability Services, Developmental Disabilities Administration.
- (b) When a person appeals the provider CEO written decision by filing a complaint with the DDA Complaint System, DDS shall request a copy of the provider CEO final decision from the person.
- (c) If a person appeals a provider CEO final decision to DDS, the provider is required to supply records to DDS, including the provider's complaint file and provider CEO final decision, within five (5) business days of DDS's request.
- (d) The DDA Complaint System shall begin when DDS receives from the provider the complaint file including the provider CEO final decision, or on the 6^{th} business day, whichever is sooner.
- 13202.8 A person's issue involving a specific DDA provider staff member or contractor shall be treated as involving the DDA provider that employs or contracts with the staff member or contractor.
- 13202.9Time Limit For Filing A Complaint
 - (a) A person must file their complaint within 90 calendar days from the last date on which the events which took place, or did not take place when the person believes they should have, giving rise to the issue.
 - (b) A person may also file a complaint while the events are ongoing.
- 13202.10 Waiver Of The 90 Calendar Day Complaint Filing Deadline

A person may request a waiver of the 90 calendar day filing requirement from the DDS Director, or his or her designee. The request must include the facts the person asserts supports their request for waiver.

- (a) The Director may grant a waiver for the following reasons:
 - (1) The events that form the basis of the issue could not reasonably be expected to be known by the person or their representative within the 90-day period;

- (2) The person was not able to effectively communicate their issue or supporters were not able to understand a person's communication well enough to help him or her file an issue;
- (3) Illness or incapacitation of the person; or
- (4) Any other basis determined to be reasonable by the DDS Director.
- (b) The length of waiver granted by the DDS Director shall be reasonable and be based on the nature and timing of the circumstances.
- (c) In the interests of resolving a person's issue as quickly as possible, customer service may continue to attempt to resolve an issue that is past the complaint-filing deadline.
- 13202.11 Types Of Complaints That May Be Filed

The DDA Complaint System shall be limited to the following types of issues (and to use by people receiving DDA supports and services as specified in section 13202.1):

- (a) The denial, delay, reduction or termination of DDA supports or services;
- (b) The application of DDA policies, procedures or practices to the person; and
- (c) The application of DDA providers' policies, procedures, or practices to the person.
- 13202.12 Types Of Complaints Not Allowed

Where DDS accepts a complaint and then discovers during any time that it is not the type of issue that can be resolved through the DDA Complaint System, DDS shall stop the process and administratively close the complaint. DDS shall provide written notice, including the reason for administrative closure, to the person who filed the complaint.

13202.13 Administrative Closure

DDS or the provider, as appropriate, shall administratively close a complaint that is outside of the types of issues that may be filed or resolved through the DDA Complaint System under section 13202.11. DDS or the provider shall provide the person with notice, based on the person's preferred mode of communication, including the reason for administrative closure.

13202.14Reconsideration On Administrative Closure

If a person disagrees with DDS' administrative closure under section 13202.13, the person may file a request for reconsideration of that decision with the DDS Director, or his or her designee, within fourteen (14) calendar days. DDS will issue a decision on the request for reconsideration within fourteen (14) calendar days of the request. A DDS reconsideration decision is a final agency decision.

13202.15 No Retaliation

Neither DDS nor a provider shall retaliate against a person, his or her supporter or representative, a third-party complaint filer, or a person's witness to facts alleged in a complaint, because of a complaint filed with a provider or DDS. An allegation of retaliation for filing a complaint shall be treated and filed as a new complaint with the provider or DDS or, if it meets the DDS definition of an SRI, be investigated in accordance with DDS's IMEU policy and procedures.

13202.16 External Reviewers

DDS shall contract with one or more external reviewer(s) to provide review of and recommendations for resolution of issues.

- 13202.17 Release Of Records
 - (a) A DDA provider shall release information regarding an issue to the person or their representative, upon receipt of a valid authorization for disclosure from the person, including those documents in the possession, custody or control of the provider, which includes the person's file as well as provider policies, procedures and protocols which relate to the issue and the provider CEO final decision.
 - (b) The DDA provider shall also release all of the above documents to DDS or its contractors upon request, regardless of whether there is a release of information form. Further, the DDA provider shall make all documents regarding its Complaint System available to DDS or its contractors, upon request.
- 13202.18 Provider Sanctions

DDS may impose sanctions on a provider, if:

- (a) DDS substantiates an allegation that the DDA provider retaliated against a person, or third party, for filing a complaint;
- (b) The DDA provider fails to develop, implement or revise its provider complaint policy or procedure when required to do so by DDS in accordance with law, regulations or DDS policy.

- (c) The DDA provider fails to abide by or implement a final decision by DDS in response to a complaint; or
- (d) The DDA provider evidences a pattern of untimely or incomplete responses to complaints from the people DDA supports, or fails to complete action promised by the DDA provider in response to a complaint.

13203 CONSUMER RIGHTS

- 13203.1 A person using the DDA Complaint System may:
 - (a) Grant consent to a third party to file a complaint for the person, or on his or her behalf, with a DDA provider or with DDA;
 - (b) Be assisted throughout the issue resolution process by one or more informal supporters, a Supported Decision-Making Agreement supporter, or attorney, advocate or other representative of the person's own choosing and at the person's own expense;
 - (c) Request that the complaint coordinator, or his or her designee, assist the person in filing a complaint with DDS; or
 - (d) Request a qualified interpreter, fluent in the primary language (including sign language) of the person, and may request the use of required auxiliary aids.
- 13203.2 A provider listed in section 13203.1(a) above, must continue to serve a person already receiving supports or services without limitation, reduction or termination pending the resolution of an open complaint with the complaint coordinator regarding those supports or services.
- 13203.3 A person may request an appeal directly to OAH for Medicaid denials, delays, suspensions, reductions or terminations.

13204 FILING A COMPLAINT WITH A DEVELOPMENTAL DISABILITIES ADMINISTRATION PROVIDER

- 13204.1 A DDA provider's continuing obligation to safeguard the welfare of people who receive DDA supports and services, including the filing of incident reports and other reports of allegations of abuse, neglect or exploitation, are not affected by the DDA Complaint System.
- Each DDA provider shall adopt and adhere to a complaint policy which complies with the mandates of the Department on Disability Services Establishment Act of 2006, effective March 14, 2007 (D.C. Law 16-264; D.C. Official Code § 7-761.01 *et seq.*), these rules, and DDS policies and procedures so that people receiving

DDA services from a provider are able to file complaints about the provider with the provider.

- 13204.3 A person, or a third party acting for the person and with their consent, shall file any complaints concerning matters that are the sole responsibility of a DDA provider directly with the provider and utilize the provider's complaint process, unless the DDS Director grants an exception due to a reasonable fear of retaliation under section 13205.2.
- 13204.4 Providers shall foster understanding of their complaint systems and, at a minimum, supply information in plain language about how to file complaints to people receiving DDA-funded services, and their supporter or legal representative as the person begins to receive services from them and at least annually. Providers shall post plain language notices about their complaint policies and information in day habilitation and employment readiness facilities.
- 13204.5 A person must file their complaint about a provider, its staff or services, with the provider within ninety (90) calendar days from the final day of the events which the person says took place, or did not take place when the person believes they should have, giving rise to the issue. A person may file a complaint while a situation is ongoing.
- 13204.6 A person, or a third party acting for the person with their consent, may request from the provider's CEO or equivalent, or his or her designee, a waiver of the ninety (90) calendar day filing requirement for the following reasons:
 - (a) The events that form the basis of the complaint could not reasonably be expected to be known within the ninety (90) calendar day filing period;
 - (b) Illness or incapacitation of the person;
 - (c) The person is not able to effectively communicate their issue or have their issue understood;
 - (d) The person did not have notice of the right to file an issue; or
 - (e) Any other reasonable basis determined by the provider CEO, or his or her designee.
- 13204.7 Each provider shall designate at least one person and an alternate to assist people with filing an oral or written complaint about the provider. An alternate must be used when the assigned person is named in the complaint.
- 13204.8 The provider shall review the issue to see whether the facts alleged show the provider should take action to ensure the person's physical safety; and whether the issue alleges facts that amount to a SRI as defined by DDS. In those instances,

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the matter shall be handled under DDS's IMEU policy and procedures and the provider shall administratively close the complaint.

- 13204.9 The provider shall continue to provide supports and services without limitation, reduction or termination pending the resolution of the person's issue regarding those supports and services.
- 13204.10 The provider CEO, or his or her designee, shall review the complaint and within thirty (30) calendar days write a final decision in response. However, where the facts of an issue demonstrate urgency for resolution by identifying health or safety concerns for the person, or where the person filing the complaint with the provider states at the time of the filing that they are seeking expedited review, the provider CEO, or his or her designee, shall review the complaint and issue a written decision within ten (10) calendar days.
- 13204.11 After the provider CEO, or his or her designee, issues a written decision about the complaint, a person who is not satisfied may file a complaint about the provider with DDS according to Section 13205, Filing A Complaint With The Department on Disability Services, Developmental Disabilities Administration.

13205 FILING A COMPLAINT WITH THE DEPARTMENT ON DISABILITY SERVICES, DEVELOPMENTAL DISABILITIES ADMINISTRATION

13205.1 Right To File A Complaint With DDA

DDA shall have a Complaint System and a Complaint System policy specifying that a person, or a third party acting on the person's behalf and with his or her consent in accordance with section 13205.7, has a right to file a complaint with DDA in accordance with section 13202.12 with the DDS complaint coordinator. The complaint shall provide available detail of the who, what, when and where of the event or action that took place, or did not take place when the person believes it should have, giving rise to the issue with which the person disagrees.

13205.2Right To File A Complaint With DDS After Using DDA Provider Complaint
Process Or Where DDS Director Grants Exception

The policy shall also specify that a person also has a right to file a complaint with the Complaint Coordinator if the issue is about a DDA provider and either the person has used the provider's Complaint Process and has a final decision from the provider CEO in accordance with section 13204.10 or the DDS Director grants the person an exception from using the provider's complaint process where the person asserts a good faith, reasonable fear of retaliation from the provider if she or he files the complaint with the provider. In either case, the person who wishes to file the complaint must meet the time limits for filing in section 13205.3.

13205.3 Time Limit On Filing

Where a person files a complaint about DDA in the DDA Complaint System (with the complaint coordinator), he or she must do so within ninety (90) calendar days from the final day of the events the person alleges took place, or within or did not take place when they should have, giving rise to the issue. A person filing a complaint about a provider and alleging reasonable fear of retaliation by the provider also must file his or her complaint in the DDA Complaint System (with the complaint coordinator) within ninety (90) calendar days. A person filing an appeal from a provider CEO decision to the DDA Complaint System must file the complaint with the complaint coordinator within fourteen (14) calendar days of the provider CEO decision. DDS will not accept a complaint where the events (or non-occurrences) took place more than ninety (90) calendar days prior to the first filing of the complaint with DDS (where the complaint is about DDA or where the person alleges reasonable fear of retaliation) or more than fourteen (14) calendar days of the provider CEO decision, unless the DDS Director grants the person a waiver.

- 13205.4 DDS shall provide information about the DDA Complaint System on its website, at intake, and at least annually to all people receiving DDA services.
- 13205.5 A person is not required to utilize the DDA Complaint System to address his or her dissatisfaction with DDA or a DDA provider but may pursue other legal, administrative, or informal relief including filing the complaint through DDS's customer service system. However, a person who has a complaint of the type that could be resolved through the DDA Complaint System and does not file that complaint with the complaint coordinator should understand that he or she may be limiting his or her options. Under the DSRAA and these rules, a person must receive a DDS Director Final Decision after filing such a complaint in the DDA Complaint System in order to be able to file an appeal about that complaint with the Office of Administrative Hearings, unless the person also has a Medicaid administrative hearing right.
- 13205.6 A third party may not file a complaint with the complaint coordinator without the consent of the person.
- 13205.7 The complaint coordinator shall inform each person who files a complaint that he or she has the right to choose a person to support him or her throughout the process.
 - (a) The complaint coordinator shall also provide notice to the person who files a complaint that she or he has the right to choose a representative at his or her own expense if they wish, and inform the person about the possibility of free legal and advocacy services.

- (b) Neither DDS nor DDA providers are responsible for compensating a person's or any provider's supporters, representatives, or witnesses, or any other individual a person or provider chooses to help them with an issue.
- 13205.8 The complaint coordinator shall give the person written acknowledgement of receipt of the filed complaint.
- 13205.9 Complaint File

Once a person files a complaint with the complaint coordinator, the coordinator shall establish a Complaint File. In that file shall be:

- (a) A copy of the complaint, dated upon receipt when the complaint is complete;
- (b) A document which shows the stages of the DDA Complaint System and the timeframes for each stage for the complaint;
- (c) One or more documents which detail the passing of the complaint through the complaints process at DDS as well as a written record of attempts at resolution, DDS's decisions at each stage, and the status of the complaint at the conclusion of each stage of the process;
- (d) A record of notifications to the person and their legal representative, if they have one, and their supporter, if they have filed a D.C. Supported Decision Making Agreement with the complaint coordinator;
- (e) If the complaint proceeds through Stage 1, a copy of the decision at that stage;
- (f) If the complaint proceeds through Stage 2, a copy of the external reviewer's recommendation(s) and the DDS Director's stage decision; and
- (g) If the complaint proceeds through Stage 3, a copy of the external reviewer's report, the DDS' Director's final decision, and the notice.

Confidential personnel information and other legally privileged or protected information shall not be kept in a Complaint File nor be disclosed by DDS through the DDA Complaint System.

- 13205.10 The complaint coordinator shall ensure that both the person and any DDA provider named in a complaint have notice and the opportunity to be heard in the DDA Complaint System. Where a complaint is about DDA, DDA shall have the opportunity to be heard and to present evidence, including witnesses. Where an external reviewer leads efforts during Stages Two and Three, the external reviewer is responsible for providing to all parties to a complaint the opportunity to be heard and to present evidence, including witnesses.
- 13205.11 Stage One: Internal DDS Review

Stage One of the DDA Complaint System shall be an Internal DDS Review. The length of Stage One shall be up to fourteen (14) calendar days, unless DDS, the provider agency (if the issue is about a provider) and the person who files the complaint agree to extend the time.

- (a) Where a person contacts DDS's customer services or attempts to file a complaint through the complaint coordinator and the facts alleged meet the SRI definition of abuse, neglect, or exploitation, it must be investigated by DDS IMEU, consistent with DDS policy and procedures. However, a person may file a complaint with the complaint coordinator if they are not satisfied with the investigation, findings, or recommendations, once the investigation closes.
- (b) Additionally, a person may file a complaint with the Complaint Coordinator while the investigation is pending, if the allegation of abuse, neglect or exploitation is part of a larger complaint against DDA, where delay might cause the person harm.
- (c) DDS shall administratively close a complaint if it is not one of the types of issues that may be filed in the DDA Complaint System, which are listed at section 13202.11.
- (d) After a complaint is filed and accepted, DDS shall attempt to resolve the complaint to the person's satisfaction or the mutual satisfaction of both the agency and the person.
- 13205.12 Stage Two: External Review

Stage Two of the DDA Complaint System shall be an External Review. Stage Two lasts up to forty-five (45) calendar days. It shall consist of a Preliminary Step, Part A and Part B, all led by the external reviewer. Stage Two may be extended at the recommendation of the external reviewer or by mutual agreement of the person who filed the complaint and DDS or the provider agency, if the complaint is about a provider.

(a) Preliminary Step: As a preliminary step, the external reviewer shall review the Complaint File and recommend to the DDS Director whether DDS should sustain the complaint, or reject the complaint for failure to state a claim or because it is not the type of issue that can be resolved through the DDA Complaint System under section 13202.12. If the DDS Director decides to sustain the complaint because it involves the type of issue that can be resolved through the DDA Complaint System, the facts alleged appear to state a claim under section 13202.12 and the matter has not yet been resolved to the person's satisfaction, then the external reviewer shall accept the complaint for Stage Two review and move to Part A. If the DDS Director decides to reject the complaint, the Complaint Coordinator shall give the person notice and information about the right to file an appeal with OAH. The preliminary step of whether to sustain or reject the complaint and notify the person shall take not longer than seven (7) calendar days.

- (b) Part A: Alternative Dispute Resolution (ADR). Stage Two, Part A shall consist of the external reviewer attempting to use informal approaches and/or mediation to reach consensual resolution to the complaint. Part A shall last not longer than fourteen (14) calendar days, unless DDS and the person agree to extend the time. If the complaint is not resolved to the person's satisfaction at the conclusion of Part A, the external reviewer shall undertake Part B.
- (c) Part B: Fact-Finding Hearing and Recommendations to the DDS Director. Stage Two, Part B shall consist of the external reviewer conducting a factfinding hearing and making recommendations to the DDS Director. Part B shall last not longer than twenty-four (24) calendar days, unless DDS and the person agree to extend the time.
- 13205.13 Stage Three: External Reviewer's Final Report And DDS Director's Decision
 - (a) Stage Three lasts up to sixty (60) calendar days, unless DDS, the provider agency (if the issue is about a provider) and the person who filed the complaint agree to extend the time.
 - (b) Within twenty-one (21) calendar days of the end of Stage 2, the external reviewer shall submit a final written report with recommendations, if any, to the DDS Director, the person who filed the complaint, and the provider, if the provider is a party to the complaint. Allowing up to an additional seven (7) calendar days for receipt, each party shall have an opportunity to respond within ten (10) calendar days of receipt of the external reviewer's final written report prior to the DDS Director's final decision on the complaint.
 - (c) Allowing up to an additional seven (7) calendar days for receipt of the parties' responses to the external reviewer's final written report, the DDS Director shall issue the final decision within fifteen (15) calendar days of receipt of the last submission. The DDS Director's final decision must be in writing and in plain language and shall consider the parties' responses. The DDS Director's final decision shall accompany the external reviewer's final report and clearly whether DDS will comply with the external reviewer's state recommendation(s), if any, and if so, specify what actions DDS plans to take and in what time frame. If the DDS Director determines that DDS will not comply with one or more of the external reviewer's recommendations, the final decision shall state that clearly and provide rationale for that decision, citing to any applicable law, regulation, DDS policy or procedure supporting the final decision.

13205.14 Notice Of Right To Appeal

At the conclusion of Stage Three, the Complaint Coordinator shall provide to a person notice of the right to appeal to OAH, as well as plain language information about how to file an appeal, appeals deadline(s), the right to have a representative of their own choosing, and information about possible free legal help to the person and their representative, if they have one.

13205.15 DDS Shall Provide DDS Complaint Files To OAH Upon Request

When a person and their representative, if they have one, appeals the complaint to OAH, OAH may request copies of the DDS complaint file as well as any governing DDS policies and/or procedures from the complaint coordinator. DDS shall ask for the record to be sealed to protect the confidentiality of people supported by DDA.

13206 NO LIMITATION ON OTHER RIGHTS

- 13206.1 Filing a formal complaint with DDS or a DDA provider shall not be construed to restrict or limit the rights, procedures, and remedies available under federal or District law protecting the rights of persons receiving services through DDS or a DDA provider.
- 13206.2 Nothing in these provisions is intended to affect a DDA provider's existing due process rights.

13207 NOTICE

13207.1 DDS shall provide notice about the DDA Complaint System to each person who applies for or receives DDA supports and services at the time of application and at least annually for people who receive DDA supports and services.

13208 PEER SUPPORT PILOT PROGRAM

- 13208.1 DDS shall establish a peer support pilot program comprised of people with intellectual or developmental disabilities that are familiar with the DDA service delivery system, to support people with intellectual disabilities filing complaints with DDS through the DDA Complaint System. The peer support pilot program shall be independent of all DDA providers.
- 13208.2 DDS, working with people with intellectual disabilities who receive DDA supports and services, shall:
 - (a) Design the peer support pilot program;
 - (b) Train peer supporters;

- (c) Design informational materials and share information about the peer support pilot program;
- (d) Establish the peer support pilot program;
- (e) Ensure that peer supporters abide by all federal and local requirements for confidentiality; and
- (f) Design and implement an evaluation or satisfaction survey to get feedback from users about the peer support pilot program.
- 13208.3 A peer supporter shall not assist a person with a complaint against a DDA provider from which the peer advocate is currently receiving supports or services or has received supports or services within one year, unless both the peer advocate and the person who is filing the complaint consents in writing to such assistance.
- 13208.4 DDS may provide funding and work collaboratively with a selected vendor to meet the requirements of section 13208.2.
- 13208.5 DDS shall publish an annual report regarding the peer support pilot program, which shall include agency learning about what worked with the peer support pilot program and what can be improved. The report will include an analysis of the evaluation or satisfaction surveys referred to in section 13208.2(f).

13299 DEFINITIONS

- "Abuse" The wrongful treatment of a person who receives supports from DDA that endangers his or her physical or emotional well-being, through the action or inaction of anyone, including, but not limited to, an employee, intern, volunteer, consultant, contractor, visitor, family member, guardian or stranger, whether or not the affected person is, or appears to be injured or harmed. Actions of people receiving services toward other people receiving services, staff, or members of the general public are not typically reported as abuse. However, neglect may be present, as the actions may be the result of the provider failing to identify and implement appropriate supports and services, or neglecting to protect people from harm from other people.
- "Complaint Coordinator" One or more persons designated by the Director of the Department on Disability Services to manage the agency's Complaint System governed by these rules.
- "Complaint System" The District of Columbia Department on Disability Services' process for the resolution of formal complaints, including formal complaints filed with a DDA provider, required by the Department on

Disability Services Establishment Act of 2006, effective March 14, 2007 (D.C. Law 16-264; D.C. Official Code § 7-761.01 *et seq.*).

- "Consumer" A person who receives supports or services funded or regulated by the DDS's Developmental Disabilities Administration.
- **"DDA Provider" or "Provider"** Means an entity that is responsible for providing residential or day services to people supported by the DDS's Developmental Disabilities Administration.
- **"DDA Supports"** The locally-funded supports and services provided by the Developmental Disabilities Administration, including cost of occupancy.
- **"Department on Disability Services" or "DDS"** Means the Department on Disability Services as established by the Department on Disability Services Establishment Act of 2006, effective March 14, 2007 (D.C. Law 16-264; D.C. Official Code § 7-761.01 *et seq.*).
- **"Developmental Disabilities Administration" or "DDA"** A subdivision of the Department on Disability Services.

"Director" – The Director of DDS.

- **"Exploitation"** The illegal or improper act or process of an employee, contractor, consultant, volunteer, or intern, using the resources of an individual for their own monetary or personal benefit or gain. This may also include, but is not limited to, coercion or manipulation of an individual to spend his or her own personal funds for something the individual may not have use for; and the soliciting of gifts, funds, labor, or favors.
- **"External Reviewer"** A person selected by the Director to provide review and resolution of formal complaints, who has:
 - (a) Extensive experience in alternative dispute resolution;
 - (b) Experience working with people with intellectual disabilities; and
 - (c) An understanding of DDS.
- **"Failure To State A Claim"** Means that, even if all the factual allegations in a complaint are true, they are insufficient to meet the requirements for filing a complaint with DDA or a DDA provider.
- **"Formal Complaint"** Means a statement by a person of his or her dissatisfaction with DDA or a DDA provider that is the type of issue that can be resolved under these rules.

- "Host Home" In accordance with Section 1999.1 of Chapter 19 of Title 29 of the DCMR, means the residence owned or leased by the homeowner or principal care provider who provides host home services to the person enrolled in the Home and Community Based Services Waiver for Individuals with Intellectual and Developmental Disabilities (ID/DD Waiver).
- **"Individual Support Plan"** Identifies the supports and services to be provided to the person and the evaluation of the person's progress on an ongoing basis to assure that the person's needs and desired outcomes are being met.
- **"Intellectual Disability"** Means a substantial limitation in capacity that manifests before eighteen (18) years of age and is characterized by significantly below-average intellectual functioning, existing concurrently with two (2) or more significant limitations in adaptive functioning as defined in section 103 of the Citizens With Intellectual Disabilities Constitutional Rights and Dignity Act of 1978, effective March 3, 1979 (D.C. Law 2-137; D.C. Official Code § 7-1301.03(15A)). The determination of intellectual functioning includes consideration of the standard error of measurement associated with the particular intelligence quotient (IQ) test. The adaptive functioning deficits must cross at least two of the following three domains: conceptual, practical, and social.
- **"Neglect"** The failure to provide proper care, supervision or attention to a person or to the person's health, safety, or well-being; failure to provide necessities such as food, clothing, essential medical treatment, adequate supervision, shelter or a safe environment. The failure to exercise one's duty to intercede on behalf of the person also constitutes neglect.
- **"Office of Administrative Hearings" or "OAH"** Means the District of Columbia Office of Administrative Hearings as established by the Office of Administrative Hearings Establishment Act of 2001, effective March 6, 2002 (D.C. Law 14-76; D.C. Official Code § 2-1831.01 *et seq.*).
- **"Peer Supporter"** A person trained through the DDS Peer Support Pilot Program for the purposes of assisting a person with intellectual disabilities with a complaint filed through the DDA Complaint System.

"**Policy**" – A written statement developed by DDS that gives specific direction regarding how DDS, DDA, a DDA provider, a person, their representative or supporter, and/or an external reviewer shall operate administratively and programmatically.

"Principal care provider" – In accordance with Section 1999.1 of Chapter 19 of Title 29 of the DCMR, means the person who owns and/or leases the host

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home and provides host home services and supports to the person enrolled in the ID/DD Waiver.

- **"Procedure"** A written set of instructions developed by DDS describing the step-by-step actions to be taken by DDS, DDA, a DDA provider, a person, their representative or supporter, and/or the external reviewer.
- **"Provider"** Means an entity that is responsible for providing residential or day services to people supported by the DDS Developmental Disabilities Administration.
- **"Reportable Incident" or "Serious Reportable Incident"** Events that, due to the occurrence or the severity, require action by DDS in addition to the internal review and investigation by the provider agency.
- **"Representative"** An individual designated by a person to represent him or her in conjunction with a complaint filed with a DDA provider or through the DDA Complaint System.
- **"Service Coordinator"** The DDS staff responsible for coordinating a person's services pursuant to their ISP and Plan of Care.
- **"Supporter"** An individual named by a person with intellectual disabilities to assist him or her with the DDA Complaint System (including a DDA provider complaint process) either informally, or formally in writing, through a D.C. Supported Decision Making Agreement, with the person retaining the right to make his or her own decisions.
- **"Third Party"** Means a friend, family member, advocate, independent peer advocate or host home principal care provider who is acting on behalf of the person with the person's consent related to the DDA Complaint System.
- "Timely" Means by the deadlines established by these rules.

NOTICE OF PROPOSED RULEMAKING

Greenhouse Gas (GHG) Intensity Limits for Fuels Used in Fuel-Burning Equipment

The Director of the Department of Energy and Environment ("DOEE" or "Department"), pursuant to the authority set forth in Sections 5 and 6 of the District of Columbia Air Pollution Control Act of 1984 (the "Act"), effective March 15, 1985 (D.C. Law 5-165; D.C. Official Code §§ 8-101.05 & 8-101.06 (2013 Repl. & 2018 Supp.)); Section 107(4) of the District Department of the Environment Establishment Act of 2005, effective February 15, 2006 (D.C. Law 16-51; D.C. Official Code § 8-151.07(4) (2013 Repl. & 2018 Supp.)); and Mayor's Order 2006-61, dated June 14, 2006, hereby gives notice of the intent to amend Chapter 8 (Air Quality — Asbestos, Sulfur, Nitrogen Oxides and Lead), to Title 20 (Environment) of the District of Columbia Municipal Regulations (DCMR), in not less than thirty (30) days from the date of publication of this notice in the *D.C. Register*.

The Department is empowered to promote the safety, health and welfare of the public, protect the State's natural environment, and also help ensure a safe, dependable and economical supply of energy to the people of the District. There is strong scientific evidence that the earth's climate is changing and that greenhouse gases ("GHGs") from fossil fuel combustion and other human activities are the major contributor to this change. Furthermore, the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency has found through formal rulemaking that GHGs "may reasonably be anticipated both to endanger public health and to endanger public welfare" and must be regulated under sections of the Clean Air Act of 1963, approved December 17, 1963 (77 Stat. 392; 42 U.S.C. § 7401 *et seq.*). Numerous national and environmental panels have identified the dangers of excessive carbon emissions.¹ Climate change represents an enormous environmental challenge for the District because, unabated, it will have serious adverse impacts on the District's natural resources, public health and infrastructure.

The Department is proposing amendments to Chapter 8 of the air quality regulations in order to conform to the goals of the Sustainable DC and DC Clean Energy Plans, and to protect air quality in the District. The Act provided the Mayor with general authority to regulate air quality in the District and has been subsequently updated to clarify the Mayor's regulatory and enforcement authorities. This rulemaking will further align the District's regulations with its climate goals by preventing the operation of high-carbon sources of heat and power, such as coal-fired fuel burning equipment, that do not utilize carbon capture and sequestration (CCS) or some other advanced CO_2 emission reduction technology, consistent with the District's plan to decarbonize the District's energy system.

In August 2018, DOEE published its updated Clean Energy DC Plan, the District of Columbia's climate and energy plan² that it formulated at the direction of the DC Council and the Mayor. The Clean Energy DC Plan explains how the District will use forward-looking energy policies to

achieve its greenhouse gas (GHG) emissions targets for 2032, while also encouraging innovation, efficiency, and resiliency to address GHG emissions. The Clean Energy DC Plan is the District's roadmap to reduce greenhouse gas (GHG) emissions by 50% below 2006 levels by 2032. The Clean Energy DC Plan provides additional guidance on how the District can modify its energy usage and emissions, as directed by the District's Sustainable DC Plan, the District's planning effort to make the District the most sustainable city in the nation.

Collectively, taking the actions established in these plans are major steps in demonstrating the District's commitment and contribution to hold global warming to two degrees Celsius (2°C) and avoid the worst effects of global climate change. To reach its CO_2 emission reduction goal, the District must ensure that facilities burning coal are repowering to a cleaner fuel or closed as soon as practicable. Climate change represents one of the most pressing environmental challenges for the District, the nation, and the world, and reducing GHG emissions, including CO_2 , is a means to reduce the pace of climate change. The proposed revisions to Chapter 8 serve to further CO_2 emissions reductions in order to mitigate the District's contribution to climate change.

The Clean Energy DC Plan lists 57 actions that the District can take to achieve it sustainable energy goals. In particular, the Clean Energy DC plan found that, "Energy, through extraction and consumption of fossil fuels, is the leading global source of GHG emissions. ... [P]hasing out fossil fuels from the District's energy supply (or "decarbonizing" the supply) will be essential to achieving its climate change goals."³ The Clean Energy DC Plan calls for laws that set a maximum GHG intensity for electricity supplied to the District.

The District is here proposing to adopt rules to compliment this goal by utilizing its existing regulatory authority to control GHG emissions from facilities within the District. The rule proposes to establish a maximum carbon intensity threshold for fuel burned within the District, either for electricity or heating. These limits will be subsequently incorporated into air quality permits, thereby reducing GHG emissions. This rule proposes to establish carbon dioxide (CO₂) emissions limits for all facilities in the District of 180 lbs/mmBTU of input.

Chapter 8, AIR QUALITY — ASBESTOS, SULFUR, NITROGEN OXIDES AND LEAD, of Title 20 DCMR, ENVIRONMENT, is amended to read as follows:

The title of the chapter is amended to read as follows:

"Chapter 8. Air Quality - Asbestos, Sulfur, Nitrogen Oxides, Lead, and Carbon Dioxide"

A new Section 807 is added to read as follows:

807 FUEL CARBON INTENSITY STANDARDS FOR FACILITIES OPERATING WITHIN THE DISTRICT

- 807.1 *Applicability.* The requirements of this section shall apply to all fuel burning equipment subject to the requirements of 20 DCMR § 200.
- 807.2 *Emissions limits.* The following limitation shall apply to each individual fuel type or component fuel before it is blended or combined with any other fuel. The requirements of this part cannot be met by combining a fuel that exceeds the emission limits of this part with a fuel that does meet the threshold in order to lower the overall emission rate. Beginning on December 31, 2019, any new or existing fuel burning equipment is required to meet the following:
 - (a) An emission rate of 180 pounds of CO_2 per million Btu of heat input, daily average basis, shall not be exceeded for each fossil fuel combusted; and
 - (b) Each component fuel shall meet the threshold set forth in paragraph (a) and may not be blended with another lower CO_2 emitting fuel to achieve compliance with this part.
- 807.3 *Deemed Compliance*. Fuel oil meeting the requirements of § 801, biomass, digester gas, kerosene, propane, and natural gas are deemed compliant with this part without further compliance determination, reporting, or certification required.
- 807.4 *Compliance Determination.* The owner or operator of each emission source subject to this section, and using any fuel not deemed compliant pursuant to § 807.3, shall determine compliance with the requirements of § 807.2 by the following method:
 - (a) Determine the gross calorific value (heat content) of the fuel as follows:
 - (1) For coal, sample and test in accordance with ASTM Method D5865 or other method approved in advance by the Department pursuant to § 502.3;
 - (2) For other fuels, sample and test in accordance with a test method approved in advance by the Department pursuant to § 502.3; and
 - (3) Perform such testing at least once per calendar year to represent the fuel used since the last test, except as specified in \$ 807.4(a)(4); or
 - (4) In lieu of the testing specified in § 807.4(a)(1-3), fuel specifications obtained from the fuel supplier, with an updated

version obtained annually from said fuel supplier, and citing a test method approved by the Department, may be used; and

- (b) Determine the CO₂ mass emissions from the emission source by direct measurement or fuel analysis as follows:
 - (1) To determine CO_2 emissions by direct measurement, install, maintain, and operate CEMS to monitor CO_2 or O_2 concentration in combination with a continuous parametric monitoring system (CPMS) for stack gas flow rate in accordance with the relevant provisions of 40 CFR part 75 and use the procedures in 40 CFR part 75, Appendix F to determine CO_2 mass emissions; or
 - (2) To determine CO_2 emissions by fuel analysis, follow the procedures in 40 CFR part 75, Appendix G;
- (c) If fuel blending is used, only the fuel analysis method specified in \$ 807.4(b)(2) shall be an acceptable method for determining CO₂ mass emissions for use in determining compliance with this section in order to document compliance for each component fuel as required by \$ 807.2(b);
- (d) Monitor and record the amount of fuel used each day; and
- (e) Using the information obtained by the procedures in § 804.7(a) through (d), determine and record the pounds of CO₂ per million Btu of heat input, daily average basis, for each fossil fuel combusted each day from each emission unit covered by this section.
- 807.5 *Reporting and Compliance Certification.* The owner or operator of each emission source subject to this section, and using any fuel not deemed compliant pursuant to § 807.3, shall submit to the Department, within one calendar month following the end of each calendar quarter, a report of the daily average pounds of CO₂ per million Btu of heat input emitted from the use of any such fuel during that calendar quarter. The owner or operator shall certify the truth, accuracy, and completeness of each report by the method specified in 20 DCMR § 301.4.

NOTICE OF PROPOSED RULEMAKING

Demand Response Generating Sources

The Director of the Department of Energy and Environment (DOEE), pursuant to the authority set forth in Section 107(4) of the District Department of the Environment Establishment Act of 2005, effective February 15, 2006 (D.C. Law 16-51; D.C. Official Code § 8-151.07(4) (2013 Repl. & 2018 Supp.)); Section 6 of the District of Columbia Air Pollution Control Act of 1984, effective March 15, 1985 (D.C. Law 5-165; D.C. Official Code § 8-101.06 (2012 Repl. & 2018 Supp.)); Section 204 of the Air Quality Amendment Act of 2014, effective September 9, 2014 (D.C. Law 20-135; D.C. Official Code § 8-101.14 (2013 Repl. & 2018 Supp.)); Mayor's Order 2006-61, dated June 14, 2006; and Mayor's Order 2015-191, dated July 23, 2015; hereby gives notice of the intent to adopt a new Chapter 12 (Demand Response Generating Sources) in Title 20 (Environment) of the District of Columbia Municipal Regulations (DCMR), in not less than thirty (30) days from the date of publication of this notice in the *D.C. Register*.

This rulemaking establishes requirements for operators of demand response generators that operate in the District of Columbia. The new Chapter 12 establishes rules to implement Title II of the Air Quality Amendment Act of 2014 to allow for limited participation in electric grid demand response programs by stationary generators.

As background, in order to promote electric grid reliability while minimizing the costs of grid maintenance, the regional electric grid operator (PJM) has developed programs to call upon distributed generation sources to supplement the electric grid in times of power shortfalls. One of the ways to do this is to establish programs where people and businesses owning diesel and other fossil fuel-fired generators can use these generators to power their facilities for financial compensation in lieu of drawing power from the electric grid. Often the days when this supplemental power is most needed are also the hottest days of the summer when air conditioning loads are highest. These days frequently coincide with the worst air quality days of the year and are particularly bad days for numerous generators to operate, in particular older generators with higher emission rates.

To address these air quality concerns while still allowing participation in demand response programs, The Air Quality Amendment Act of 2014 incorporated a requirement that the current Best Available Control Technology (BACT) be installed on any generator permitted to participate in these programs. This proposed regulation defines a process to determine BACT for individual generators in the program. The rule establishes the permitting procedures and application requirements that generators must meet in order to act as demand response generating sources.

This regulation clarifies the ways that stakeholders can participate in these programs, albeit with stringent emission controls consistent with the enabling legislation. It also provides clarity to generator owners on how to participate. The proposed regulation allows generator participation in these demand response programs in order to assist with providing an additional level of grid

reliability. At the same time, the rule minimizes impacts on peak pollution days, thereby protecting air quality and public welfare. In addition, the Department is proposing to adopt all of the federal standards.

DOEE is taking comments on this proposed rulemaking for a period of thirty (30) days. Directions for submitting comments may be found at the end of this notice.

Title 20 DCMR, ENVIRONMENT, is amended by adding a new Chapter 12, as follows:

CHAPTER 12 DEMAND RESPONSE GENERATING SOURCES

1200 DEMAND RESPONSE GENERATING SOURCES1299 DEFINITIONS

1200 DEMAND RESPONSE GENERATING SOURCES

- 1200.1 An owner or operator of a demand response generating source shall obtain a permit from the Department pursuant to this section and § 200.1 of this title before any person shall cause, suffer, or allow the construction or modification of the demand response generating source.
- 1200.2 An owner or operator of a demand response generating source shall obtain a permit from the Department pursuant to this section and § 200.2 of this title before any person shall cause, suffer, or allow the operation of the demand response generating source.
- 1200.3 A demand response generating source shall not be classified or permitted as an emergency generator.
- 1200.4 Except as specified in § 1200.5 and 1200.6, once a demand response generating source is approved for participation in a demand response program pursuant to this section, the level of emission control of the demand response generating source is not subject to re-evaluation under § 1200.7 through § 1200.9 at the time of permit renewal.
- 1200.5 A permit application or permit renewal application to construct, modify, or operate a demand response generating source may be denied if the Department determines that such a denial is necessary or appropriate to protect air quality pursuant to a finding that issuance of the permit would not be consistent with the requirements of § 201 of this title.
- 1200.6 A permit application or permit renewal application to construct, modify, or operate a demand response generating source may be denied if the Department

determines that such a denial is necessary or appropriate to encourage energy efficiency or conservation-based demand response in the District.

- 1200.7 No person shall construct or operate any internal combustion engine as a demand response generating source unless the source implements, at a minimum, a level of emission control determined by the Department to meet the definition of Best Available Control Technology (BACT) in § 199 of this title for a new unit of the proposed type and size at the time of submission of the permit application submitted pursuant to § 1200.1 or § 1200.2, whichever is earlier.
- 1200.8 At no time shall BACT for a demand response generating sources be determined to be less stringent than the standards specified for non-road engines for 2014 and newer model year engines found in 40 CFR §§ 1039.101, 1039.105, 1039.107, and 1039.115.
- 1200.9 In preparing an application for a permit under this section, the applicant shall propose a control system representing BACT based on a case-by-case evaluation of available control technologies, to be documented in the application, performed by completing the following steps:
 - (a) Identify and evaluate a list of air pollution technologies and pollution prevention methodologies that may be applied to the source including, but not limited to, technologies and methodologies used for similar sources, innovative control technologies, modification of the process or process equipment, other pollution prevention measures, and combinations of the above measures;
 - (b) Arrange the measures on the list in descending order of air pollution control effectiveness; and
 - (c) Choose and propose the top-rated measure on the list not eliminated from consideration as a result of one (1) of the following demonstrations:
 - (1) Where a demonstration is made that this measure is technically infeasible, based on physical, chemical, or engineering principles, and/or technical difficulties that would prevent the successful application of the measure;
 - (2) Where a demonstration is made that this measure has adverse environmental effects (for example, effects on water or land, HAP emissions, or increased environmental hazards) when compared with its air contaminant emission reduction benefits, which would make use of this measure unreasonable;

- (3) Where a demonstration is made that this measure should be eliminated from consideration based on its calculated economic impacts as follows:
 - (A) The demonstration shall use the techniques in the latest edition of EPA's Control Cost Manual, where the total and incremental costs of the top measure are greater than the total and incremental costs of the proposed measure(s) and that the extra costs, when compared with the air contaminant emission reduction benefits resulting from the top measure, would make use of the top measure unreasonable; and
 - (B) The costs of the measures evaluated shall be net costs and shall explicitly include in the calculation the economic benefits of operating the generator as a demand response generating source as compared to the alternative operation (or non-operation) that would be proposed if the unit were not granted a permit under this section; or
- (4) Where a demonstration is made that this measure should be eliminated from consideration based on its energy impacts such as establishment that it relies on fuels that are not reliably available; or that the energy consumed by the top measure is greater than that consumed by the proposed measure(s), and that the extra energy used, when compared with the air contaminant emission reduction benefits resulting from the top measure, would make use of that measure unreasonable.

1299 DEFINITIONS

- 1299.1 The meanings ascribed to the definitions and abbreviations appearing in §§ 199.1 and 199.2 of this title shall apply to any terms in this chapter not defined below. However, the following definitions shall apply to the terms as used in this chapter:
 - **Demand response generating source** means a stationary generator subject to an agreement or obligation to provide power in response to power grid needs, economic signals from competitive wholesale electric markets, or special retail rates. The term "demand response generating source" shall not include a generator that derives its energy from an energy source that qualifies as a tier one renewable source under the Renewable Energy Portfolio Standard Act of 2004, effective April 12, 2005 (D.C. Law 15-340; D.C. Official Code § 34-1431 *et seq.*).

NOTICE OF SECOND PROPOSED RULEMAKING

Water Quality Standards

The Director of the Department of Energy and Environment (DOEE), in accordance with the authority set forth in the District Department of the Environment Establishment Act of 2005, effective February 15, 2006 (D.C. Law 16-51; D.C. Official Code § 8-151.01 *et seq.* (2013 Repl. and 2018 Supp.)), Sections 5 and 21 of the Water Pollution Control Act of 1984, effective March 16, 1985 (D.C. Law 5-188; D.C. Official Code §§ 8-103.04 and 8-103.20 (2013 Repl.)), and Mayor's Order 98-50, dated April 15, 1998, as amended by Mayor's Order 2006-61, dated June 14, 2006, hereby gives notice of the proposed rulemaking action to amend Chapter 11 (Water Quality Standards) of Title 21 (Water and Sanitation) of the District of Columbia Municipal Regulations (DCMR) in not less than 30 days from the date of publication of this notice in the *D.C. Register*.

DOEE is conducting the triennial review of the District of Columbia's Water Quality Standards (WQS) regulations as required by Section 5(a) of the Water Pollution Control Act (D.C. Official Code § 8-103.04(a)), and Section 303(c) of the federal Clean Water Act (33 U.S.C. § 1313(c)). The purpose of the WQS Triennial Review is to update the District's WQS based on Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) recommendations, which are created using new data, analysis, and studies to enhance water quality and protect designated uses.

On September 15, 2017 (64 DCR 9089) DOEE published for public comment, the first proposed rulemaking in the *D.C. Register* to revise the WQS. This rulemaking proposed to update the recreational criteria for *E.coli*, aquatic life criteria for ammonia and cadmium, and 94 human health criteria. DOEE held a public hearing on the first proposed rulemaking on October 26, 2017. Written comments on the proposed rulemaking were received from the EPA, environmental groups, and DC Water. Based on the comments received, DOEE made one substantial change. The change removed the update to the recreational criteria for *E. coli*. DOEE needs more time to analyze the available data and understand the impacts of adopting the new criteria. At the same time, implementation of DC Water's Long-Term Control Plan (LTCP) for combined sewer overflows is well underway. This plan was based, in part, on compliance with the current *E. coli* criteria. The current recreational criteria for *E. coli* in the WQS will remain.

This second proposed rulemaking updates aquatic life criteria for ammonia and cadmium, and 94 human health criteria. Prior to promulgating this second proposed rulemaking, DOEE undertook a study to consider the socio-economic, institutional, technological, and environmental impacts (SITE) of applying and enforcing the updates to the WQS. DOEE anticipates that there will not be substantial negative impacts from adopting the ammonia, cadmium, and 94 human health criteria. In fact, substantial benefits are anticipated from adopting these criteria into the WQS to improve the water quality of District waters.

The proposed updates to the aquatic life criteria for ammonia are based on EPA's latest scientific studies and new toxicity data on freshwater mussels and gill-breathing snails. This information is

documented in the 2013 Aquatic Life Ambient Water Quality Criteria for Ammonia – Freshwater (EPA 822-R-13-001). Ammonia can be toxic to fish and other invertebrates in waterbodies. The updated chronic criterion will become less stringent, while the acute criterion will be more stringent.

The proposed update to the aquatic life criteria for cadmium is also based on EPA recommendations, the 2016 Aquatic Life Ambient Water Quality Criteria – Cadmium (EPA 820-R-16-002). Chronic cadmium exposure can lead to adverse effects in the growth, reproductive, immune, and endocrine systems of aquatic life. Cadmium is, however, a naturally occurring metal found in mineral deposits and distributed ubiquitously at low concentrations in the environment. The updated chronic criterion is less stringent than the current chronic criterion, while the acute is more stringent.

The updates to the human health criteria are based on EPA's 2015 recommendations that revise the human health criteria for 94 chemicals. Examples of these chemicals include DDT and its breakdown products, benzene, and heptachlor epoxide. The recommendations reflect the latest scientific information on factors like body weight, drinking water intake, fish consumption rates, bioaccumulation factors, and toxicity values. Most of the updated criteria are becoming more stringent.

NOTICE OF SECOND EMERGENCY AND PROPOSED RULEMAKING Z.C. Case No. 19-04

(Text Amendments – 11 DCMR – Defining Community Solar Facility (CSF), Locating Zones in which a CSF is a Permitted or Special Exception Use, and Establishing Development Standards for a CSF)

The Zoning Commission for the District of Columbia (Commission), pursuant to the authority set forth in § 1 of the Zoning Act of 1938, approved June 20, 1938 (52 Stat. 797; D.C. Official Code § 6-641.01 (2018 Repl.)), and the authority set forth in § 6(c) of the District of Columbia Administrative Procedure Act, approved October 21, 1968 (82 Stat. 1206; D.C. Official Code § 2-505(c) (2016 Repl.)), hereby gives notice of its intent to amend §§ 100.2 and 200.2 of Subtitle B (Definitions, Rules of Measurement, and Use Categories); § 1500.5 of Subtitle C (General Rules); §§ 1103.1, 1105.1, 1107.1, and 1109.1 of Subtitle H (Neighborhood Mixed-Use (NC) Zones); §§ 410.3, 412.1, 612.1, 614.1, 911.1, 913.1, 913.2, and 913.3 of Subtitle K (Special Purpose Zones); and §§ 201.1, 203.1, 600.1, 601.1, 801.1, and 802.1 of Subtitle U (Use Permissions) of Title 11 (Zoning Regulations of 2016), of the District of Columbia Municipal Regulations (DCMR).

On February 7, 2019, the Office of Planning (OP) filed a report with the Office of Zoning that served as a petition proposing text amendments to Subtitles B, C, H, K, and U of Title 11 DCMR (Zoning Regulations of 2016). The proposed amendments would define a Community Renewable Energy Facility (CREF) distinct from the facilities classified in the "Basic Utility" use category and would permit a CREF as a matter-of-right use in all zones except the MU-11 and SEFC-4 zones, with the size of the CREF subject to the yard and height development standards of each zone.

The proposed amendments would apply city-wide and facilitate implementation of community solar installations that provide the benefits of solar energy to residents who can't install systems on their residences, including renters, homeowners whose rooftops are shaded or need repairs, and residents in multi-family buildings, by allowing members to receive a credit on their electricity bill each month for their share of a solar installation not located on their residence. Community solar installations are a key component of efforts to meet the target of 100% renewable energy by 2032 included in the Clean Energy DC plan to implement the Clean Energy DC Omnibus Act of 2018. As part of these efforts, the District Department of Energy and the Environment (DOEE) launched its Solar for All program to reduce the electric bills of at least 100,000 District low-income households with high energy burdens by at least 50% prior to December 31, 2032. DOEE has issued \$13 million in grants under the Solar for All program for community solar installations which must be completed prior to the end of this fiscal year on September 30, 2019.

Although the Zoning Regulations do not specifically regulate solar arrays as a use, community solar installations have been deemed to fall within the "Basic Utility" use category requiring a special exception to operate. DOEE raised concerns that requiring community solar installations to obtain a special exception adds delay and expense and would adversely impact DOEE and the

District's achievement of the solar and renewable energy targets of the Clean Energy DC plan by potentially jeopardizing the 22 megawatts of planned community solar projects funded by DOEE's Solar for All program.

The Zoning Regulations also do not specifically regulate the location of solar arrays; however, roof-mounted solar systems must comply with the Penthouse regulations found in Subtitle C, Chapter 15 and permanent ground-mounted solar arrays that are greater than four feet in height must comply with the development standards applicable to structures in each zone.

OP requested that the Commission take emergency action to adopt the proposed amendments in order to ensure that all participants in DOEE's Solar for All program were able to complete their solar installations before the funding expired.

At its February 11, 2019 public meeting, the Commission considered whether to propose the amendments at its public meeting and heard the testimony of OP and DOEE about the effect of the text amendments and the need to take emergency action. DOEE testified that the need to obtain special exceptions for community solar installations would imperil the funding available for the Solar for All program for this fiscal year. The Commission concluded that any delay to the community solar installations funded by DOEE's Solar for All program in this fiscal year would result in immediate and significant harm to these installations, which must be completed by September 30, 2019 to fulfill the grant requirements. Such delay would also cause immediate and significant harm to the lower-income households who are the beneficiaries of the reduced energy costs from these community solar installations. This would prove detrimental to the District's goals of increasing the sustainability, resilience, and equitability of the District's built environment and energy systems. For these reasons, the Commission, found that the emergency adoption of these amendments is necessary for the "immediate preservation of the public ... welfare." D.C. Official Code § 2-505(c) (2016 Repl.). The proposed amendments were published as Notice of Emergency and Proposed Rulemaking on February 22, 2019 in the D.C. Register (66 DCR 2378).

The National Capital Planning Commission (NCPC) filed a report dated March 7, 2019, stating that NCPC had determined that the proposed amendment would not be inconsistent with the Comprehensive Plan or other federal interest.

In response to the Notice of Proposed Rulemaking, the Commission received six (6) comments in support focused on the importance of the proposed amendments to the District's clean energy efforts. The Mayor stated that the proposed amendments were a critical element in the District's efforts to combat climate change by promoting clean, renewable, District-based energy sources and meet the Clean Energy DC Omnibus Amendment Act of 2018 sustainability goals. (Exhibit [Ex.] 9.) The DOEE Director provided written testimony that noted that without the proposed amendment, CSFs would take longer and be less certain of approval, which would increase the cost of financing these CSFs. (Ex. 17.) The Maryland-D.C.-Delaware-Virginia Solar Energy Industries Association (MDV/SEIA) supported the proposed amendments as necessary to achieve the District's renewable energy goals by efficiently utilizing the District's limited roof space for solar panels and by encouraging more investment in solar installations by removing the uncertainty of requiring Board of Zoning Adjustment (BZA) relief. (Ex. 15.) MDV/SEIA also requested that the Commission expand the eligible solar installations to include those not funded by DOEE's Solar for All program because the zoning classification of a solar installation should not depend upon its funding source. GRID Alternatives, a non-profit solar installer, emphasized the benefits of CSFs in giving access to solar energy to individuals, many lower-income, who otherwise lacked the property on which to install solar panels. (Ex. 18.) New Columbia Solar, a company that finances, installs, operates, and owns solar installations, noted that CSFs, by sharing solar energy to individuals and entities outside of the property on which the solar energy is generated and that the installation components of CSFs are identical to solar installations that generate energy used exclusively on the site of the solar panels, which do not require BZA approval. (Ex. 20.) Groundswell, a nonprofit solar developer, and one of its community partners, supported the proposed amendment to allow lower-income residents to have access to energy generated locally and at a lower cost. (Ex. 23, 24.)

The Commission also received seven comments in opposition to the Notice of Proposed Rulemaking focused on the proposed change to allow a CSF as a permitted use with no review by the BZA instead of requiring a special exception that allows neighbors to participate in the review of a new CSF. (Ex. 10-14, 16, 22, 25, 27.) The Committee of 100, in both its written and oral testimony, also opposed the broad flexibility granted CSFs without requiring BZA review and called for the Commission to narrow the proposed amendment by imposing additional limitations on the area and height of proposed CSFs without BZA review and requiring public benefits for CSFs. (Ex. 16, 25.)

OP submitted a Hearing Report dated March 22, 2019 that revised the proposed amendment by narrowing the type of facility to a Community Solar Facility (CSF).

At its April 1, 2019 public hearing, upon hearing testimony from OP, DOEE, and the public, the Commission asked OP to refine the proposed text amendment, specifically to consider narrowing the definition of the type of facility and imposing a limited size on matter-of-right uses with larger sizes allowed by special exception.

OP addressed the issues raised by the Commission in a Supplemental Report, dated April 22, 2019, upon consultation with DOEE and the Department of Consumer and Regulatory Affairs (DCRA). OP proposed revisions that would require special exception relief from the BZA for ground-mounted solar arrays that exceed two (2) acres in size in all zones but the MU-11, SEFC-4, and PDR zones, with roof-mounted solar arrays allowed by-right in all zones but the MU-11 and SEFC-4 zones, and ground-mounted solar arrays of any size allowed by-right in the PDR zones.

At its April 29, 2019, public meeting, upon hearing testimony from OP, the Commission asked OP to further refine the proposed text amendment, specifically to consider more stringent buffering and screening requirements and a lower size threshold for requiring BZA special exception approval. The Commission deferred taking emergency action and instead scheduled a continued deliberation prior to the June 11, 2019 expiration of the emergency amendment.

In response to the Commission's request, OP submitted a Second Supplemental Report, dated May 8, 2019, based on consultation with DOEE, proposing revisions to require BZA special

exception approval for ground-mounted solar arrays over two (2) acres in panel size and twenty feet (20 ft.) in height, with the BZA authorized to impose buffering and screening conditions deemed necessary to protect the neighborhood. OP also reported that 55 projects had pending building permit applications based on the emergency and proposed text amendment, of which only four (4) were ground-mounted. OP recommended that the Commission renew the emergency action set to expire on June 11, 2019 to prevent terminating pending permit applications that relied on the emergency rule.

At its May 13, 2019, public meeting, upon hearing testimony from OP, the Commission asked OP to further refine the proposed text amendment, specifically to consider specific buffering and screening requirements adjacent to residential and park uses instead of leaving screening and buffering to the discretion of the BZA and a lower size threshold for requiring BZA special exception approval. The Commission also requested that OP provide specific information about each of the pending building permit applications. The Commission deferred taking emergency action and instead scheduled a continued deliberation for June 10, 2019, prior to the expiration of the emergency amendment.

In response to the Commission's request, OP submitted a Third Supplemental Report dated June 5, 2019, based on further consultation with DOEE, that recommended requiring BZA special exception approval for ground-mounted solar arrays over one-and-a-half (1.5) acres in panel size, over twenty feet (20 ft.) in height, and located less than forty feet (40 ft.) of an adjacent property in a R, RF, or RA-1 zone, with requirements for landscape buffering facing public space, residential uses, and parks and recreation uses. OP's Third Supplemental Report also provided information on all pending building permit applications, clarifying that only three were ground-mounted, and only one of those had a panel size exceeding one-and-a-half (1.5) acres. OP again recommended that the Commission renew the emergency amendment set to expire on June 11, 2019 to prevent pending building permit applications being jeopardized by the delay in adopting the amendments.

At its June 10, 2019 public meeting, the Commission considered OP's proposed revisions and confirmed, among other issues, that the forty foot (40 ft.) setback from adjacent property in the R, RF, and RA-1 zones included intervening streets and alleys. The Commission determined that OP's final proposed amendment addressed the Commission's issues and concerns and voted to take proposed action.

The Commission hereby gives notice of its intent to adopt the following text amendment to the Zoning Regulations in not less than thirty (30) days from the date of publication of this notice in the *D.C. Register*.

At that same June 10, 2019 public meeting, immediately following this proposed action, the Commission took emergency action to adopt the following text amendment to ensure that residents who had filed building permit applications for community solar installations funded by DOEE's Solar for All program in this fiscal year based on the expiring emergency and proposed text amendment would be able to continue towards permit issuance if compliant with the Commission's revised proposed rulemaking. Based on OP's and DOEE's testimony on the record, the Commission determined that if the initial emergency rule expired without being

renewed or revised, many of these permit applicants would suffer immediate and significant harm because these solar installations must be completed by September 30, 2019 to fulfill the DOEE grant requirements as would many of the lower-income households who are the beneficiaries of the reduced energy costs from these community solar installations. This would prove detrimental to the District's goals of increasing the sustainability, resilience, and equitability of the District's built environment and energy systems. For these reasons, the Commission, found that the emergency adoption of these amendments is necessary for the "immediate preservation of the public … welfare." D.C. Official Code § 2-505(c) (2016 Repl.).

The emergency rule will expire October 8, 2019, which is the one hundred-twentieth (120^{th}) day after the adoption of this rule, or upon publication of a Notice of Final Rulemaking in the *D.C. Register*, whichever occurs first.

The following amendments to Title 11 DCMR, ZONING REGULATIONS OF 2016, are proposed (deleted text marked in **bold and strikethrough**; new text shown in **bold and underline**):

Subsection 100.2 of § 100, DEFINITIONS, of Chapter 1, DEFINITIONS, of Title 11-B DCMR, DEFINITIONS, RULES OF MEASUREMENT, AND USE CATEGORIES, is amended as follows:

- 100.2 When used in this title, the following terms and phrases shall have the meanings ascribed:
 - ...1

. . .

<u>Community Centers, Private</u>: A building, park, playground, swimming pool, or athletic field operated by a local community organization or association.

Community Solar Facility: A solar energy facility that is directly interconnected with the distribution system of the electric company, as defined by D.C. Official Code § 34-207, and that does not exceed five (5) megawatts in capacity, where the monetary value of the electricity generated by the facility is credited to the subscribers, which must number at least two (2). Community solar facilities are characterized by the sharing of electricity output, which is provided to subscribers. Examples include but are not limited to roof-mounted solar arrays, ground-mounted solar arrays, or solar canopies, but would not include basic utility uses.

<u>Community Service Use</u>: A not-for-profit use established primarily to benefit and serve the population of the community in which it is located.

¹ The uses of this and other ellipses indicate that other provisions exist in the subsection being amended and that the omission of the provisions does not signify an intent to repeal.

Paragraph 200.2(f) of § 200, INTRODUCTION, of Chapter 2, USE CATEGORIES, is amended as follows:

- 200.2 When used in this title, the following use categories shall have the following meanings:
 - (a) Agriculture, Large:

•••

- (f) Basic Utilities:
 - (1) The commercial or governmental generation, transmission, distribution, or storage of energy, water, stormwater, cable, or telecommunication-related information;
 - (2) This use commonly takes the form of infrastructure services which are provided city-wide;
 - (3) Examples include, but are not limited to: electrical sub-station, telephone exchange, optical transmission node, electronic equipment facility, sewer plant, water treatment plant, methods and facilities for renewable energy generation <u>other than a</u> <u>community solar facility</u>, or utility pumping station; and
 - (4) Exceptions: This use category does not include uses which would typically fall within the antennas or waste-related services use categories;

•••

Subsection 1500.5 of § 1500, PENTHOUSE GENERAL REGULATIONS, of Chapter 15, PENTHOUSES, of Subtitle C, GENERAL RULES, is amended as follows:

1500.5 For the administration of this section, mechanical equipment shall not include telephone equipment, radio, television, or electronic equipment of a type not necessary to the operation of the building or structure, or solar canopies on top of a parking garage. Antenna equipment cabinets and antenna equipment shelters shall be regulated by Subtitle C, Chapter 13.

Subsection 1103.1 of § 1103, MATTER-OF-RIGHT USES (NC-USE GROUPS A, B, AND C), of Chapter 11, USE PERMISSIONS FOR NC ZONES, of Subtitle H, NEIGHBORHOOD MIXED-USE (NC) ZONES, is amended by adding a new paragraph (r) to read as follows:

1103.1 The following uses in this section shall be permitted as a matter of right:

- (a) NC zone designated uses;
- •••
- (p) Transportation infrastructure; **and**
- (q) Daytime care<u>: and</u>
- (r) <u>Community solar facility, subject to the following conditions:</u>
 - (1) <u>Roof-mounted solar array of any size; or</u>
 - (2) <u>Ground-mounted solar array, subject to the following</u> <u>requirements:</u>
 - (A) Measures no greater than twenty feet (20 ft.) in height;
 - (B) Has an aggregate panel face area of one-and-one half (1.5) acres or less;
 - (C) <u>Meets the yard and height development standards of</u> the zone; and
 - (D) Where the panels are sited no less than forty feet (40 ft.), including any intervening street or alley, from an adjacent property in the R, RF, or RA-1 zone.

Subsection 1105.1 of § 1105, SPECIAL EXCEPTION USES (NC-USE GROUP A), is amended by adding a new paragraph (i) as follows:

- 1105.1 In areas other than designated use areas, the uses in this section shall be permitted if approved by the Board of Zoning Adjustment as a special exception under Subtitle X, Chapter 9, subject to any applicable provisions of each section:
 - (a) Animal care uses, not meeting the conditions of Subtitle H § 1101.4(g), subject to the following;

 - (g) Utilities uses, other than an optical ... or vehicular movement; and
 - (h) Animal boarding uses not meeting the conditions of Subtitle H 1101.4(g)(3), subject to the following:
 - (1) The animal boarding use shall take place entirely within an enclosed building;

(9) External yards or other exterior facilities for the keeping of animals shall not be permitted=<u>; and</u>

(i) Community solar facility not meeting the requirements of Subtitle H § 1103.1(r), subject to the following conditions:

- (1) Provision of a landscaped area at least five feet (5 ft.) wide facing public space, residential use, or parks and recreation use, regardless of zone, that:
 - (A) Maintains as many existing native trees as possible;
 - (B) Includes a diverse mix of native trees, shrubs, and plants, and avoids planting a monoculture; and
 - (C) Ensures all trees measure a minimum of six feet (6 ft.) in height at the time of planting; and
- (2) <u>The Application, including the landscape plan, shall be</u> referred to the District Department of Energy and Environment for review and report.

Subsection 1107.1 of § 1107, SPECIAL EXCEPTION USES (NC-USE GROUP B), is amended by adding a new paragraph (k) as follows:

(k) Community solar facility not meeting the requirements of Subtitle H § 1103.1(r), subject to the following:

- (1) <u>Provision of a landscaped area at least five feet (5 ft.) wide</u> <u>facing public space, residential use, or parks and recreation</u> <u>use, regardless of zone, that:</u>
 - (A) Maintains as many existing native trees as possible;
 - (B) Includes a diverse mix of native trees, shrubs, and plants, and avoids planting a monoculture; and
 - (C) Ensures all trees measure a minimum of six feet (6 ft.) in height at the time of planting; and

By virtue of the authority vested in me as Mayor of the District of Columbia pursuant to section 422(6) and (11) of the District of Columbia Home Rule Act, approved December 24, 1973, 87 Stat. 790, Pub. L. 93-198, D.C. Official Code § 1-204.22(6) and (11) (2016 Repl.), it is hereby **ORDERED** that:

- The authority vested in the Mayor by section 105(a)(1) of the District of Columbia Traffic Adjudication Act of 1978, effective September 12, 1978 (D.C. Law 2-104; D.C. Official Code § 50-2301.05(a)(1)), is delegated to the Director of the District Department of Transportation (DDOT) and to the Director of the Department of Motor Vehicles (DMV) as follows:
 - a. The authority to issue rules to set or amend fines for parking, other nonmoving, and moving violations is delegated to the Director of DDOT; and
 - b. The authority to issue rules to set or amend fines for violations related to the following is delegated to the Director of DMV:
 - i. Equipment, as described in Chapter 7 of Title 18 of the District of Columbia Municipal Regulations, inspection, and registration of motor vehicles; and
 - ii. Permitting and licensing to operate a motor vehicle.
- The authority vested in the Mayor by section 505 of the District of Columbia Traffic Adjudication Act of 1978, effective September 12, 1978 (D.C. Law 2-104; D.C. Official Code § 50-2201.21), is delegated to the Director of the Department of Public Works ("DPW").
- 2. The Director of DDOT may further delegate any of the authority delegated to him or her under this Order to any subordinates under his or her jurisdiction.

- 5. Mayor's Order 79-32, issued February 15, 1979, is repealed.
- 6. This Order shall supersede all previous Mayor's Orders to the extent of any inconsistency.

The District of Columbia Office of the State Superintendent of Education (OSSE) is soliciting grant applications to increase the number of academies within the DC Career Academy Network (DC CAN) pursuant to the Postsecondary and Career Grant-Making Authority Amendment Act of 2017 (DC Code §38-2602(b)(29)). The DC CAN vision is to create one cohesive network of career academies within all high schools in the District of Columbia. Its mission is to reshape the District's workforce by effectively preparing students for college and careers through the use of the NAF educational design. Eligibility and Selection Criteria: The application shall be open to all public and public charter high schools located in the District of Columbia that seek to establish a DC CAN academy within one of two themes: finance or health sciences.

To be eligible, all schools must first be interviewed by NAF and receive a letter indicating that the school meets year-of-planning standards. Each LEA must then apply on a school's behalf for the DC CAN fund.

Available Funding for Award: The total available funding for this grant is up to \$180,000 through this RFA. All expenditures of the DC CAN grant funds shall be consistent with the DC CAN Budget and Expenditure Policy, available on OSSE's website. The RFA will contain additional information on permissible use of funds.

Length of Award: The duration of this grant is for a period from October 1, 2019 through September 30, 2020. If funding is available, OSSE will award continuation grant funds to support all academies that continue to meet the terms and conditions of the grant. Continuation grant funds may be used to support the academy director position that was agreed upon under initial award. After two years of funding, any additional continuation funds may only be used to support academy activities. Each LEA, however, must sustain the existing full-time academy director position in the third year and onward as a condition of any continued DC CAN funding.

 - 1. 20 percent during the acceleration mode;

Official Code § 6-1041.01 *et seq.*, as amended) and the Inclusionary Zoning Regulations codified in Chapter 10 of Title 11-C and Chapter 22 of Title 14 of the DCMR. This schedule is effective upon publication in the D.C. Register.

Maximum Annual Income¹ limits, Minimum Annual Income limits², rents and purchase prices are based on the Washington Metropolitan Statistical Area Median Family Income (MFI), previously referred to as Area Median Income (AMI). The MFI for a household of 4, as published by the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) on April 24, 2019, is \$121,300. The limits are adjusted for household size in this schedule.

Inclusionary Zoning (IZ) units currently exist only at the 50%, 60%, and 80% MFI levels. However, this schedule also includes the 30%, 100%, and 120% MFI maximum and minimum income levels and maximum rent and purchase price amounts, which are often used in residential developments that include Affordable Dwelling Units (ADUs). For ADUs that are subject to Affordable Housing Covenants that include specific formulas for calculating income limits, rents, and purchase prices, all figures provided herein are for guidance only. Individuals must consult the particular affordability requirements imposed by the terms of the applicable Affordable Housing Covenants to determine the requirements applicable to the subject ADU.

The Maximum Purchase Price or Maximum Allowable Rent is calculated based on a Household at the benchmark income spending no more than 30% of its income toward housing costs.

The 2019 MFI represents a 3.5% increase over the prior year MFI for the region (\$117,200). Historically, however, for statistical and economic reasons the HUD MFI has often varied significantly from year to year declining as well as increasing. To facilitate the operation of the program and the planning of housing providers and residents alike, rents and purchase prices in this schedule are based on a 3% increase over the prior year. Any decreases that occur in future years will also be limited by 3% of the previous year's MFI.

- 2. Real estate property taxes are assessed based on the control price at the current real estate tax rate of \$0.85 per \$100 of valuation and a homestead deduction of \$74,850.
- 3. Condominium fees are estimated at \$0.66 per square foot per month applied to the assumed unit square footages. Single-Family homeowner association fees are estimated at \$0.13 per square foot per month applied to the assumed unit square footages. Estimated unit sizes are:

Schedule 1: Estimated Utilities By Unit Type

The following utility estimates are produced by the District of Columbia Housing Authority. The estimates shall be deducted from the Maximum Allowable Rent if the tenant pays all or a portion of the required utilities. Only those utilities for which the tenant is responsible shall be deducted from the rental rate. For example, an 80% of MFI one-bedroom apartment for which the tenant pays electricity, but not water and sewer charges, will have a maximum rent of \$1,570 (\$1,750 Maximum Allowable Rent minus \$180 estimated electricity cost).

Required fees are also deducted from the Maximum Allowable Rent. If this same property also charges a \$500/year amenity fee, the pro-rated amount of \$42/month would also be deducted from the rent, yielding a maximum allowable rent of \$1,528.

SUMMARY ORDER ON REQUEST FOR MODIFICATION OF SIGNIFICANCE

BACKGROUND

On July 28, 2015, the Board of Zoning Adjustment ("Board" or "BZA") approved the request by Jemal's Bulldog L.L.C. (the "Applicant") in Application No. 19020 under the Zoning Regulations of 1958 for variances from the court requirements under § 776, the off-street parking requirements under § 2101.1, and the loading requirements under § 2201.1, and pursuant to § 3104.1, a special exception from the rear yard requirements under § 774, to construct a new 13-story hotel building with cellar at premises 1011 K Street, N.W. (Square 342, Lots 4, 5, 53, and 809). (the "Subject Property").

The Board granted the application and issued Order No. 19020 on January 28, 2016. The Board's approval was subject to 11 conditions. The Board issued Corrected Order No. 19020-A on January 29, 2016 to correct the citation to the exhibit containing the approved plans.

MODIFICATION OF SIGNIFICANCE

On April 5, 2019, the Applicant submitted a request for a Modification of Significance to the plans and relief previously approved in Orders No. 19020 and 19020-A. (Exhibits 1-7.)

In the request, the Applicant proposes to modify the plans to incorporate a nightclub, bar, cocktail lounge, or restaurant use in the penthouse of the approved building. Revised plans reflecting this modification were filed to the record. (Exhibit 3.) Based on the proposed

modification, the Applicant also requests a special exception from the penthouse regulations of Subtitle C § 1500.3(c). The zoning relief requested in this case was self-certified, pursuant to Subtitle Y § 300.6. (Exhibit 2.)

Pursuant to Subtitle Y § 704.1, any request for a modification that does not meet the criteria for a minor modification or modification of consequence¹ requires a public hearing and is a modification of significance. The Applicant's request complies with Subtitle Y § 704, which provides the application requirements and the Board's procedures for considering requests for modifications of significance.

The Board provided proper and timely notice of the public hearing on this application by publication in the *D.C. Register* and by mail to Advisory Neighborhood Commission ("ANC") 2C and adjacent ANC 2F, as well as to owners of property located within 200 feet of the site. Neither ANC 2C nor ANC 2F submitted a written report to the record.

The Office of Planning ("OP") submitted a report recommending approval of the requested modification of significance. (Exhibit 30.) OP noted that their recommendation is subject to the Applicant making the required contribution to the Housing Production Trust Fund and requested that the Applicant provide an estimate of the contribution. The Applicant provided an estimate for the record. (Exhibits 32-32A.) The District Department of Transportation submitted a report stating that it had no objection to the modification request. (Exhibit 27.)

As directed by Subtitle X § 901.2 and Subtitle Y § 704, the Board has required the Applicant to satisfy the burden of proving the elements that are necessary to establish the case for special exception and modification of significance. The only parties to the case were the ANC and the Applicant. No parties appeared at the public hearing in opposition to the application. Accordingly, a decision by the Board to grant this application would not be adverse to any party.

Based upon the record before the Board, and having given great weight to the ANC and OP reports filed in this case, the Board concludes that in seeking a special exception from the penthouse regulations of Subtitle C § 1500.3(c) to include a nightclub, bar, cocktail lounge, or restaurant use in the penthouse of an existing 13-story hotel building with cellar in the D-5-R Zone, the Applicant has met the burden of proof under Subtitle X § 901.2, that the requested relief can be granted as being in harmony with the general purpose and intent of the Zoning Regulations and Map.

The Board further concludes that granting the requested relief will not tend to affect adversely the use of neighboring property in accordance with the Zoning Regulations and Map. The Board also concludes that in seeking a modification of significance to Orders No. 19020 and 19020-A. the Applicant has met its burden of proof under Subtitle Y § 704.

SUMMARY ORDER ON REQUEST FOR MINOR MODIFICATION

BACKGROUND

On March 15, 2016, in Application No. 19203, the Board of Zoning Adjustment ("Board" or "BZA") approved the request by Sheela Tschand (the "Applicant") for under the Zoning Regulations of 1958 for a variance from the side yard requirements under § 405 and a special exception from the residential conversion requirements under § 336, to allow the conversion of a one-family dwelling into a three-story, three-unit apartment house at premises 1844 Kendall Street, N.E. (Square 4048, Lot 808). The Board issued Order No. 19203 on March 22, 2019. (Exhibit 3.)

MINOR MODIFICATION

On April 10, 2019, the Applicant submitted a request for minor modification to the plans approved by the Board in Order No. 19203. (Exhibits 1-6.) Specifically, the Applicant proposes to: (1) Reconfigure the three units within the approved footprint of the structure; (2) Provide two three-bedroom units and one two-bedroom unit, instead of the approved configuration of one three-bedroom unit and two two-bedroom units; (3) Modify the brick façade shown on all sides of the building to a mix of brick, Hardie panels, and Hardie siding; (4) Revise the layout of the roof plan so that the dividing wall is oriented north/south; and (5) Expand the third-floor footprint to accommodate a closet, within the approved building footprint and lot occupancy. The Applicant submitted revised plans reflecting these modifications. (Exhibits 2 and 27.)

The Applicant's request complies with 11 DCMR Subtitle Y § 703.3, which defines a minor modification as "modifications that do not change the material facts upon which the Board based its original approval of the application." Pursuant to Subtitle Y §§ 703.8-703.9, the request for minor modification has been served on all other parties to the original application and those parties have been allowed at least ten days to submit comments after the request was been filed

with the Office of Zoning and served on all parties. The only parties to the case are the Applicant and Advisory Neighborhood Commission ("ANC") 5D.

ANC 5D did not submit a written report regarding the minor modification.

Office of Planning ("OP") submitted a report recommending approval of the proposed minor modification. (Exhibit 29.)

The District Department of Transportation submitted a report indicating that it had no objection to the application, but recommended that the Board impose a condition that the existing curb cut be closed. (Exhibit 28.) The Board did not adopt the condition, finding that it would not be within the Board's jurisdiction for their review of the minor modification proposed.

As directed by 11 DCMR Subtitle Y § 703.4, the Board has required the Applicant to satisfy the burden of proving the elements that are necessary to establish the case for a minor modification. Based upon the record before the Board and having given great weight to the OP report filed in this case, the Board concludes that in seeking a minor modification to the plans approved in Order No. 19203, the Applicant has met its burden of proof under 11 DCMR Subtitle Y § 703, that the proposed modification has not changed any material facts upon which the Board based its decision on the underlying application that would undermine its approval.

Pursuant to 11 DCMR Subtitle Y § 604.3, the order of the Board may be in summary form and need not be accompanied by findings of fact and conclusions of law where granting an application when there was no party in opposition.

It is therefore **ORDERED** that this application for minor modification of the Board's approval in Application No. 19203 is hereby **GRANTED AND, PURSUANT TO SUBTITLE Y § 604.10, SUBJECT TO THE APPROVED MODIFIED PLANS IN EXHIBIT 2 AND EXHIBIT 27.**

In all other respects, Order No. 19203 remains unchanged.

DECISION AND ORDER

On June 9, 2018, Cambridge Holdings LLC, the owner of the subject premises (the "**Applicant**") submitted an application (the "**Application**") for special exception relief to convert an existing principal dwelling unit to a three-unit apartment house in the RF-1 zone at premises 1128 Buchanan Street, N.W. (Square 2918, Lot 113) (the "**Property**"). Following a public hearing, the Board of Zoning Adjustment (the "**Board**") voted to **APPROVE** the application.

FINDINGS OF FACT

Notice of Application and Notice of Public Hearing

1. Pursuant to Subtitle Y § 402.1, the Office of Zoning sent notice of the Application on August 8, 2018 to the Applicant; Advisory Neighborhood Commission ("ANC") 4C, the ANC for the area within which the subject property is located, the single-member district ANC 4C03, and the Office of ANCs; the owners of all property within 200 feet of the Property; the Office of Planning ("OP"); the District Department of Transportation ("DDOT"); and the Councilmember for Ward 4, the Chairman of the Council, and the At-Large Councilmembers. Notice of the public hearing was published in the *D.C. Register* on August 17, 2018. (65 DCR 8525.)

Party Status

2. The Applicant and ANC 4C were automatically parties in this proceeding per Subtitle Y § 403.5. The Board received no requests for party status.

The Property

- 3. The Property is located at 1128 Buchanan Street, N.W. (Square 2918, Lot 113).
- 4. The Property is zoned RF-1.

- 5. The purposes of the RF-1 zone are to:
 - (a) Recognize and reinforce the importance of neighborhood character, walkable neighborhoods, housing affordability, aging in place, preservation of housing stock, improvements to the overall environment, and low- and moderate-density housing to the overall housing mix and health of the city;
 - (b) Allow for limited compatible non-residential uses;
 - (c) Allow for the matter-of-right development of existing lots of record;
 - (d) Establish minimum lot area and dimensions for the subdivision and creation of new lots of record in RF zones;
 - (e) Allow for the limited conversion of rowhouse and other structures for flats; and
 - (f) Prohibit the conversion of flats and row houses for apartment buildings as anticipated in the RA zone.

(Subtitle E § 100.3.)

- 6. The Property has a lot area of 3,126 square feet. (Exhibit 4.)
- 7. The Property is currently improved with a two-story plus cellar residential row dwelling (the "**Building**") that has a height of 23 feet.
- 8. The Building currently occupies 40% of the lot.
- 9. The Property has a rear yard of 103 feet.
- 10. The abutting property to the East at 1126 Buchanan Street, N.W. (the "**East Abutting Property**") is improved with a building which rear wall is equal to that of the Building.
- 11. The abutting property to the west at 1130 Buchanan Street, N.W. (the "West Abutting **Property**," and collectively with the East Abutting Property, the "Abutting Properties") is improved with a building which rear wall is equal to that of the Building.
- 12. The Abutting Properties have no existing solar energy systems.

The Application

- 13. The Application proposes to convert the existing dwelling unit into a three-unit apartment house and to construct a third-story and rear addition to the Building (the "Addition").
- 14. The Addition will not have any windows facing the Abutting Properties.
- 15. The Addition would increase the height of the Building to 35 feet.
- 16. The Addition would extend ten feet beyond the rear wall of the Building and of the rear walls of the adjoining principal residential buildings.

- 17. The Applicant proposes a rear deck on each floor that would extend another ten feet from the rear wall of the Addition.
- 18. With the Addition, the rear yard would be at least 73 feet deep and the lot occupancy of the Property would be 53%.
- 19. The Application does not propose the removal or alteration of any roof top architectural elements, such as the existing dormer, mansard roof, and porch roof.
- 20. The Applicant provided a shadow study to demonstrate the impact of the Addition on the light and air available to neighboring properties compared with the existing conditions. The study indicates that there will be some additional shading on the West Abutting Property in the morning and on the East Abutting Property in the afternoon. (Exhibit 43.)
- 21. The Addition would be visible from the street frontage on Buchanan Street, N.W. The third-story portion of the Addition is set back from the front façade to minimize its visibility.
- 22. The Addition would be visible from the public alley at the rear of the Property.
- 23. The Applicant will provide two off-street parking spaces at the rear of the Property, accessible from the public alley.

Revisions

- 24. The Applicant redesigned the Addition to not block or impede the existing chimney on the adjacent property at the West Abutting Property. (Exhibit 51.)
- 25. The Application originally included a roof deck as part of the Addition, but that aspect of the proposal was eliminated in revisions to the plans. (Exhibit 51.)
- 26. The Applicant agreed to provide privacy screening on the east and west sides of the rear deck. (Exhibit 47.)

Relief Requested

27. The Applicant requests a special exception under the residential conversion requirements of Subtitle U § 320.2, to convert an existing principal dwelling unit to a three-unit apartment house and to construct a third-story and rear addition.

OP Reports

28. OP submitted a written report dated September 28, 2018 (the "1st **OP Report**") indicating that OP could not yet make a recommendation and requesting supplemental information from the Applicant. OP also suggested that the Applicant make several design changes, such as removing the proposed roof deck and access stairs and providing setback from the side walls of the rear decks. (Exhibit 34.)

- 29. OP submitted a supplemental report dated October 29, 2018 (the "2nd OP Report") after the continuation of the public hearing, recommending approval of the relief requested with conditions. OP's proposed conditions again requested the removal of the proposed roof deck and the reduction in width of the rear deck or the provision of screening for the rear deck. (Exhibit 44.)
- 30. OP submitted a second supplemental report dated December 5, 2018 (the "3rd OP **Report**") in response to the Applicant's submission of amended plans to remove the roof deck and spiral access stairs, as well as to provide screening on the rear deck, reiterating its recommendation to approve the application. (Exhibit 48.)
- 31. OP submitted a third supplemental report dated January 10, 2019 (the "4th OP Report") responding to the Board's questions regarding how the existence of a chimney at 1130 Buchanan Street, N.W. would affect the requirement of Subtitle U § 320.2(f) that an addition not block or impede a chimney or external vent on an adjacent property. OP indicated that, if the Board grants special exception relief, the Applicant would have to demonstrate that the proposed addition does not impeded the existing chimney at the time of its building permit application. (Exhibit 52.)

DDOT Report

32. DDOT submitted a written report dated September 21, 2018 (the "**DDOT Report**") stating its determination that the Application would have no adverse impacts on travel conditions of the District's transportation network and that DDOT had no objection to the approval of the Application. (Exhibit 33.)

Persons in Opposition

- 33. Owners of three nearby properties, including the adjacent neighbors, submitted letters in opposition to the Application. The owner of the East Abutting Property submitted a letter addressed to the Department of Consumer and Regulatory Affairs ("**DCRA**") objecting to notice of construction provided. (Exhibit 12.) The owners of the West Abutting Property raised concerns about the impacts of the conversion and the Addition on the character of the neighborhood and on the light available in their rear yard, as well as other concerns related to construction and discrepancies in the plans. (Exhibits 10, 37, and 38.) The residents of 1140 Buchanan Street, N.W. raised concerns about the conversion changing the character of the neighborhood. (Exhibit 40.)
- 34. At the hearing of October 10, 2018, six neighbors testified in opposition to the Application, including the owners of the Abutting Properties. An owner of the West Abutting Property also testified in opposition on December 12, 2018 and January 16, 2019.

ANC Report

- 35. ANC 4C submitted a written report indicating that at a duly noticed public meeting on September 12, 2018, with a quorum present, the ANC voted to oppose the Application (the "**ANC Report**"). (Exhibit 32.) The ANC Report recommended that the Board deny the Application and that the proposed development be limited to the matter-of-right two units.
- 36. The ANC Report raised concerns on the basis of the adjacent neighbor's objections to the impact of the third-story and rear addition on light, air, and privacy. The ANC Report also raised the concern that the conversion of the one-family dwelling unit into a three-unit apartment would change the character of the neighborhood.
- 37. The ANC Report authorized the Single Member District Commissioner ("**SMD**") for 4C03, Ulysses Campbell, to represent the ANC before the Board.
- 38. ANC SMD Campbell submitted a response dated October 31, 2018 (the "SMD Response") responding to supplemental materials submitted by the Applicant, including shadow studies and design changes to address privacy concerns, Commissioner Campbell filed a response indicating that the concerns raised and recommendations made in the ANC Report remain unchanged. (Exhibit 45.)
- 39. Because the ANC did not submit a written report adopting the contents of the SMD Response, the Board could not afford that filing "great weight."

CONCLUSIONS OF LAW AND OPINION

The Applicant requests special exception relief pursuant to 11-U DCMR § 320.2 of the Zoning Regulations in order to convert a principal dwelling unit into a three-unit apartment house in the RF-1 Zone. Section 8 of the Zoning Act, D.C. Official Code § 6-641.07(g)(2) (2018 Repl.) (*see also* Subtitle X § 901.2) authorizes the Board to grant special exceptions, as provided in the Zoning Regulations, where, in the judgement of the Board, the special exception (i) will be in harmony with the general purpose and intent of the Zoning Regulations and Zoning Map, (ii) will not tend to affect adversely the use of neighboring property in accordance with the Zoning Regulations and Zoning Map, and (iii) complies with the special conditions specified in the Zoning Regulations.

Relief granted by the Board through a special exception is presumed appropriate, reasonable, and compatible with other uses in the same zoning classification, provided the specific regulatory requirements for the relief requested are met. In reviewing an application for special exception relief, the Board's discretion is limited to determining whether the proposed exception satisfies the requirements of the regulations and "if the applicant meets its burden, the Board ordinarily must grant the application." *First Washington Baptist Church v. D.C. Bd. of Zoning Adjustment*, 423 A.2d 695, 701 (D.C. 1981) (quoting *Stewart v. D.C. Bd. of Zoning Adjustment*, 305 A.2d 516, 518 (D.C. 1973)).

Special Exception Requirements of Subtitle U § 320.2

For the relief requested, the Applicant must meet the "specific conditions" of Subtitle U § 320.2:

- (a) The maximum height of the residential building and any additions thereto shall not exceed thirty-five feet (35 ft.), except that the Board of Zoning Adjustment may grant a special exception from this limit to a maximum height of forty feet (40 ft.) provided the additional five feet (5 ft.) is consistent with Subtitle U §§ 320.2(f) through 320.2(i);
- (b) The fourth (4th) dwelling unit and every additional even number dwelling unit thereafter shall be subject to the requirements of Subtitle C, Chapter 10, Inclusionary Zoning, including the set aside requirement set forth at Subtitle C § 1003.6;
- (c) There must be an existing residential building on the property at the time of filing an application for a building permit;
- (d) There shall be a minimum of nine hundred square feet (900 sq. ft.) of land area per dwelling unit;
- (e) An addition shall not extend farther than ten feet (10 ft.) past the farthest rear wall of any adjoining principal residential building on any adjacent property;
- (f) Any addition, including a roof structure or penthouse, shall not block or impede the functioning of a chimney or other external vent compliant with any District of Columbia municipal code on an adjacent property. A chimney or other external vent must be existing and operative at the date of the building permit application for the addition;
- (g) Any addition, including a roof structure or penthouse, shall not significantly interfere with the operation of an existing solar energy system of at least 2kW on an adjacent property unless agreed to by the owner of the adjacent solar energy system. For the purposes of this paragraph the following quoted phrases shall have the associated meaning:
 - (1) "Significantly interfere" shall mean an impact caused solely by the addition that decreases the energy produced by the adjacent solar energy system by more than five percent (5%) on an annual basis, as demonstrated by a comparative solar shading study acceptable to the Zoning Administrator; and
 - (2) "Existing solar energy system" shall mean a solar energy system that is, at the time the application for the building permit for the adjacent addition is

officially accepted as complete by the Department of Consumer and Regulatory Affairs or an application for zoning relief or approval for the adjacent addition is officially accepted as complete by the Office of Zoning, either:

- (A) Legally permitted, installed, and operating: or
- (B) Authorized by an issued permit; provided that the permitted solar energy system is operative within six (6) months after the issuance of the solar energy system permit not including grid interconnection delays caused solely by a utility company connecting to the solar energy system;
- (h) A roof top architectural element original to the house such as cornices, porch roofs, a turret, tower, or dormers shall not be removed or significantly altered, including shifting its location, changing its shape or increasing its height, elevation, or size. For interior lots, not including through lots, the roof top architectural elements shall not include identified roof top architectural elements facing the structure's rear lot line. For all other lots, the roof top architectural elements shall include identified rooftop architectural elements on all sides of the structure;
- (i) Any addition shall not have a substantially adverse effect on the use or enjoyment of any abutting or adjacent dwelling or property, in particular:
 - (1) The light and air available to neighboring properties shall not be unduly affected;
 - (2) The privacy of use and enjoyment of neighboring properties shall not be unduly compromised; and
 - (3) The conversion and any associated additions, as viewed from the street, alley, and other public way, shall not substantially visually intrude upon the character, scale, and pattern of houses along the subject street or alley;

The Application meets the conditions of Subtitle U § 320.2, as follows:

Subtitle U § 320.2(a): 35-Foot Maximum Height

The Board concludes that the Application complies with this requirement because the Addition is proposed to be 35 feet in height. (Exhibit 51.)

Subtitle U § 320.2(b): Inclusionary Zoning Set-Asides

As the Application proposes a three-unit apartment house, the Board determined that the Inclusionary Zoning set-aside requirement is not applicable in this case.

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Subtitle U § 320.2(c): Existing Residential Building

The Board concludes that this requirement is met, as the Property is currently improved with an attached residential building.

Subtitle U § 320.2(d): Minimum Land Area

Based on the computations provided by the Applicant, the Board concludes that this requirement is met, as the Property has a lot area of 3,126 square feet. (Exhibit 4.)

Subtitle U § 320.2(e): Rear Addition

The Board concludes that this requirement is met because the Application proposes a rear addition that extends ten feet past the farthest rear wall of an adjoining principal residential building. (Exhibit 51.)

Subtitle U § 320.2(f): No Blocking or Impeding an Existing Operating Chimney on an Adjacent Property

The Board concludes that the Application meets this criterion, based on the final revised architectural plans provided for the record that provide a carve-out around the neighboring chimney at the West Abutting Property. The Board also notes that the Applicant must demonstrate compliance with this requirement to DCRA at the time of permitting.

Subtitle U § 320.2(g): No Significant Interference with Existing Adjacent Solar Systems

The Board concludes that the Application would not interfere with an existing solar energy system on an adjacent property because none exist.

Subtitle U § 320.2(h): No Removal or Significant Alteration of Rooftop Architectural Elements

The Board concludes that the Application met this requirement because the Application does not involve the removal or alteration of the existing dormer, mansard roof, or porch roof.

Subtitle U § 320.2(i): Impacts of Addition

Under Subtitle U § 320.2(i), any addition shall not have a substantially adverse effect on the use or enjoyment of any abutting or adjacent dwelling or property, in particular:

(1) The light and air available to neighboring properties shall not be unduly affected;

The Board found that the light and air available to neighboring properties would not be unduly affected because the Addition would not create significant shadowing or loss of air flow. The Board relied on the sun studies provided by the Applicant in determining the Addition would not create an undue impact on adjacent properties with respect to light and air. The studies demonstrate that there will be some increase in shadowing on neighboring properties, but the additional shadows do not rise to a significant impact, as they will only affect a small portion of the adjacent properties during the morning for the West Abutting Property and in the afternoon for the East Abutting Property. Further, the Property will have a rear yard that is at least 73 feet

deep, which will provide sufficient airflow to neighboring properties. The Board concludes this criterion is met.

(2) The privacy of use and enjoyment of neighboring properties shall not be unduly compromised; and

The Board concludes that the Addition, as revised to remove the roof deck, does not unduly compromise the privacy and enjoyment of neighboring properties because the Addition will not have any windows overlooking adjacent properties and the Applicant will provide screening on the east and west sides of the rear deck. The Board concludes that the privacy screening and the removal of the roof deck mitigate any potential privacy impacts in this case.

(3) The conversion and any associated additions, as viewed from the street, alley, and other public way, shall not substantially visually intrude upon the character, scale, and pattern of houses along the subject street or alley;

The Board concludes that the Addition would not visually intrude on the character or pattern of houses, as viewed from Buchanan Street and from the rear alley. From Buchanan Street, the Addition is set back from the front façade of the building to minimize the visibility of the new third story. The Applicant will maintain the existing architectural features of the Building, which ensures that the architectural character of the block is maintained. From the rear alley, the Addition will be visible, and with the Applicant's removal of the roof deck and spiral access stair, the Board concludes that it will not visually intrude on the character or scale of houses. For these reasons, the Board concludes that the Addition would not have a substantially adverse impact on the adjacent properties.

General Special Exception Standards of Subtitle X § 901.2

Pursuant to Subtitle X § 901.2(a), the Board concludes that granting the requested special exception would be in harmony with the general purpose and intent of the Zoning Regulations and Zoning Maps because the Application is consistent with the purposes of the RF zones to allow "... improvements to the overall environment, and low- and moderate-density housing to the overall housing mix and health of the city." (Subtitle E § 100.3(a).) The Application would allow for the introduction of additional housing units to the District's housing supply, while maintaining the residential character of the neighborhood.

Pursuant to Subtitle X § 901.2(b), the Board concludes that the granting the request would not tend to affect adversely the use of neighboring property. The Board determined that the Application is unlikely to have a substantial adverse impact on neighbors with regard to light, air, privacy, enjoyment, and visual character in its discussion of Subtitle U § 320.2(i). Further, the Board concludes that the Application would not cause an adverse impact on parking available in the neighborhood, as the Applicant proposes to provide two off-street parking spaces, where only one is required under Subtitle C § 701. The Board credits DDOT's finding that the

Application will have "no adverse impacts on the travel conditions of the District's transportation network." (Exhibit 33.)

"Great Weight" to the Recommendations of OP

The Board is required to give "great weight" to the recommendation of the Office of Planning. (D.C. Official Code § 6-623.04 (2018 Repl.) and Subtitle Y § 405.8). The Board concludes that the OP Reports, which provided in-depth analysis of how the Application met the requirements and standards of the requested special exception, were persuasive and concurs with OP's recommendation to approve the Application.

In the 1st and 2nd OP Reports, OP requested that the Applicant provide additional information and incorporate design changes, including the removal of the originally proposed roof deck and provision of screening on the rear deck. (Exhibits 34 and 44.) Based on these requests being met, OP recommended approval. (Exhibits 48 and 52.) The Board concurs with OP's recommendation that the Application be approved with the suggested design changes incorporated into the final revised plans.

"Great Weight" to the ANC's Written Report's Issues and Concerns

The Board must give "great weight" to the issues and concerns raised in the written report of the affected ANC, which in this case is ANC 4C (§ 13(d) of the Advisory Neighborhood Commissions Act of 1975, effective March 26, 1976 (D.C. Law 1-21; D.C. Official Code § 1-309.10(d) (2012 Repl.) and Subtitle Y § 406.2). To satisfy the great weight requirement, the Board must articulate with particularity and precision the reasons why an affected ANC does or does not offer persuasive advice under the circumstances. The District of Columbia Court of Appeals has interpreted the phrase "issues and concerns" to "encompass only legally relevant issues and concerns." *Wheeler v. District of Columbia Board of Zoning Adjustment*, 395 A.2d 85, 91 n.10 (1978) (citation omitted)."

The ANC report raised issues and concerns related to the impacts of the Addition on neighbors' light, air and privacy, as well as the impact of the conversion on neighborhood character. Although the ANC Report raised specific concerns about the potential adverse impact of the Addition, the ANC Report did not identify any specific impacts stemming from the conversion itself beyond the general introduction of a three-unit apartment where one-family dwellings are more typical. The ANC Report raised the concern that the conversion would "change the character of the neighborhood that has traditionally been comprised of single family homes." (Exhibit 32.) The ANC Report did not cite specific adverse impacts related to density, but more generally stated a concern about "the impact of a multi-unit dwelling of three units." (Exhibit 32.)

The D.C. Court of Appeals has found that, in a special exception case, "an increase in population density is not 'necessarily incompatible' with a residential neighborhood; rather, compatibility turns on whether it would have an adverse impact on the neighborhood in terms of traffic, noise,

or other effects." Neighbors for Responsive Gov't, LLC v. District of Columbia Bd. of Zoning Adjustment, 195 A.3d 35, 53 (D.C. 2018) (citing Clerics of St. Viator, Inc. v. District of Columbia Bd. of Zoning Adjustment, 320 A.2d 291, 295 (D.C. 1974).)

The Board nonetheless considered potential impacts of the Application – such as the effect on traffic, parking, light, air, privacy, and visual character of the neighborhood – and determined that the special exception will be in harmony with the general purpose and intent of the Zone Plan and will not tend to affect adversely the use of neighboring property.

The Board addressed the legally relevant concerns in its discussion of Subtitle U § 320.2(i) and of the general special exception criteria. For the reasons discussed above, the Board ultimately concluded that the Application met the special exception criteria and was therefore not persuaded by the ANC's recommendation to deny the Application.

DECISION

Based on the record before the Board and these Findings of Fact and Conclusions of Law, the Board concludes that the Applicant has satisfied the burden of proof with respect to the request for a special exception under the residential conversion requirements of Subtitle U § 320.2.

It is therefore **ORDERED** that this application is hereby **GRANTED AND**, **PURSUANT TO SUBTITLE Y § 604.10**, **SUBJECT TO THE APPROVED PLANS**¹ AT **EXHIBIT 51** – **ARCHITECTURAL PLANS AND ELEVATIONS**.

SUMMARY ORDER

<u>Relief Requested</u>. The zoning relief requested in this case was self-certified, pursuant to 11 DCMR Subtitle Y § 300.6. (Exhibit 31 (Revised); Exhibit 4 (Original).)

<u>Notice of the Application and Public Hearing</u>. The Board of Zoning Adjustment ("Board" or "BZA") referred the application to the appropriate agencies and provided proper and timely notice of the public hearing in accordance with Subtitle Y § 402.1.

<u>Parties</u>. The parties to this case were the Applicant and Advisory Neighborhood Commission ("ANC") 8E.

<u>ANC Report.</u> The ANC submitted a letter of support recommending approval of the Application (Exhibit 39 (Revised), Exhibit 35 (Original).) The letter provided by the ANC did not include the requirements necessary to be afforded great weight under Subtitle Y § 406.2, namely the case number, date of the public meeting of the ANC, a statement that proper notice was given, the number of members of the ANC constituting a quorum, and the number of members present at the public meeting. Therefore, the report was not afforded great weight, but the Board nonetheless considered the ANC's support.

<u>OP Report</u>. The Office of Planning submitted a report recommending approval of the application on the condition that the proposal is revised to incorporate 3-foot side yards on each side, rather than 2.5-foot side yards (Exhibit 27.) The Applicant submitted revised plans consistent with that condition.

<u>DDOT Report</u>. The District Department of Transportation submitted a report indicating that it had no objection to the application. (Exhibit 26.)

Variance Relief

The Applicant seeks relief under Subtitle X § 1002.1 for an area variance from the side yard requirements of Subtitle D § 206.2, to construct a new detached principal dwelling unit in the R-2 Zone at the premises at 2028 Jasper Street, S.E. (Square 5848, Lot 4).

Based upon the record before the Board, and having given great weight to the appropriate reports and recommendations filed in this case, the Board concludes that the Applicant has met the burden of proof under 11 DCMR Subtitle X § 1002.1, that there exists an exceptional or extraordinary situation or condition related to the property that creates a practical difficulty, in the case of an area variance, or an undue hardship, in the case of a use variance, in complying with the Zoning Regulations, and that the relief can be granted without substantial detriment to the public good and without substantially impairing the intent, purpose, and integrity of the zone plan as embodied in the Zoning Regulations and Map.

Pursuant to 11 DCMR Subtitle Y § 604.3, the order of the Board may be in summary form and need not be accompanied by findings of fact and conclusions of law where granting an application when there was no party in opposition.

SUMMARY ORDER

<u>Relief Requested</u>. The zoning relief requested in this case was self-certified, pursuant to 11 DCMR Subtitle Y § 300.6. (Exhibit 4 (original); Exhibit 29 (updated).)

<u>Notice of the Application and Public Hearing</u>. The Board of Zoning Adjustment ("Board" or "BZA") referred the application to the appropriate agencies and provided proper and timely notice of the public hearing in accordance with Subtitle Y § 402.1.

<u>Parties</u>. The parties to this case were the Applicant and Advisory Neighborhood Commission ("ANC") 3C.

ZONING COMMISSION ORDER NO. 16-29(1) Z.C. Case No. 16-29 Poplar Point RBBR, LLC (Extinguishment of First-Stage PUD @ Square 5860, Lots 97, 1025-1031, 1036, 1037, and a portion of an alley to be closed, and Square 5861, Lot 91) June 6, 2019

Pursuant to public notice, the Zoning Commission for the District of Columbia (the "Commission") held a special public meeting on June 6, 2019, to consider the request of Poplar Point RBBR, LLC (d/b/a Columbian Quarter Holding (the "Applicant") to extinguish, pursuant to Subtitle X § 310.2(b), a planned unit development ("PUD") for Lots 97, 1025-1031, 1036, 1037, and a portion of an alley to be closed in Square 5860 and Lot 91 in Square 5861 (the "Property") approved by Z.C. Order No. 16-29, dated April 12, 2018. The Commission reviewed the request pursuant to the Commission's Rules of Practice and Procedures, which are codified in Subtitle Z of Title 11 of the District of Columbia Municipal Regulations (the "Zoning Regulations," to which all subsequent citations refer unless otherwise specified). For the reasons stated below, the Commission **APPROVES** the request.

FINDINGS OF FACT

- 1. The Order authorized a PUD (the "Poplar Point PUD") on the Property, which has a land area of approximately 271,219 square feet, located on either side of Howard Road, S.E., and between Interstate 295 and South Capitol Street, S.E.
- 2. The Poplar Point PUD, which included a related map amendment from the MU-14 zone to the MU-9 zone, authorized the construction of five mixed-use buildings, containing approximately 52,120 gross square feet of retail use, 691,690 gross square feet of residential use comprising approximately 700 residential units, 1,614,670 gross square feet of office use, and approximately 983 vehicular parking spaces. The Poplar Point PUD was allowed a maximum height of 130 feet and maximum density of 8.99 floor area ratio ("FAR").
- 3. The Applicant submitted a letter dated May 3, 2019 to the record requesting the Commission extinguish the Poplar Point PUD in order for the Applicant to pursue alternative development opportunities for the Property.

CONCLUSIONS OF LAW

1. Subtitle X § 300.1 establishes that the purpose of the PUD process is to provide for higher quality development through flexibility in building controls, including building height and density, provided that a PUD: (a) results in a project superior to what would result from the matter-of-right standards; (b) offers a commendable number or quality of meaningful public benefits; and (c) protects and advances the public health, safety, welfare, and convenience, and is not inconsistent with the Comprehensive Plan.

- 2. Subtitle X § 310.2 requires that upon the Commission's approval of a PUD, construction of the PUD site must comply with the PUD approval until: (a) its validity expires for failure to file a building permit application, start construction, or obtain required approvals within the time limits defined in the Zoning Regulations and PUD approval; or (b) the Commission approves a request to extinguish the PUD approval.
- 3. The Commission concludes that since the Applicant has not started to construct the Poplar Point PUD, extinguishing the Poplar Point PUD would not make the Property non-compliant with the Zoning Regulations based on the MU-14 zone in which the Property is located.
- 4. The Commission concludes that extinguishing the Poplar Point PUD would be consistent with the PUD process, the Zoning Regulations, and the Comprehensive Plan, because the Applicant no longer intends to construct the Poplar Point PUD, but instead to develop the Property under the matter-of-right standards applicable to the Property.

DECISION

At a public meeting held on June 6, 2019, in consideration of the case record and Findings of Fact and Conclusions of Law herein, upon the motion of Commissioner Shapiro, as seconded by Commissioner May, the Zoning Commission for the District of Columbia took **FINAL ACTON** to **APPROVE** the request to extinguish the Poplar Point PUD by a vote of **5-0-0** (Anthony J. Hood, Robert E. Miller, Peter A. Shapiro, Peter G. May, and Michael G. Turnbull to approve).

In accordance with the provisions of Subtitle Z § 604.9 of the Zoning Regulations, this Order shall become final and effective upon publication in the *D.C. Register*; that is, on June 28, 2019.
